

The Cherry Hills Village Police Department IS NOW ACCEPTING APPLICATIONS FOR THE 2025 CITIZEN'S POLICE ACADEMY

Have you ever wondered what it's like to be an officer in Cherry Hills Village?

This program provides residents the chance to gain a better understanding of what those in the policing profession go through on a daily basis through the Citizen's Police Academy. Participants engage in a combination of classroom and hands-on training.

Applications for this free program will be reviewed on a first-come, first-serve basis. Due to the high volume of applicants, we require participants to attend at least 80% of classes. Additionally, participants must complete a criminal history check and sign a waiver of liability prior to the first night. You must be at least 18 years old to apply.

Classes will mostly be held **Thursdays from 6 to 10p.m. beginning April 3, 2025 through June 5, 2025**. Additionally, there are two weekend courses (tentatively scheduled for Saturday, May 10, and Saturday, May 17). Graduation is scheduled for June 5, 2025 at 6:00pm.

TRAINING EXPERIENCE

The academy contains mini versions of the same types of training real officers go through. Participants learn or experience:

- Policing tactics
- Crime scene processing and evidence collection
- Demonstrations from the SWAT team and K9 units
- Emergency Vehicle operations
- Investigative procedures, including officer discretion relating to arrests
- Self-defense / firearm safety
- Traffic laws, accident investigation and impaired-driving enforcement
- Technology overview
- Patrol ride-a-long

GOAL

The academy's goal is to build partnerships between Cherry Hills Village residents and the officers who serve and protect them through a series of classes instructed by police officers. Details and application can be found on the Police Department's website at www.chvpd.com beginning February 24, 2025 until filled.

This terrible tragedy is also a reminder to make sure that you are signed up to receive important emergency notifications from Arapahoe County. Residents and businesses with land line phones are already listed in Arapahoe County's 9-1-1 database, and are therefore automatically included in the ArapAlert emergency notification system. Cell phones, however, cannot automatically be associated with your location. If you want to receive emergency notifications in the Arapahoe County area on your cell phone, you must voluntarily register additional mobile devices. My January 2024 column referenced the bright lights of the Menorah and analogized their symbolism, inspiring us to bring "light" into our communities. This year, I am even more direct and make a specific call for your dedicated efforts to sustain and improve our community. Many CHV opportunities deserve your time and effort.

I congratulate Mayor Brown on her re-election and welcome three new City Councilors: David Heller, Doug Robinson, and Karen Fisher. Each brings

incredible skills to City Council. I anticipate we will continue the productive, collegial working atmosphere Mayor Brown returned to our City's governance. Similarly, we thank outgoing Council members Randy Weil, Al Blum, and Dan Sheldon for their dedicated service and thoughtful actions on the City's behalf.

Mayor Brown's recent column discussed where Council will focus efforts in 2025. My intent is to provide updates and ask for you to set aside time for CHV. Study after study concludes that an involved community is a productive one, where neighbors and city staff interact with respect and integrity in support to accomplish collective communal improvement. We are a small, mighty community where individual efforts make a profound difference. There are real opportunities to implement our revised Master Plan and City ordinances, battle traffic congestion, and keep the community safe.

Cell Coverage. Council recently took a big swing at the cell coverage issue. Council's intent was to determine a feasible solution and allow residents to determine whether the solution was appropriate. Opposition from some residents made it clear that community sentiment on the issue is very divided. With new Council members and energy, 2025 will bring continued investigation and discussions. Traffic Congestion. A recent application from a community organization to amend its Site Plan reignited Village traffic congestion discussions. Even prior to the application, it was clear CHV suffers congestion during rush-hour and that this congestion has severe impacts on our residents. You may remember the ill-fated discussion about a roundabout

at Quincy Ave. and Colorado Blvd. six years ago. That proposal would have materially improved traffic flow at one of CHV's most congested intersections. The "solution", however, was panned as inconsistent with the City's semi-rural character and exacerbating cut-through traffic. There are ways to solve the congestion problem— the question is whether the "fix" is financially or culturally acceptable and how to reconcile conflicting Master Plan mandates. CHV, with its regional partners, hopes to mitigate traffic impacts regarding Tech Center development, the threat of a Union exit from I-25, the potential Hampden expansion to 6 traffic lanes from Sheridan to I-25, our ability to access Bellevue during busy times, and even impacts from school operations.

Master Plan. The 2022 Master Plan added Sustainability and Resiliency content and directs CHV to develop programs and regulations to enhance resiliency, including reducing risks from wildfires and other natural hazards that may impact CHV. With the Los Angeles and Marshall Fires as reminders that even urban areas face threats from natural disasters, CHV seeks to activate the Plan directive. Additionally, it is believed South Metro Fire may face difficult budget decisions in the near future. Please stay tuned as we get more information.

Parks, Trails, Recreation, Public Works. In 2024, CHV received Arapahoe County Open Space grants totaling nearly \$300,000 for the 2025 Quincy Farm pond rehabilitation and resurfacing the High Line Canal trail. We received \$18,000 from the Colorado Energy Office for EV chargers. For Parks equipment we received a Regional Air Quality Council – Mow Down Pollution Grant of \$49,500 for electric mowers, chain saws, snow blowers, and string trimmers. Please commend City staff for their prowess in obtaining funds to better our

community and green our government, another Master Plan directive. Additionally, CHV will conduct its annual Tree Program in February, allowing residents to buy trees at wholesale prices. See the article in this issue for details. Do your part to enhance our tree cover and combat urban heat generation! Third, the Parks Commission will hold its second annual Scavenger Hunt event this Spring! Finally, on May 17th, Public Works will host the 2025 Spring Cleanup.

Quincy Farm. Spend time appreciating beautiful Quincy Farm! Upcoming Spring events include: Earth Day, April 27th— visit barnyard animals and enjoy a hot chocolate; the "Seed to Harvest" gardening workshop; the Quincy Farm Ambassador picnic; and the first of a speaker series on conservation and sustainability. See www.quincyfarm.org/programs. These programs implement both Cat Anderson's and the Master Plan goals to educate and promote environmental stewardship.

Boards, Commissions, Police Foundation. CHV maintains the Board of Adjustment and Appeals; Parks, Trails, and Recreation Commission; Planning and Zoning Commission; and Art Commission. You don't need to wait for a vacancy to apply since the City keeps applications open for two years. Additionally, independent sanitation districts and local HOAs will appreciate your involvement. The Police Foundation sponsors the Exotic Car Show and supports CHV's police department.

State Legislature. Last year the State Legislature limited local land use authority, and there will be many more bills this year that would intrude on our Home Rule authority. CHV will continue to defend our rights to self-governance and oppose efforts to curtail Home Rule authority.

Village residents are renowned for generosity, skills, and involvement. I welcome your participation and dedication to CHV!





FEBRUARY 2025 Newsletter



The City has an interactive plowing map available on its website. When snowplows are deployed, their paths of travel will appear on this map. As they travel, the roads that have been plowed in the last hour will be tracked in green and change slowly to red tracking the time since last plowed. The City provides 24-hour snow plowing during major storm events

throughout the City. During the storm the drivers concentrate on plowing the designated emergency routes and keeping access open for emergency services. This is why the main emergency routes will remain green longer. When snow is clear from those areas and the storm begins to dissipate, snowplows proceed to residential streets. During prolonged

storms that drop larger amounts of snow drivers will also make a single path through residential areas as time allows, once the storm passes then drivers will clear all residential streets completely.
