COUNCIL APPROVES NEW ORDINANCE BANNING SHORT-TERM RENTAL OF HOMES FOR LESS THAN 90 DAYS

At their July 17th meeting, the City Council approved a new ordinance that prohibits short-term rentals of homes for periods of less than 90 days. The Council passed the ordinance following testimony and comments from several Village residents that over the last several years a home in their neighborhood has been rented on a short-term basis, often for large events such as weddings and bachelor parties. The residents expressed concern that continued use of the property for short-term rentals would impact their family's safety and the enjoyment of their property, citing parking impacts, excessive noise and the turnover of unknown renters. The Council adopted the ordinance by a unanimous vote. More information on the new ordinance is available from the Village's Community Development Department at 303-783-2721.

You have already seen one of their great accomplishments—the placement of the bronze sculpture Sundown by Walt Horton outside of the Village Center. The PAC has plans for the placement of more public art throughout the Village and is soliciting pieces now, asking artists to submit pieces for consideration through Call for Entry.org. This new vision includes a holistic health and wellness center called The PEAK, where anyone living with a disability can join to exercise or receive one-on-one training. In this center, you’ll also find technologies and equipment of the future that are still in development. Craig is reaching out to educate and engage the broader Colorado community in preserving and expanding the rehabilitative excellence that we are blessed to have in our own backyard. A Community Mourns. At this writing, we are still grieving the disaster visited upon our region when people were enjoying one of our most popular pastimes—going to the movies. Twelve innocent people were horribly slain and 58 others were seriously injured while indulging in a favorite recreational activity. I attended a moving prayer vigil held at the Aurora Municipal Center on the Sunday evening following this brutal attack. The Governor, our US Senators and the entire Colorado Congressional delegation joined dozens of Mayors, County Commissioners and other elected officials from the Denver region to pay tribute to all the victims and their families. The details have been widely disseminated and will not be repeated here. Cherry Hills Village will not have any issues on the November ballot.

ARE YOU REGISTERED?

In order to vote in the November 6, 2012 election you must be registered to vote by **Tuesday, October 9, 2012**. Registration forms are available at the Village Center or at Arapahoe County offices at 5334 S Prince Street, Littleton CO 80120.

MAIL BALLOTS

Mail ballots will be mailed beginning Monday, October 15, 2012. Ballots must be received at a drop-off location by 7:00 p.m. on Election Day. The Village Center will serve as a mail ballot drop-off location. A full list of drop-off locations can be found at www.arapahoevotes.com.

The last day to apply for a mail ballot, which will be mailed to you is, **Tuesday, October 30, 2012**. The last day to apply for a mail ballot, which you can pick up at the Arapahoe County office, is **Friday, November 2, 2012**.

VOTE CENTERS

Vote Centers are similar to polling places except that any voter in Arapahoe County can vote at any Vote Center regardless of where the voter lives in the County. Vote Centers use multiple electronic voting stations and a real time electronic poll book.

Please be advised that identification must be presented at all election sites in order to vote.

Early voting will be conducted from Monday, October 22, 2012 through Friday, November 2, 2012. Early voting locations will be open on Saturday, October 27, 2012. A full list of early voting locations can be found at www.arapahoevotes.com.

Election Day Vote Centers will be open from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. Cherry Hills Village Elementary School will serve as a Vote Center on Election Day. A full list of Vote Centers can be found at www.arapahoevotes.com.

FROM PUBLIC WORKS

MAINTAINING CHV ROADS

Over the past few years, Cherry Hills Village has made a significant investment in upgrading its streets and roads. They are by no means perfect, but they are substantially better than a majority of roads in the state. The Public Works Department works hard to stretch the limited funds it receives for capital improvements and maintenance to make each project count. Once a street is improved and resurfaced, the work to maintain it in this new condition requires vigilance and perseverance. Utility repairs and construction equipment in the streets must be regulated to keep the streets from prematurely failing.

To help keep our roads in an acceptable condition, construction and excavation standards have been adopted by City Council to ensure that when individuals or utility companies perform work within the roads, they restore them back to the original state. Recently these standards have been updated to further help minimize damage and maximize the useful life of the pavement.

For those who are interested, the full document can be found by going to www.cherryhillsvillage.com, clicking on publications and forms, and scrolling down to "Rights of Way Standards and Permit Fees." **Some of the changes that affect individual residents are:**

- No loading and unloading of materials from the street with skid steers or other construction equipment. (Storage of materials on the street has always been prohibited)
- Temporary construction access must meet all stormwater regulations and be approved by the City.
- Right-of-way permits may be denied if the City determines the work can be reasonably performed from private property.

The majority of the changes pertain to utility companies and their responsibilities when performing work within the streets. By holding utility companies responsible for the damage they cause, the City avoids using taxpayer dollars to make these repairs. Streets are intended for vehicle and pedestrian use only. They are not designed to be used as construction staging areas and these types of activities significantly reduce the life of the pavement.

Public Works requests that residents remind their contractors to check with the City prior to working in the street, and to make sure their contractors are in full compliance with the new standards.

THE VILLAGE GARDENER - *FUN FACTS & TIPS FOR VILLAGERS*

Colorado State University Extension - Arapahoe County Colorado Master Gardener SM Program

Early fall is my favorite garden time. With all the hard work behind, I sit back, relax and enjoy the wonderful results of a season's labor. Before reading our fall tips, have some fun testing your gardening knowledge.

TRUE or FALSE

1. Newly planted trees should always be staked.

False - In most home landscape settings, staking isn't necessary and may impact long term tree stabilization. Properly planted, un-staked trees grow stronger and experience less wind damage. Staking slows root growth and can cause bark and/or wind damage. In situations where the tree is at risk for trampling, high wind damage, or a trunk that is not self-supporting, staking is recommended.

2. Wasps are responsible for stinging more people than bees.

True - Both wasps and bees can be a nuisance, but wasps are scavengers foraging for garbage, outdoor food, and insects. Bees feed on nectar and pollen and provide major cultural benefits. See <http://www.ext.colostate.edu/pubs/insect/05525>.

3. Core aeration of the lawn is a waste of time and money.

False - By core aerating your lawn with holes every 2 inches once or twice per year, your turf will need less water and applied fertilizer. An added benefit is that the plugs decompose into an excellent, organic product which benefits the soil.

4. Ornamental grasses should be cut back in the spring not the fall.

True - Ornamental grasses can provide wonderful texture and color to your fall and winter gardens. Unless you dislike them, consider leaving them until the early spring when they should be trimmed back to allow for new growth.

MID-AUGUST THROUGH OCTOBER GARDENING TIPS

Japanese Beetle Update

Japanese Beetles are causing significant problems for gardeners in both their adult and larval stages attacking trees, plants and turf. According to Dr. Whitney Cranshaw, CSU, beetle traps are ineffective for controlling large populations of JB. Effective cultural, chemical, botanical and biologic controls are available. Cultural controls include modifying your watering practices to decrease beetle larvae feeding on lawn roots. Pyrethroid or carbaryl insecticides are good chemical controls. Neem-based oils containing azadirachtin, a botanical insecticide, can deter the beetles for days. Call our office for more information on these options.

Fall Vegetable Crops

For all the CHV vegetable gardeners, cool weather crops such as lettuce, spinach, radish, kale, peas and select fast growing beans can be planted from seed in early-to-mid August to produce autumn produce. Results can vary based on weather and first frost, but a light protective plant cover on cold nights can go a long way to extending your growing season.

Fall Turf Care: Core Aeration & Fertilization

The best time to core aerate your lawn is from late August through late September, making plug holes every 2 inches. Fall is also one of the most important times to fertilize your lawn. If weather remains hot and dry, call the CMG office for current fertilization advice. Digging Up Tender Bulbs & Planting Spring Bulbs

Tender summer bulbs such as dahlias, begonias and cannas, will not survive winter temperatures, but can be dug up, stored, and planted again next year. Dig bulbs up, rinse off, air dry, and then store in wood shavings or a similar product no more than two layers deep in a basement or closet where it is cool and dry. Spring flowering bulbs, such as tulips, daffodils, allium, etc., should be planted in late September through October.

Hardening off Plants for Winter

Ease your trees and plants into winter by slowly cutting back the amount of water they receive.

Planting Trees

Fall is the second best time of the year after spring to plant new trees. Nurseries often reduce prices by as much as 50%. Plant these trees no later than the end of October. Apply mulch keeping it 6 inches away from the trunk's base. Watering during fall and winter months will be required. For more information, call the CMG office.

CITY FLOODPLAIN DEVELOPMENT REGULATIONS

Did you know that there are approximately 200 properties in Cherry Hills Village impacted by a FEMA designated floodplains and mandatory flood insurance is required for many of these properties? Cherry Hills Village has participated in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) since 1978, making residents eligible for federally backed flood insurance. The City has also qualified through FEMA for a discount on flood insurance by adopting minimum standards and regulations for development within a floodplain. If you want to know if your property is in the designated floodplain or for more information on development requirements within the floodplain please contact the Cherry Hills Village Community Development Department at 303-783-2721 or visit the City's website at www.cherryhillsvillage.com/floodplain.aspx. The City also keeps records of all current flood and past Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRMs) and FEMA issued elevation certificates at the Village Center.

The following are **helpful tips** for residents who live in flood prone areas:

- Know the extent and nature of the flood hazard in your area.
- Buy flood insurance for your property.
- During times of heavy rainfall watch the level of water in the drainageway and stay tuned to radio or television for possible flood warnings.
- Evacuate the flood hazard area in times of an impending flood.
- Plan escape routes to high ground.
