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VILLAGERS FACILITATE OPEN SPACE ACQUISITION TO HONOR SON

On May 7th, following the Council meeting, and after receiving approval from the Council, Mayor Tisdale signed a contract to purchase a two-and-one-half acre site adjacent to the new Joint Public Safety Facility across the street from the current Village Center. The property is located at 115 Meade Lane and is being acquired from HN Partners, Ltd., managed by Frank Hutto. HN Partners acquired the property last year and contemplated arranging a sale to the Village on extremely favorable terms.

"Frank and Holly Hutto had a vision. They wanted to create a space in the heart of the Village, near Cherry Hills Village Elementary School, that would serve as a tribute and a memorial to their late son, Alan Hutto," explained Mayor Tisdale. Alan Hutto passed away at age 9 in May of 2006. He was a third-grader at Cherry Hills Elementary. "Alan was a natural performer, an actor, director, singer, costumer—all within the incredibly short span of his life," Tisdale added.

For that reason, the purchase contract between HN Partners and the Village requires that the property be named as The Alan Hutto Memorial Commons. "The City Council decided to call this a Commons because it is intended to be a special kind of space, one where people can gather as a community, a classic village commons much in the same manner as at Boston Commons," Tisdale said. The contract calls for the construction of a simple flat surface area in a corner of the property and a natural, open air sloped grassy area facing it. "The donors of the property wanted a place where, for example, the kids at Cherry Hills Elementary could

GOVERNOR HICKENLOOPER SIGNS BILLS IN CHERRY HILLS VILLAGE

On May 13th, Colorado Governor John Hickenlooper made his first state visit to Cherry Hills Village to sign two bills passed by the Colorado General Assembly. At the invitation of House Representative Daniel Kagan (D, Cherry Hills Village), the Governor officially signed HB13-1163 and HB13-1308 at the Joint Public Facility in the Community Room. Rep Kagan, Chairman of the House Judiciary Committee, was the primary sponsor for both of the bills.

House Bill 1308 allows law enforcement agencies to acquire call location information from cell phones and other telecommunication devices without a court order in emergency situations such as kidnappings.

USMC MCRD - SAN DIEGO VISIT

Last month I learned that Uncle Sam still wanted ... me! I was asked to join about 80 other Mayors, principals, teachers and coaches from Colorado, Nebraska, Oklahoma and Wyoming for a week in “boot camp” with the United States Marine Corps. Greenwood Village Mayor Ron Rakowsky and I “bunked in” together for our sojourn at the Marine Corps Recruit Depot – San Diego. The purpose of the trip, paid for by the Marine Corps, was to expose educators and “influencers” to the world’s greatest fighting force. Repeatedly during these jam-packed five days we were told the mission of the Marine Corps: “We make marines. We win our nation’s battles. We develop quality citizens.” We had the opportunity to meet many of the current crop of recruits, including some from Colorado, and if these young men (women Marines are trained at Parris Island) are any example, the Corps is doing a fine job.

They definitely ran us through all the paces, including the induction process (where we got to meet our Drill Instructor for the week, a Staff Sergeant who had us all shouting “aye” and marching in formation in record time), the Marine Corps physical fitness test, the obstacle course, bayonet training, field operations training (conducting rescue missions out of the famed “Twelve Stalls” at Camp Pendleton, where your Mayor was selected as the Squadron Leader—a task I readily accepted, as it involved less heavy lifting!), and marksmanship training on the Camp Pendleton rifle range (“Every Marine is a rifleman!”). The visit was rounded out with a tour of Miramar Marine Air Station and was capped off by watching the graduation of the newest batch of Marines at MCRD-San Diego. Commanding General Daniel Yoo was extremely pleased to receive one of our “challenge coins” for the new Joint Public Safety Facility and, in true military challenge fashion, gave me a Commanding General’s Challenge Coin in return. *Semper Fidelis!*

ALAN HUTTO MEMORIAL COMMONS

The story of the remarkable generosity of Frank and Holly Hutto is detailed elsewhere in this issue of *The Crier*. I will just expand upon this to say that your City Council worked collaboratively with me in securing this two and a half acre site for the use and enjoyment of Villagers at a cost that is about one-fifteenth of the appraised value. Plans on how best to implement the vision of the Alan Hutto Memorial Commons are still underway and we are in direct personal conversation with the neighbors and all interested parties to make this an outstanding addition to our Village. GUBERNATORIAL VISIT TO JPSF

On May 13, we hosted the very first official state visit by a sitting Governor to our Village. Now, this was not the first time that a governor had visited Cherry Hills. It’s just that those other visits usually involve a great deal of wine and cheese ... and checks. But this time Mayor-turned-Governor John Hickenlooper visited our new Joint Public Safety Facility at the invitation of our own Rep. Daniel Kagan to sign two Kagan-sponsored bills into law: HB13-1163 (establishing a fund to pay for previously unreimbursed medical testing for victims of sexual assault) and HB13-1308 (authorizing law enforcement agencies to “ping” cell phones of kidnap victims). Kudos to our staff, and especially Chief Michelle Tovrea, for creating a warm and welcoming atmosphere for our state’s chief executive.

MAYOR’S COMPETITION WINNERS ANNOUNCED

After months of creative work by students, and weeks of careful judging by a select panel, winners have been announced in the Mayor’s Competition for Student-Produced Videos celebrating the beauty, history, legacy and value of the High Line Canal Trail. Two teams from St. Mary’s Academy High School were awarded the First Place for the High School Division and the Grand Prize for the entire Competition, the coveted Leone d’Oro Prize. A team from West Middle School was awarded First Place in the Middle School Division. Almost \$3,000.00 in prize money was at stake in this first-ever video competition.

SMA high school juniors Kelsey Waldron, Kathryn Harhai and Sara Van Velkinburgh share the One Thousand Dollar Leone d’Oro Grand Prize Award. Entitled simply, “The High Line Canal,” their five-minute video is filled with stunning visual images of the Canal Trail and is accompanied by a moving narration replete with quotes from William Wordsworth and Albert Einstein and a poetic celebration of nature. A haunting musical soundtrack undulates in the background, together with the all-too-rare water in the Canal that the students were able to capture. The time lapse sunset scenes create striking bookends to this imaginative love letter to the High Line Canal.

FROM THE CHERRY HILLS POLICE

DRUG TAKE BACK EVENT VERY SUCCESSFUL

On April 27, the Cherry Hills Village Police Department was one of 106 Colorado agencies and departments participating in the semi-annual prescription drug take back event. The event was facilitated by the Drug Enforcement Administration of the Department of Justice.

CHVPD collected a total of 120 lbs. of unused, unwanted or expired prescription drugs from Cherry Hills Village Residents. At the end of the day, the total for the State of Colorado was 21,100 lbs. (or 10 ½ tons). Many thanks to residents who participated in this program.

CODE ENFORCEMENT REMINDERS

WEEDS & DEAD TREES

With the coming of summer, the issue of weeds and dead trees comes up. Code Enforcement Officers will be contacting residents, in person or via mail, to address these nuisances when they are discovered or reported. Officers may also visit residents and make suggestions about remedial action(s) to address problem areas.

Cherry Hills Village Code Section 7 (articles 3 & 4) serves as a useful guide when determining what property owners responsibilities are. These codes are available on the City's website at www.cherryhillsvillage.com. The Code Enforcement Division invites residents to leave a message on the Code Enforcement Hotline **303-783-2752** to report a violation or contact Code Enforcement Officer Chuck Friend directly at **303-783-2724**.

RIGHT OF WAY MOWING

With recent wet weather in the Metro area, vegetation along the roads has begun to grow at an accelerated rate. In 2011, City Council amended the Code to clarify who is responsible for maintaining the growth in the right-of-way. There has been some confusion about what right-of-way areas are maintained by City crews and what rights-of-way are to be maintained by residents.

Since 2011, City crews have only maintained the rights-of-way on the "mains": Quincy Avenue, Clarkson Street, Colorado Boulevard, Holly Street, Happy Canyon Road and all state highway rights-of-way. Any private improvements in these rights-of-way are still the responsibility of the homeowner to maintain as is the vegetation along all non-main streets. The City will also continue to maintain areas that are trail easements that parallel and abut the streets.

In short, residents are reminded to maintain and take care of the area in front of your home or property all the way to the edge of the road.

SPRING CLEAN UP AGAIN SUCCESSFUL

The annual Spring Clean-Up was once again a highly popular and successful event in Cherry Hills Village. With the help of Boy Scout Troop 712 (Sponsored by Bethany Lutheran Church) which included Scouts Russell Stewart JR, Laird Stewart, and Bo Dodge, the event was able to collect literally tons of paint and electronics. The totals for this year's event were:

15,000	pounds of paint
3300	pounds of electronics
128,000	pounds of yard debris and household trash

Additionally, residents had over 10,000 pounds of paper documents shredded during the event.

The paint, electronics and paper will all be recycled and reused, saving our valuable and limited resources. These services are provided by the City in an effort to help clean up our community and keep waste and debris out of the City's storm drains and water courses. CITY COUNCIL APPROVES EMERGENCY OPERATIONS PLAN

On April 16th the City Council unanimously approved a new comprehensive Emergency Operations Plan. EOPs guide the actions of municipal governments during times of emergencies from natural disasters and epidemic outbreaks, to terrorist attacks. The plan adopted by the Council meets all requirements set forth by the State and Federal governments.

The City's new plan was developed and written by Villager **Rose Lynch**; Rose is a Certified Emergency Management Specialist. Ms. Lynch has also written and updated Englewood's Emergency Operations Plans.

The new Cherry Hills Emergency Operations Plan provides the framework for police departments, city governments and for traffic routing, as well as relief and medical response coordination.

Chief Tovrea said, "This plan assures that we have the resources we need, the process by which we will implement emergency response, and the order in which we request or escalate the need."

FROM THE REGIONAL AIR QUALITY COUNCIL

It's that time of year again – ground level pollution season

Here are some things you need to know:

- Ozone pollution lasts from June 1 through August 31.
- Ozone is a harmful air pollutant that affects everyone especially children, the elderly, and people working or exercising outdoors.
- In the summertime, weather conditions are prone to elevate concentrations of ground-level ozone to a level that may be unhealthy for some area residents to breathe.

The Regional Air Quality Council, through its OzoneAware program, issues ozone action alerts to inform the public when ozone might reach unhealthy levels.

Ozone is caused in large part by people performing everyday activities, such as driving, mowing the lawn, and using paints and solvents. Metro residents can help to improve our air quality by making small changes in their daily routines.

Residents can use OzoneAware's new OzoMeter tool to track their activities, see their ozone impact, and win prizes like bikes and electric lawn mowers. To find out more go to www.ozoneaware.org. This site has very useful information about ozone pollution like:

CITY FLOODPLAIN DEVELOPMENT REGULATIONS

Did you know that there are approximately 200 properties in Cherry Hills Village impacted by FEMA designated floodplains and mandatory flood insurance is required for many of these properties? Cherry Hills Village has participated in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) since 1978, making residents eligible for federal backed flood insurance. The City has also qualified through FEMA for a discount on flood insurance by adopting minimum standards and regulations for development within a floodplain.

If you want to know if your property is in a designated floodplain or for more information on development requirements within the floodplain, please contact the Cherry Hills Village Community Development Department at **303-783-2721** or visit the City's website at www.cherryhillsvillage.com/floodplain.aspx. The City also keeps records of all current flood and past Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRMs) and FEMA issued elevation certificated at the Village Center.

Helpful Tips...

The following are helpful tips for residents who live in flood prone areas:

- Know the extent and nature of the flood hazard in your area.
- Plan escape routes to high ground.
- Buy flood insurance for your property.
- During times of heavy rainfall watch the level of water in the drainage way and stay tuned to radio or television for possible flood warnings.
- Evacuate the flood hazard area in times of an impending flood.

THE FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS OF THE CITY OF CHERRY HILLS VILLAGE FOR 2012 INCLUDE:

- The assets of the City of Cherry Hills Village exceeded its liabilities at the close of fiscal year 2012 by \$28.6 million (net assets). Of this amount, \$13.4 million (unrestricted net assets) may be used to meet the City's ongoing obligations to citizens and creditors.
- At the close of fiscal year 2012, the City of Cherry Hills Village's governmental funds (General Fund, Capital Fund, Conservation Trust fund, Cat Anderson Fund, Arapahoe County Open Space Fund, and Parks & Recreation Fund) reported combined ending fund balances of \$14.3 million, a decrease of \$1,814,603 in comparison with the prior year (due to funding of the Joint Public Safety Facility). Approximately 40%, \$5.8 million, is available for spending at the City's discretion (unassigned fund balance).
- At the end of the fiscal year 2012, fund balance for the general fund was \$6.1 million, and the capital fund was \$5.6 million.
- General fund actual revenues exceeded budgeted revenue by \$829,410 for the fiscal year 2012, and actual expenditures were \$1,042,402 less than budgeted expenditures.

2012 ANNUAL REPORT The City Department Heads are currently working on the annual report for 2012. This report will be posted on the City's website at www.cherryhillsvillage.com, and also, once it has been completed, a few copies will be available at the Village Center, 2450 East Quincy Ave., Monday - Friday from 8am - 4:30pm. Exact terms of the purchase by the City were not publicly available at press time, but the purchase price has been disclosed as \$100,000.00, with the difference between the fair market value and the purchase price intended to be a donation to the City by HN Partners, Ltd.

The Village is most appreciative of this generous and thoughtful gift from the Hutto family in memory of their son, Alan.

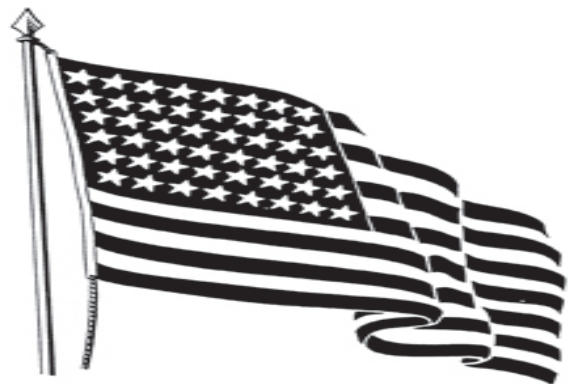
The bill will provide for an enhanced ability of law enforcement agencies to act quickly in response to life-threatening situations.

House Bill 1163 creates the Sexual Assault Victim Emergency Payment Program, providing a mechanism for paying the costs associated with a medical examination of a victim of an alleged sexual assault that are not otherwise covered by current law. Currently, limited funds are available to cover the costs for forensic examinations of sexual assault victims. The bill also appropriates funds out of the state's general fund for the program, avoiding the creation of an unfunded mandate on municipalities or law enforcement.

Mayor Tisdale noted, "This marks the first time that a sitting Governor has made an official state visit to the Village and to have the ceremony conducted in our newly dedicated Joint Public Safety Facility is a great thrill for all of us in Cherry Hills. We very much appreciate Rep. Kagan inviting the Governor to do the bill signing here."

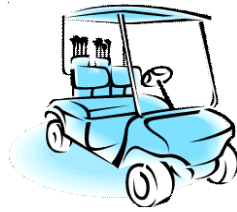

DON'T "TEE-OFF" YOUR FELLOW TRAIL USERS!

GOLF CARTS AND OTHER MOTORIZED VEHICLES ARE NOT PERMITTED ON CITY TRAILS



Imagine the scene....you are taking a leisurely walk along the High Line Canal, enjoying the sunshine and the greenery.....when bearing down on you from behind is a *rogue golf cart?! Not what you were expecting? Other residents would have the same reaction: "There oughta be a law!"*

Actually, there is a law that prohibits golf carts and other motorized vehicles from trolling the trails.

While many people don't consider golf carts as "vehicles," they really *are* when it comes to the Cherry Hills Village City Code.

The City Code prohibits the operation of motor vehicles in any park or on any trail within the City. A motor vehicle is defined in the City Code as, "any wheeled vehicle propelled wholly or in part by internal combustion or electric engine or motor, except for individual handicapped propulsion devices." An exception is made for all government, police, fire, ambulance, water, or other "public" vehicle.

So, while golf carts add a measure of convenience when hitting the links, they are not permitted on public trails. Please be considerate of other trail users and leave the golf carts at the golf course, and you won't "tee off" your fellow trail users!

TWO NEW POLICE OFFICERS HIRED

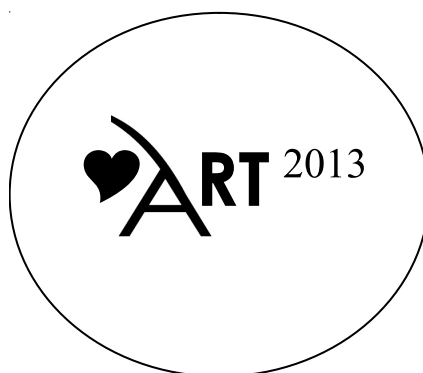

THE VILLAGE GARDENER ~ GROWING GREAT TOMATOES

Home grown tomatoes...large, small, orange, yellow or multi-color...are an amazing summer treat. Even better, the Denver climate is nearly ideal for growing tomatoes with its endless sunny days, low humidity and moderate summer weather. With the introduction of water walls, our shorter than desired growing season is no longer a concern to backyard growers. We can grow a 1+ pound behemoth that's slice fills a piece of bread or a sweet, pop-in-your-mouth cherry tomato.

LOCATION, LOCATION, LOCATION

If you want to grow a bigger and better tomato, location is everything. Tomatoes can be planted wherever there is loads of sun, a water source and good soil:

- **TONS of SUN**
A minimum of 8 hours direct sun is needed for good fruit production. All day, direct sun is best.
- **EASY ACCESS to WATER**
You may need to water 4 times per week or more depending on your situation. Mulching with straw, grass clipping or shavings will reduce this amount.
- **AMMENDED SOIL**
If possible, substitute or replace the base soil with an excellent vegetable planter's mix. Add 1" of compost to the soil if not included in the mix.

PICKING VARIETIES

2,000 varieties make the task of picking plants daunting. A good way to narrow down your choices is to determine how much space is available for growing and how you desire to use the tomatoes. In the ground, a space of 2' x 2' or more should be allowed per plant.

Heirloom tomatoes, known for their rich old-time flavor, may have more disease issues. Hybrid varieties, developed to resist diseases, have better flavor now than in years' past. Whatever the variety, buy pre-grown plants or begin seeds during February indoors.

WALLS-OF-WATER (AKA: WATER WALLS)

With a water wall, tomatoes can be planted weeks before the average last frost date and produce tomatoes well into October. By creating a micro climate around the tomato plant, a water wall protects the plant from major temperature swings, wind, some hail and some drifting herbicides. The wall is a baffled, plastic cylinder placed on the ground outside of the tomato cage. When the baffles are filled with water, a wall is created around the plant. In the fall after the plant grows above the water wall, use a trash sack on cold nights below 40 degrees to cover the exposed parts of the plant. Water walls are sold at specialty garden centers.

WATERING AND FERTILIZERS

Ground level watering is preferable to overhead irrigation keeping leaves drier and less susceptible to disease. Plants seem to prefer barely drying out between watering's.

Water based fertilizers such as MiracleGro, Peter's or RapidGro are good choices. Feed when first planting then every 2-4 weeks after the first tomatoes reach 2 inches. For a lazier gardener, try a slow release vegetable fertilizer (applied 1 or 2 times in the season) such as Osmocote Vegetable.

Viva la tomato!
