The Cherry Hills Village Art Commission's commitment to bringing a Deborah Butterfield horse sculpture to the Village is a goal worthy of a great community. Butterfield is internationally recognized for her original and beautiful work sculpting horses from natural and found materials. Butterfield will take pieces of wood that she then builds into the shape of a horse. Next, the pieces of wood are bronzed through a labor intensive process and then reassembled. Finally, the bronze is covered with a patina that makes it difficult to distinguish the bronze work from the actual pieces of wood.

Every Butterfield horse is one of a kind; each has its own personality and spirit. Butterfield offers horses that are the opposite of the war horse: hers are calm, at ease, yet powerful. Her work is represented in some of the leading museum collections including the Metropolitan Museum of Art, the Smithsonian American Art Museum and the Denver Art Museum.

The Art Commission is proud and grateful for the involvement and generosity of Gary Lutz and Wells Fargo Private Bank in helping CHV realize the dream of acquiring a major work of art.

FLU SHOT CLINIC

Front Range Flu Shots will be holding a flu shot clinic on **Monday, October 19th from 10:30 a.m. to 12:00 p.m.** at the Village Center (2450 East Quincy Avenue).

This is a walk-in clinic so there is no need to make an appointment. Front Range Flu Shots will be offering the Quadrivalent flu shot for \$35.00. This flu shot is meant to protect against four different types of flu viruses. It protects against the same three viruses a typical flu shot will prevent, but also against the influenza B virus. The Quadrivalent flu shot is a broader protection against circulating flu viruses, but the CDC does not recommend any one flu shot over the other.

Front Range will also have the FluMist Nasal Spray for \$35.00 and the High Dose FluZone for individuals 65 and older for \$59.00.

City Council unanimously approves **the John Meade Park and Alan Hutto Memorial Commons Master Plan**

The John Meade Park and Alan Hutto Memorial Commons Master Plan was unanimously approved by City Council at the August 4th City Council Meeting

This Master Plan is intended to guide the design and development of the City of Cherry Hills Village's largest and most central park, while incorporating an adjacent parcel of land that was donated to the City to memorialize Alan Hutto. The master plan is also designed to meet the goals established through an extensive community outreach process, Arapahoe County Open Space grant requirements and floodplain development regulations. The Master Plan was introduced by Bill Lucas, Chairman of the Parks, Trails and Recreation Commission and was presented by Kevin Shanks and Randall Navarro of THK Associates. The approval was the culmination of a process that began in late 2014. Funding for the work by THK Associates was provided by a grant awarded to the City from Arapahoe County in the amount of \$35,000.

The Master Plan was developed with the input of the Parks, Trails and Recreation Commission, City Staff and members of the community. THK endeavored to involve the community

throughout the process by way of an on-line community survey and three public input meetings held in January, April and June.

Attendance at these public meetings consisted primarily of community members who reside near the Park. They were concerned about the redevelopment of the Park, including the installation of the performance area in the Alan Hutto Memorial Commons which was called for by the 2013 agreement in which the city acquired the land. Community concerns for the redevelopment center around increased noise and light, as well as appropriate use guidelines for the performance area. City Council members acknowledged the concerns of the community members and suggested that as the Master Plan enters the design and



Mayor Musing...

Cherry Hills Village is a small community with amazing advantages, while living in a bigger world with incredible challenges. For example, all of us use the highway system. We all understand that it is expensive to maintain the system and it is necessary to expand it, together with mass transit alternatives, as the population of our fair State grows. These obvious truths become less obvious when you leave the boundaries of our community. Fortunately the leaders of our surrounding metropolitan cities and counties agree on the basics of funding transportation, but citizens of our State are harder to convince. There is a perception that roads are "free." No one wants to be taxed to pay for another's transportation; even if better roads benefit all of us through cleaner air and cheaper, better, safer, quicker access to services including schools, work and hospitals. Historically we have looked to the Federal government to fund our significant highway projects. Federal monies are now subject to major squabbling over unrelated arguments that have nothing to do with transportation. Perhaps this has always been the case, which explains our crumbling national infrastructure. The problem will not easily be fixed since asking those in Congress to behave like responsible adults, setting aside personal differences to achieve a greater good, has



not been an effective solution. It's too bad that we cannot send the worst offenders to "time out" until their behavior improves.

One solution for Colorado is..... "if we don't build it, they won't come." A wee bit selfish, but it is understandable.

Unfortunately, we didn't build it and they are coming and continue to come. Maybe the influx will slow down when it's impossible to get anywhere, but I would prefer that we not wait for that result since all of us, not just the newcomers, will be stuck in traffic, breathing fumes, dodging potholes and hoping that old bridges can stay standing for just a bit longer. We have a Village full of business and community leaders; whether you run a company, serve on the board of a business, charity, PTA, are a quarterback of a professional football team or coach your church softball team. You are a leader and you have an impact far beyond your immediate associates and friends. Our little Village is a powerhouse. I have told the new head of the Colorado Department of Transportation that his desire to meet with community and business leaders could have a good start, if he met with people in our community. It may entail hard work, for little is achieved without hard work. Voicing your concerns and ideas is not enough. He may be looking for folks who would also commit time to finding solutions. Am I hoping for too much from our community? I think not. Let me know if you would be interested in an issue that impacts all of us.

implementation phase, the Council should monitor the plans to confirm the redevelopment is consistent with the Master Plan of the Village.

The final design of the Master Plan was presented in four phases: the Alan Hutto Memorial Commons performance area; the wetland areas and trails; the playground, picnic shelter and lawn area; and finally, the Village Center relocation and parking. Phasing the construction allows time to seek funding opportunities from organizations like Great Outdoors Colorado and Arapahoe County Open Space. Grant funds are an important part of this redevelopment. The Plan will be implemented over the next three to four years. In order to comply with the timeline specified in the Alan Hutto Memorial Commons agreement, City Staff will be installing a temporary performance area during September.

A substantial amount of time and effort went into this project. The Mayor and City Council members extend sincere thanks to the members of the Parks Trails and Recreation Commission, to the City Staff, to the involved community members who provided valuable input throughout the seven month process and finally, to the team at THK and Associates who led the way.

2016 City Budget CALENDAR

The City Charter requires the Council adopt a budget calendar by resolution each year. The following calendar was adopted as the budget calendar for the preparation of the 2016 annual budget by the City Council at the July 21, 2015 meeting:

1. The City Manager submits the proposed 2016 budget on or before **SEPTEMBER 15, 2015**.
2. The City Council holds a study session to review the proposed 2016 budget on or before **OCTOBER 6, 2015**.
3. A public hearing will be held concerning the proposed 2016 budget and first readings of the Appropriations Ordinance and Mill Levy Ordinance on or before **NOVEMBER 17, 2015**.
4. The Appropriations Ordinance and Mill Levy Ordinance will be adopted on second reading before the certification of tax levies deadline of **DECEMBER 15, 2015** required by Arapahoe County Assessor's Office.

MAIL THEFT

The Cherry Hills Village Police Department has noticed an increase in the number of mail thefts occurring in the city. The theft of mail can lead to other crimes including fraud and identity theft. The department encourages all residents to take steps to prevent these types of crime. Be vigilant by monitoring all of your credit accounts. Contact your credit provider if you observe any unauthorized transactions or requests for new accounts. If you believe you are a victim of fraud, contact your local law enforcement agency.

Mail Theft Prevention Tips:

- Pick up your mail promptly after delivery. Do not leave your mail in your mailbox overnight. If you are expecting checks or credit cards, then ask a trusted friend or neighbor to retrieve your mail.
- If possible, drop off any outgoing mail containing checks or other negotiable items to the post office or personally hand

them to the letter carrier.

- If you are going away for a weekend, or on vacation, please remember to have daily deliveries, like the mail, picked up by a designated individual or have the post office hold your mail until you return from your trip.
- If possible, have packages delivered when you are home to receive them or require a signature when you have packages shipped to your home. Many shipping companies allow you to customize your deliveries, including setting the day and time of delivery.
- Another option is to have packages delivered to an alternate destination, like work or a neighbor's residence.
- Install a locking mailbox to prevent unauthorized individuals from retrieving your mail.
