Holiday Season SAFETY TIPS

The Holiday Season is a special time of year, and often this is also a time when busy people become careless and vulnerable to theft and other holiday crime. The Cherry Hills Village Police Department hopes that the following tips will assist in keeping everyone safe during the upcoming Holiday Season. You can never be too careful, too prepared or too aware.

At home

• Keep your garage door locked, especially ensuring the side doors and/or rear entry doors are locked.

- Lock all outside doors and windows before you leave for vacation.
- Never leave your keys under doormats, in flower pots, mailboxes or any other "secret" hiding places. Burglars know where to look for hidden keys.
- An alarm system is excellent for home security. If you own an alarm system, make sure you activate your alarm before you leave for vacation. Also,

provide the alarm company with an emergency contact; especially if you are going out of the country for your vacation.

• Indoor and outdoor lights should be on automatic timers while you are away.

• If you are away for an extended period of time, arrange for someone to shovel your driveway in the winter so it appears that someone is at home.

• Large displays of holiday gifts should not be visible through the windows and doors of your home.

• During your vacation, do not have daily deliveries (such as mail, newspapers or flyers, and packages) pile up while you are away. Have the Post Office hold your mail or arrange for someone to empty your mailbox and pick up your newspapers.

• If you are having any service performed while you are gone (such as housekeeping or landscaping), make sure they secure your residence when they are finished.

• Have a responsible person check on your home frequently during your vacation.

• It is not uncommon for criminals to take advantage of the generosity of people during the holiday season by soliciting donations door-to-door for charitable causes although no charity is involved.

Shopping

• Shop during day time hours whenever possible. If you must shop at night, go with a friend or a family member.

• Avoid wearing expensive jewelry.

• Even though you are rushed and thinking about a thousand things, stay alert to your surroundings.

• Avoid carrying large amounts of cash.

• Keep cash or credit cards in your front pocket.

• Notify the credit card company immediately if your credit card is lost, stolen or misused.

• Be extra careful if you do carry a purse or wallet. They are prime targets of criminals in crowded shopping areas.

• Avoid overloading yourself with packages. It is important to have clear visibility and freedom of motion to avoid mishaps.

• Beware of strangers approaching you for any reason.

At this time of year, "con-artists" may try various methods of distracting you with the intention of taking your money or other belongings.

• If you are shopping alone, then you can ask mall or store security for an escort to your vehicle.

The Cherry Hills Village Police Department offers a housewatch program for all residents.

It is a community program that allows residents to request additional police patrol of

their unoccupied residential property when they are on vacation or any other absence of the residence.

To request this additional housewatch patrol, you can contact the Police Department at (303) 761-8711 during normal office hours (8:00-4:30 p.m.) and provide the following information:

- Name, address and telephone number
- Dates of departure and return
- Names and telephone numbers of emergency contacts

- Specific information regarding your residence, such as persons who have permission to go inside your residence, whether an alarm system will be activated, if lights will be on timers and if there will be any pets left at the residence
- Any other information that will assist officers monitoring your property

NEWS FROM CHV PUBLIC ART COMMISSION

We were very grateful to Trish Green for her service on the Public Art Commission but unfortunately, she had to resign before her term ended. We are extremely proud to announce that Elaine Asarch has been selected as her replacement. Mrs. Asarch has been extremely active in the community. She has served on the board of Historic Denver, the board of the Riverfront Foundation, and was founder and served on the board of Denver Civic Center Conservancy. She is a talented artist and the Public Art Commission is thrilled to have her.

On October 6th the Art Commission held a dedication for Emmett Culligan's sculpture *Rubric* #6. The piece is located on the north side of the Joint Public Safety Facility on Quincy Avenue. The piece is made of Colorado Yule Marble from Marble, Colorado and inflated stainless steel. It stands about 8 feet tall and weighs 4,000 pounds. Mr. Culligan made the entire piece himself at his art studio in Denver's RiNo District. He has a massive kiln at his facility where he heats the hollow stainless steel forms to 2000 degrees Fahrenheit before inflating them to their final shapes with compressed air. He then cuts the forms apart and incorporates the carved marble elements. This sculpture took him approximately 500 hours to complete!

As part of the dedication event Mr. Culligan made a presentation to our residents and concluded with these remarks about the *Rubric* series, "This sculpture has a light pillow-like essence not commonly associated with stainless steel and marble. There are four separate elements which tenuously cooperate to achieve a perfectly balanced form similar to life itself."

Following the dedication, the group went to the home of Keith and Kathy Finger for wine, hors d'oeuvres and a special tour of the Fingers' personal sculpture garden led by Mrs. Finger. A huge thank you to the Fingers for so generously hosting this reception. All in attendance were excited about public art in the Village.

**CHERRY HILLS VILLAGE
WELCOMES NEW SPECIAL
PROJECTS COORDINATOR**

Emy Black joined the City of Cherry Hills Village in October as the Special Projects Coordinator. This spring, she completed her Master in Public Affairs at Princeton University. Before graduate school, Ms. Black spent three years managing a joint Bureau of Justice Assistance/Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration grant for a Philadelphia-area nonprofit, Chester County Opportunities Industrialization Center (CCOIC). She assisted over one hundred young adults in Drug Court to find employment or enter higher education and transition back into healthy, productive members of their communities. She simultaneously served as the site manager for a



satellite office and developed strategic plans for crisis management. Ms. Black also served a year term as the Philadelphia organizer for Oxfam Action Corps, planning community events and conducting lobby visits to offices in both Philadelphia and Washington, D.C.

Recently at Princeton, Ms. Black completed a policy workshop where she acted as a consultant for the Philadelphia Association of Community Development Corporations. Her team interviewed over 70 small business owners across three Philadelphia neighborhoods to measure the effects of gentrification on local businesses and provide policy recommendations to the city. She also served as an intern with the Mayor's Office of Grants in Philadelphia, working on federal, state, and foundation grants and writing letters of support and commendation on behalf of Mayor Michael Nutter. In addition to her MPA, Ms. Black holds a B.A.

in International Development Studies from McGill University.

Mayor Musings...



Colorado has one of the lowest unemployment rates in the Country. Buildings are going up right and left. Prosperity is tangible. Many of us in Cherry Hills Village are enjoying the fruits

of Colorado's economic boom, believing that it is spread across the greater Denver region. I was both shocked and saddened to learn that in parts of Arapahoe County, the number of children using the school subsidized lunch program has increased five times over the number of children that subscribed last year. There are thousands of children whose parents cannot afford to feed them. School lunches are helping, but that is not enough. Many families earning \$20,000 to \$30,000 per annum have incomes too high to qualify for government food subsidies. Rents for some households have increased by \$500 per month, or more. The only option for these families is to take a second and sometimes a third job, but that only pays a portion of the increased rent, the shortfall comes out of the food budget. (For senior citizens, on a fixed income, the choice is between food and medicine). Our food banks are having trouble keeping up with the demand, in part because many of us, myself included, have thought that "things are good."

All of us are barraged by pictures of hungry children from around the world. This is a crisis not thousands of miles away, but just a few miles from our city limits. We cannot, nor should not, as a community turn our backs on our neighbors. Our Village can make a tangible dent in feeding those who are struggling to keep their families afloat. I am not asking that you donate a few cans of food, I am asking that you donate a few CASES of food. If you have children or grandchildren, take them with you to help select the food. Make it a family project. The Village will collect all donated cases of can goods and distribute it to food banks that serve the South Denver Community. Our first donation date is December 9th at the Annual Winter Celebration event (see flyer in this issue for more information) and our second date will be in February. We will post the February date in our January Crier. If every household donates two cases of food per collection date that equates to eight thousand cases. Does it fix the problem of hunger, no, but it will assist families that are trying to make it in an economy with spiraling costs. Please take the time to help.

CHERRY HILLS VILLAGE FINANCE DEPARTMENT RECEIVES AWARD FOR 2016 BUDGET

The City of Cherry Hills Village was awarded the Distinguished Budget

Presentation Award for the 2016 budget by the Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA) in September. This award is the highest form of recognition in governmental accounting and its attainment is a significant achievement for the City. Director of Finance and Administration, Karen Proctor and Accounting Clerk, Jessica Sager, worked on the budget document for over 8 months following a strict set of guidelines. These guidelines determine how well the budget serves as a policy document, a financial plan, an operations guide and a communications device for the residents. Once the budget document was submitted, a panel of independent reviewers completed an examination to determine if the document met the requirements. The budget document must be rated "proficient" in all four categories, along with fourteen mandatory criteria within those categories, in order to receive the award.

Interactive Online Parks and Trails Map available and ready to use!

The City would like to remind users of Cherry Hills Village Parks, Trails and Open Spaces that the new Parks and Trail Map is live and ready to be accessed! The map was created to provide general reference to public trails, parks and recreation amenities located within the City. The information contained in the map was collected from various outside sources and data. Although the City has taken every reasonable effort to ensure the accuracy of the information, there may be omissions or errors, including but not limited to accuracy of property lines, easements, etc. We welcome any suggestions or correction from users.

Features of the online map that are available to the public include: visuals of all parks, trails and open space, streets, trail heads, parking, bridges, streams, lakes, subdivisions, Arapahoe County Assessor parcels and aerial imagery of the entire City. The map also contains a wildlife spotting feature that allows users to identify unique and interesting sightings. Recommended sightings include: birds of prey, coyotes, foxes, deer, amphibians, endangered species, etc. Follow the instructions below to use the wildlife spotting feature:

WILDLIFE SPOTTING FEATURE

1. Access the map at www.cherryhillsvillage.com/parkstrailsmap or by scanning the QR code found on City signage.
2. Click the  button to use the GPS on your device to locate yourself on the map.
3. After locating yourself, click the  button to bring up the wildlife spotting feature.
4. Once open, click **New Feature** and select the location on the map where you would like to place the wildlife spotting report.
5. Next simply fill in any relevant notes and click **Choose File** to add a photograph.
6. Once done, click the **Close** button. You can also click the **Delete** button if you do not want to submit your report.
7. Once you have clicked **Close**, the report will be submitted to City staff for review. Once the City staff has reviewed and approved your report, it will be visible to all users on the map!

Also don't forget to download a QR code scanner for your phone or tablet.
