### NEW CITY HALL DESIGN

**A**t the beginning of this year, the City hired Bennett Wagner Grody Architects to design the new City Hall. After several public meetings, a final design is nearing completion (see rendering of tentative design below). The one-story semi-rural design includes the use of high ceilings, glass, metal, and natural materials such as wood and stone. The building mimics and complements several characteristics of the Joint Public Safety building and was designed to take advantage of passive solar in the winter and shade trees in the summer. Other design features include an ADA accessible building, larger parking lot, improved security and

lighting, floodplain compliant, and meets modern building codes. The new council/court room will be connected to an outdoor public patio area that can provide a venue for community events. The lobby and hallways will provide space for artwork and finally, the administration area will have sufficient size to meet staffing needs. As previously reported in October's Village Crier, the existing Public Works Facility is currently being relocated out of the Civic Center and over to the South Santa Fe Business Park in Sheridan, just 3 miles west of the City. The existing City Hall will be demolished and, until the new building is completed in early 2019, a temporary City Hall will be located just 300 feet south of the existing City Hall in the old fire station building. ## DECEMBER 2017 MAYOR MUSINGS

### FIRST, HAPPY HOLIDAYS!



**N**ow, down to business. Many of you have asked what is happening with the NextGen/MetroPlex program that is being implemented by the FAA. The increase in noise that many of you noticed this summer is allowed under the current NextGen program that was approved and implemented in 2013. That is NOT what we are fighting. What I am concerned about, and what has caused huge problems in other cities, is the "next" implementation of NextGen/Metroplex, slated to be implemented in 2018. My concern with the impact on our community and other communities is made more critical with the expansion of Denver International Airport. The NextGen/Metroplex program creates ribbons of concentrated flight paths around the greater Denver metropolitan area. These flight path ribbons will bring concentrated flights, 24/7 one per minute, over residential neighborhoods, parks and schools that have NEVER had extensive aviation noise or pollution in the past. Even homes located many miles from DIA will experience barrages of commercial airplanes continuously flying overhead at low altitudes. Maps made public by the FAA show that Cherry Hills Village and Greenwood Village may be two of several of the communities impacted. The FAA continues to make it difficult, if not impossible, to ascertain the exact location of these ribbons and the elevation of the flights and refuses to provide to the public any meaningful information.

I have recently attended a N.O.I.S.E meeting in Charlotte, North Carolina. My purpose was to listen to speakers from the aviation industry, including the Charlotte airport and the commercial airplane industry. NextGen/Metroplex was implemented in 2016 in Charlotte and has caused a huge uproar in affected neighborhoods. Here is what I learned at this meeting:

- Once implemented no community, other than Phoenix, has been able to stop the implementation of NextGen and Phoenix may have accomplished only a "stay" of execution.
- Complaints from communities where NextGen has been implemented are not taken seriously by either the FAA or the local airport. The complaints are put into a software program that discounts if there are too many complaints from certain households, disregards complaints from neighborhoods that the FAA and/or airport deem "too" far away, and then concludes that so long as there is not an exponential increase in complaints, there is no problem. ("Amazing" how one can manipulate a computer program to get a desired result.)
- Excessive noise is deemed by the FAA to be merely an "annoyance" to neighborhoods, notwithstanding that excessive noise is a serious health issue and decreases the value of homes by 20% or more.
- The FAA is conducting new studies to determine the impact of noise on citizens, but the results are not expected until late 2018, at the earliest. The FAA is not delaying implementation of NextGen pending review of the results of the studies.
- The current head of the FAA committee for the implementation of NextGen is the CEO of Federal Express. I would argue that he has a conflict of interest. The cost savings from fuel, which is one of the stated purposes of NextGen, directly benefits the bottom line of his company.
- The true cost of NextGen will pass to the communities with the misfortune of being beneath these ribbons of flights. The benefits will accrue to the commercial aviation industry and the airports from which they fly. The representative for the commercial airlines stated that the overall benefits to



# CHERRY HILLS VILLAGE RECREATION REIMBURSEMENT RULES

Residents of Cherry Hills Village (primary residence only) who participate in a recreation program, activity, class or event offered by a municipal or special district recreation department, a non-profit, 501(c)(3) youth sports organization or any municipal golf course located within the seven-county Denver metropolitan area (Adams, Arapahoe, Boulder, Broomfield, Denver, Douglas, Jefferson) may be eligible for a partial reimbursement of certain costs from the City of Cherry Hills Village. For purposes of this program, “youth sports organization” shall mean a sports organization whose primary purpose is to provide recreational activities for primary or secondary school students.

## REIMBURSEMENT PROVISIONS

**Each primary household in Cherry Hills Village is eligible for a maximum \$500.00 annual reimbursement when participating in an activity that qualifies for reimbursement.** The amount of reimbursement shall be 50 percent of the cost incurred by the resident; however, reimbursement costs shall not exceed a maximum of \$50.00 per single activity, per resident to include memberships and passes. The purchase of a monthly membership, or multiple use pass is considered a single activity. The amount of reimbursement for an annual membership or pass shall be 50 percent of the cost incurred by the resident; however, reimbursement costs shall not exceed a maximum of \$500.00 annually per household. An annual membership is intended to designate a year-long membership and includes such facilities as Greenwood Athletic and Tennis Club and municipal recreation centers such as South Suburban. Seasonal sporting activities such as soccer, baseball, lacrosse, swimming, hockey, gymnastics, etc., are considered single activities.



## REIMBURSEMENT PROCEDURE

1. Obtain an itemized receipt that includes the participant's name, address, name of agency, name of activity, activity fee(s) and activity date(s). Receipts must be for the year in which they are paid, not the year in which the activity takes place.

**Note:** The following will not be accepted as receipts: bank statements, cancelled checks, non-itemized credit card receipts, handwritten receipts and registration forms. Initiation fees, rentals, tax charged, national dues, merchandise, child care, travel, uniforms and golf carts do not qualify for reimbursement.

2. Complete the Recreation Reimbursement Form, attach all itemized receipts and mail or deliver this information to the Village Center by January 15th for the previous year's reimbursements. **NO EXCEPTIONS.**

**Note:** It is the resident's responsibility to ensure that all recreation reimbursement applications have been received by the City prior to January 15th.

*All of the information above will be required and residency will be verified. It is the obligation of the City staff to ensure against abuse of this program and final authority will rest with the City Manager to suspend or eliminate reimbursement requests determined to be in violation of the terms of this program.*





## **OCTOBER DRUG TAKE BACK WRAP-UP**

The Cherry Hills Village Police Department collected a total of 163 pounds of unwanted, unused or expired prescription medications from residents during the National Take Back Initiative (NTBI) on Saturday, October 28, 2017. Our partnership with the Drug Enforcement Agency provides a viable way to remove excess prescription medications from the citizen's homes as well as offers a possibility to prevent the misuse of prescription medications. The police department appreciates all the residents who participated in this semi-annual event.

If you missed this event, you can dispose of prescription

and non-prescription medications in the lobby of Arapahoe County Sheriff's Office located at 13101 East Broncos Parkway Centennial during normal business hours (7:00 a.m. to 5:30 p.m.). 
You can also dispose of prescription and non-prescription medications at the Littleton Police Department located at 2255 West Berry Ave Littleton. This box is available 24 hours a day.

**T**he City is preparing to complete tree trimming and irrigation work at Quincy Farm this fall and winter. As reported in prior Village Crier issues, the City received a grant this year from Arapahoe County Open Space for projects at Quincy Farm. The \$187,800 received from the County will fund the installation of a new irrigation system for the Farm. This irrigation will water the pastures, gardens, and trees. The City is contributing \$77,200 in matching funds, for a project total of \$265,000. These matching funds are budgeted for design of the irrigation system and work to safely preserve the existing tree canopy.

The work on the trees at Quincy Farm will be completed this fall and winter. There is a conservation easement on the Farm that protects the land in its open, natural state. We also know it is important to our residents to preserve the beauty and

habitat the canopy provides. Therefore, the planned work is to remove invasive species that do not belong on the Farm, and for trimming or removal of high-priority trees or limbs that could be hazardous to visitors.

A map showing the upcoming work on the trees at Quincy Farm is included at left. All removals identified on the map are Russian olives, dead or dying trees, and one tree that poses significant risk of damage to a historic home. Trees will not be trimmed or shaped for cosmetic reasons. All tree work will be performed to assist with the long-term health of trees within the property and to ensure the safety of visitors. There will be an Open House in summer 2018 for the community to enjoy the gardens and future nature trail at the Farm. # SNOW, ICE AND STREET SWEEPING OPERATIONS

The Cherry Hills Village Public Works Department is responsible for snow, ice and sweeping operations of approximately one hundred lane miles of City streets and approximately eight miles of paved trails and sidewalks. The department provides snow removal and sweeping services to all City streets, paved trails and sidewalks on a priority basis.

**It is the department's goal to have all City streets, paved trails and sidewalks maintained within twelve hours after the snow has stopped falling.** This time frame estimate is based on an average snow event of four inches. The department will not maintain residential streets for snow events of less than three inches as determined by staff. Sidewalk/paved trail sweeping is done on an as needed basis. When conditions allow, street sweeping and sidewalk/paved trail sweeping operations directly follow any snow and ice control operation where sand is used. Street and sidewalk/paved trail cleaning is provided for community safety, health, environmental and aesthetic purposes.

The Public Works Department utilizes many resources to determine when and how snow and ice control operations should begin. Use of the National Weather Service, local news television, web and phone based applications and the City's own weather station with a live feed camera are utilized by the Public Works Department

to obtain the most current and accurate weather forecast information.


The City's first priority is to keep primary intersections and collector streets safely maintained to permit emergency vehicles to reach all parts of the City without delay and to facilitate resident traffic on those streets. This priority is on a selective basis where it has been determined by the department that these streets are where traffic movement and resultant safety demands are the greatest and impact sizeable portions of the community. The second priority is to safely maintain all remaining residential streets. The third priority is to safely maintain all remaining paved trails and sidewalks.

Primary intersections and collector streets will be the first to receive snow and ice control maintenance. The length and severity of the weather

event dictates when the department will start snow and ice control maintenance on all remaining secondary streets and all remaining paved trails and sidewalks. Typically this operation begins immediately after the climax of the event and the majority of the snow has stopped accumulating. The City is divided into four sections and snow removal and street sweeping operations are performed on a rotating basis. Each section contains approximately the same street lane miles. This rotation is maintained throughout the winter so that all parts of the City have the same opportunity to be maintained first and no area is always last. Streets are swept in the same priority they are plowed.

The map below illustrates the City limits and the streets maintained by the Cherry Hills Village Public Works department. The red lines show primary intersections and collector streets. These streets and intersections provide emergency vehicle access to all locations of the City during a snowstorm. The blue lines on the map are the streets maintained by the Colorado Department of Transportation. Only during extreme conditions or by the request of the Police Department does the City assist with plowing or sweeping the streets maintained by CDOT.

The Cherry Hills Elementary plow features their dolphin mascot amid a snowy landscape; while the St. Mary’s Academy snow plow is decorated with a festive snowman and holiday tree. The Kent Denver snow plow fits right in with this summer’s superhero blockbuster by featuring a snow plow superhero. Thank you to the art teachers and art class students for all their creativity and commitment to this annual event. It continues to be a great fall project for the school kids that can be viewed by the community whenever the snow flies.

the region and the country are clearly costs that the affected communities should bear for the greater good. In essence the impacted communities are considered collateral damage.

- In Congress the FAA's approval of its budget and thus its existence, has been extended until spring. Now is the time that the FAA needs the support of members of the House and Senate.
- In Charlotte and other communities where NextGen/Metroplex has been implemented, the affected communities were provided little or no information by the FAA as to the location of the routes or the impact on their communities. This

is a pattern of behavior designed to push the agenda forward without meaningful community input.

I learned a great deal more, but there is not enough room for all the information in the Crier.

**Please join me in writing a letter to each of our Senators and elected representatives** (letters are better than emails or phone calls). Noise is a cost of doing business for the aviation industry; it should not be borne by neighborhoods that have never experienced extensive aviation noise in the past. ## COLD WEATHER PET CARE

**C**olorado can experience extreme temperature changes that may present challenges for dog owners. Being familiar with cold weather health hazards can keep your pet safe. Puppies, senior dogs and dogs with certain health problems are more susceptible to colder temperatures.

If a dog is left outside, it must have food, water, and shelter. During colder temperatures, outdoor dogs will burn up to 30% more calories.

Change water daily or use a heated water bowl to prevent freezing. An

appropriate shelter, with clean and dry bedding, is essential to keeping a dog warm when weather conditions become extreme.

Many consider dogs to be members of the family, and family should always have a warm place to feel safe and secure.

When temperatures get too cold, please consider bringing pets indoors.
