## QUINCY FARM AWARDED GRANT *FROM ARAPAHOE COUNTY OPEN SPACE*

**A**rapahoe County Open Space has awarded Cherry Hills Village a \$187,800 grant for the preservation and enhancement of Quincy Farm. As many residents know, this historic property was gifted to the City by resident Catherine H. Anderson. The property and original farmhouse date from the late 1800's, when it began as a working dairy farm. Cat purchased the property with her husband in 1965. She resided there until her recent passing in June of 2016. Cat spent decades running the Platte Valley Pony Club on the farm, teaching children how to ride and care for their horses. Her gift of Quincy Farm allows her legacy to live on, preserving the land for the public to enjoy for generations.

With this new grant money, the City will complete necessary irrigation installation and tree trimming. This will ensure that Quincy Farm retains both its healthy, open pastures and the canopy of trees throughout the property. This preservation work will allow the public to continue to enjoy and appreciate the scenic and historic elements as they walk through the farm along the High Line Canal Trail.

## MAYOR MUSINGS

**I** do not want to be an alarmist, well then again perhaps I do. Thanks to the vigilance of Councilmember Katy Brown, Council learned that the FAA is redesigning the flight paths for both Denver International and Centennial Airports again. The FAA conducted public meetings throughout the Denver Region and assured folks that the new flight paths will be safer, quieter and that residents will experience minimal changes. Instead of planes approaching and leaving from a wide spectrum of flight paths, new technology shall direct them along a select few and relatively narrow flight path; hence the assurance by the FAA that this new concept is quieter. It will be quieter for the region because it will concentrate the noise and disturbance along narrower bands. For those who will be living under the concentrated flight paths however, assurances that it will be quieter are not supported by any demonstrated facts.

This new technology is also designed to handle flights approaching or departing one minute apart, twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week. This will lessen the risk of planes flying into each other's flight paths, causing the near misses that we sometimes see reported in the news. Although no one anticipates that air traffic will be that heavy initially, it is a very real possibility as our population grows and demand for air travel expands.

Many parts of our region are currently subjected to heavy air traffic. Back in 2012, the FAA originally implemented this new technology and redesigned the flights paths, putting Cherry Hills Village directly in arrival and departure paths for both airports. Those changes moved flight paths over parts of our Village that had never been subjected to concentrated air travel.

From the information that was presented by the FAA, it is unclear exactly where the new flight paths will be, but the data that is currently available provides reason to believe that one, if not more, of the concentrated flight paths may be directly over Cherry Hills Village.



Councilor Brown, who serves as our representative on the Centennial Airport Round Table, has been unable to get the FAA to clearly define the impact of these new flight paths on Cherry Hills Village.

Please understand that I am not opposed to aviation. Also, I am sensitive to the NIMBY label, but I feel strongly that it does not apply here.

None of us bought homes knowing that they were in a significant flight path nor next to an airport. In fact, Centennial Airport did not exist when Cherry Hills Village was incorporated. Our efforts to create a small semi-rural residential community that has a high concentration of parks, open space and schools may be severely impacted if the FAA applies its usual metrics of noise impact. This metric averages aircraft noise over twenty-four hours day and night (DNL). Thus, the over flight noise is averaged with the "quiet" between flights.

This is a complex issue with huge impact on our community. The Village is creating a page on the City website which will provide updated information, as we learn it. The webpage will also set forth notice and action items for citizen response. The initial public comment deadline was June 5th; however the Environmental Process will continue to have public input through 2018. The

Village has filed its objections to the proposed flight paths with the FAA.

On another note, I would like to draw attention to the efforts of **The Land Preserve**. It has been instrumental in furthering the unique setting of our community by emphasizing the importance of open space and wildlife.

**September 1st and 17th is the weekend planned for their annual fundraiser.**

This year, in addition to the barn party, they will be conducting a tour of some of our public trails, the jewels in the Village crown. Please keep the weekend open and support the efforts of your fellow residents to maintain the unique setting we all live in for us, our families and all of our feathered and furry friends.

# HIGH LINE CANAL TREE INVENTORY SUMMARY

 HIGH LINE CANAL  
CONSERVANCY

**D**uring the summer of 2016, the High Line Canal Working Group funded a comprehensive tree inventory project. This project identified, mapped and assessed all trees with diameters greater than 6 inches along the High Line Canal corridor. Davey Resource Group was selected to lead the project and they collected data on 23,677 trees throughout the High Line Canal corridor. This data has been instrumental in assessing the health of the tree canopy and will help guide future maintenance and landscaping standards for all jurisdictions involved.

Data analysis completed by the High Line Canal Conservancy shows that the Canal corridor is more diverse than previously thought. There are 97 different species of trees throughout the Canal. Chart 1 below is the top 10 species of trees that make up 86% of the total tree count.


Cottonwood varieties make up 43% of the total canopy of the Canal. The cottonwoods pose challenges for future planning efforts because of their high levels of water consumption and relatively short lifespan. In addition, many of the cottonwoods along the Canal are reaching the end of their natural lifespan of 70 to 120 years.

Using the data, the High Line Canal Conservancy calculated the average tree density for each of the jurisdictions. The density varies greatly by jurisdiction as different parts of the Canal have received water longer than others. The northern reaches of the Canal have not held water in over a decade, which has dramatically changed the canopy composition. South Suburban Parks and Recreation District and the City of Cherry Hills Village have the greatest density of trees along the Canal, where it is between 440 trees per mile to 601 trees per mile. Chart 2 at the top of the next column indicates the total number of trees by jurisdiction.

# KENT DENVER HONORS ITS PAST AND CELEBRATES A BRIGHT FUTURE DURING GROUND-BREAKING FOR ITS NEW MIDDLE SCHOOL BUILDING

**O**n April 25, Kent Denver School bid farewell to the longstanding Andrews D. Black Building—known affectionately as the sixth-grade hub by current Middle School students, faculty and staff—and broke ground for a new Middle School building that is scheduled to open in spring 2018.

“By this time next year, our sixth-seventh-and eighth-grade students will be preparing to move in a new, state-of-the-art Middle School that is approximately 1.5 times larger than our current buildings,” said Jerry Walker, Kent Denver’s Associate Head of School and lead for campus enhancement projects.

The new building is the appropriate setting for the innovative, exceptional teaching that defines a Kent Denver education. From flexible, larger classrooms, to a Middle School Commons, Resource Center and patio, to large windows that fill the building with natural light, Kent Denver’s new, LEED-certified Middle School will provide ample space for active learning, quiet reflection and intentional connection to the outdoors.

In addition, a designated entrance and restricted access to classrooms in the new building provide enhanced security for our

students and faculty throughout the day.

A larger Middle School building doesn’t foreshadow more students, however. Kent Denver currently enrolls approximately 700 students, and there are no plans to grow.

“We evaluated this issue carefully. We believe—and our trustees agree—that our small faculty-to-student ratio preserves the close relationships that are unique to a Kent Denver education,” Walker added.

Those familiar with Kent Denver School’s history know The Kent School for Girls and Denver Country Day, a boys’ school, merged in 1974.

Among the attendees at the April 25 groundbreaking were several Denver Country Day alumni. The Andrews D. Black Building held special meaning for them as it was named after Denver Country Day’s co-founder and first headmaster.

“I remember walking through the open corridors of this building when I was a senior,” said Donald Delmendo DCD '74. “I was able to relive moments from my seventh grade to that point in time. It dawned on me that I started from a totally different culture, where academics were secondary and manual labor was our major means of support. I was swept away from the La Alma Lincoln Park neighborhood to a world where college was an automatic expectation placed on me, as well as all students of this preparatory school.”

After the Andrews D. Black Building Celebration, several trustees joined school leaders in breaking ground for our Middle School.

“Today we were pleased to both honor the alumni, teachers and administrators who created the strong, enduring foundation our school stands upon and join them in welcoming the beginning of an exciting new era at Kent Denver,” said Dr. Rand Harrington, Head of School.
