POLICE COMMANDER RECOGNIZED FOR 35 YEARS OF SERVICE

At the City Council meeting on January 17th, Police Chief Michelle Tovrea presented Commander Patrick Weathers with a commemorative bust of an eagle for his 35 years of outstanding service for the City of Cherry Hills Village. Commander Weathers joined the Cherry Hills Village Police Department as a Police Officer on December 16, 1981. He is the longest serving employee the City has ever had. Chief Tovrea stated "Our Department and City has benefited from Pat's expertise. Over the course of his career he has served in many capacities from Officer, Motor Officer, Detective, Sergeant and finally Commander". She noted that each year she writes his performance evaluation it is hard to come up with new adjectives to describe the dedication and commitment he has demonstrated over the past 35 years. She has used terms like "loyalty, community, integrity

and adaptability". The expectations of the Cherry Hills Village Police Department are Service, Procedural Justice and Accountability and the City was honored to recognize Commander Weathers on behalf of the residents of the City and the Police Department for the assistance he has provided in pursuit of those principals.

Our Department and City has benefited from Pat's expertise. Over the course of his career he has served in many capacities from Officer, Motor Officer, Detective, Sergeant and finally Commander.

After thanking Chief Tovrea and City Council, Commander Weathers noted that it has been a rewarding experience to work in the City of Cherry Hills Village. He explained his

DENVER WATER INCREASE

Denver Water announced a rate increase at the end of 2016. According to the Denver Board of Water Commissioners when they adopted the rate change, the majority of Denver Water users will likely only see a small increase in their monthly bills if they use water the same as they did in 2016. The increase will be used to fund essential repairs and upgrades to Denver Water's system beginning April 1, 2017.

There are 162 major projects that were identified in Denver Water's capital plan that ranged from replacing aging pipes and failing underground storage tanks to upgrading water treatment facilities, warehouses and mechanical shops.

In 2016, the board adopted a new rate structure that shifts rate revenue from a heavy reliance on water use toward a more fixed fee. To continue that shift, the fixed monthly charge, which is tied to the user's meter size, is increasing slightly for a majority of residential customers in 2017. Most Denver Water customers have a $\frac{3}{4}$ inch meter and to help offset the increased fixed monthly charge, the tiered rate per 1,000 gallons will decrease for these customers.

To keep water affordable, particularly for essential indoor water use, and to continue sending a conservation message, Denver Water's rate structure includes a three-tiered charge for water use. This structure allows water used for drinking, cooking and sanitation to be charged at a lower rate, while water used for outdoor watering is charged at a higher rate. Individual water bills will depend on how much water a customer uses and whether the customer lives in

Denver or is served by one of 66 suburban distributors under contract with Denver Water.

The City of Cherry Hills Village has a total service agreement with Denver Water. Under total service agreements, Denver Water owns the water system and is responsible for its operation, maintenance and replacement.

Denver Water reads each individual customer's meter and bills each customer at the established "Total Service" rate.

60% of the Total Service customers use 115,000 gallons or less per year for a total average annual bill of \$637 in 2016. The 2017 anticipated average annual bill will be \$678 for an increase of approximately \$41 per year.

Customers will see more information about the increased 2017 rates on their bills or they can visit denverwater.org/AboutUs/Distributors or denverwater.org/BillingRates/RatesCharges to either find out where your residence fits in on the Denver Water map or to learn more about the tiered rate structure.

FEBRUARY 2017 MAYOR MUSINGS

Many residents are very up to date on all that is happening at City Hall, but a majority of our citizens keep tabs on a "need to know" basis only.

Thus, I believe there are three "need to know" items out there.

First, the City is going forward with issuing Certificates of Participation (COPs) for the purposes of funding (i) the acquisition and construction of a new Public Works facility in Sheridan, (ii) floodplain mitigation and redevelopment pertaining to the old Public Works facility, City administration building, and Meade Park, including Hutto Commons and (iii) construction of a new City Administration building and related improvements including parking. Obviously this is a much truncated and simple summary of very complex project(s), but for those for whom this is "news", it hopefully either suffices or causes further exploration on the City of Cherry Hills Village website.

Second, both the 2016 Council and the 2017 Council requested that residents be given an opportunity to purchase the COPs. If you are interested in purchasing any of the COPs, please contact our Finance Director, Karen Proctor, at 303-783-2723. I am not giving any opinion as to whether anyone should or should not purchase the COPs, this is for information purposes only.

Third, the COPs will not increase real property taxes and the progress on the project(s) including design will be on the City website, as well as dates and times for public meetings regarding the project(s). The goal is to conform to the Master Plan, which recommended moving the Public Works facility, redevelopment of Meade Park and construction of a new City Administration building.

If all of the above is news it may cause some consternation that the Village, that has been very cautious in the past, is now moving to do a great deal, quickly. That would be a correct observation. Public comment, surveys and consultants over the past ten years can provide a framework for action, but all of those efforts, time and money are wasted if ignored. Neither interest rates nor construction costs are falling. Please look at updates on the Village website, if you are interested. Keeping a semi-rural feel of the Village remains a priority.

SHARING A COMMON GROUND WITH COYOTES

Cherry Hills Village has mature riparian habitats throughout the City. There is the Highline canal, numerous ponds, and extensively wooded areas both in private yards and also in common areas. These spaces support healthy coyote populations.

JANUARY AND FEBRUARY ARE THE COYOTE BREEDING MONTHS so sightings are very common. They are focused on pairing up with a mate, finding a good location for a den, and giving birth to their offspring. During this time, they may become less tolerant and view larger dogs as competition for mates or territory. Unfortunately, coyotes will also take our smaller dogs and cats as a food source.
