

CITY OF CHERRY HILLS VILLAGE **CODE MODERNIZATION PROJECT**

The City of Cherry Hills Village is beginning the process of modernizing and updating the Zoning, Subdivision, Building, and Stormwater Code to address a variety of issues and opportunities. The intent of the Code modernization is not to rewrite or alter the substantive content of the Code, but rather to simplify and streamline City regulations and processes in accordance with current federal and state law. The City has allocated 2018 funds for this project in order to restructure and streamline the following Chapters of the Municipal Code:

- ▶ Chapter 16 – ZONING
- ▶ Chapter 17 – SUBDIVISION
- ▶ Chapter 18 – BUILDING REGULATIONS
- ▶ Chapter 19 – STORMWATER QUALITY AND CONTROL

This update will reflect the Village's unique character as well as provide clear processes, specified objectives and policies, and conformance with the Master Plan. A few of the revisions and clarifications include:

- Bringing the Code up to current federal and state laws
- Establishing a Zoning Matrix versus a cumulative zoning (referencing previous zoning districts)
- Ensuring conformance with the 2008 Master Plan document to support the goals and objectives of the City. The City wishes to amend the zoning and subdivision chapters of the Code to more closely align the Code with the strategic goals and objectives outlined in Master Plan, including but not limited to:
 - Preserving the City's semi-rural character, views and open feel
 - Preserving and enhancing open space, trails, parks, and wildlife corridors
 - Maintaining the existing land use and development patterns
 - Enhancing natural stormwater management and capacity of lands and waterways to maximize stormwater quality and minimize personal and property damage and the threat of erosion
 - Improving efficiencies in utilities and infrastructure within the Village while balancing the aesthetics of the Village

Notify Me allows you to customize the types of notifications you receive from the City so you only receive the emails that are most important to you. Notify Me is also the fastest way for City staff to notify residents of important City information, events and emergency alerts.

To sign up for Notify Me, you can visit the City's website at www.cherryhillsvillage.com. Click the link in the middle of the home page that says "Email Notifications." Once you click the link, you can enter your email address and select any type of notification you would like to receive via email (the website can send text messages too).

A stakeholder group will be formed in the next couple months in order to work with the City's consultant in diving into the modernization of the various chapters. Ultimately, the City will have a draft document to be presented at public hearings at the Planning and Zoning Commission and the City Council.

ACCEPTABLE ITEMS

- ▶ Large boxes, trash and refuse
- ▶ Appliances (i.e. microwaves, washers, dryers)
- ▶ Electronics (i.e. laptops, desktops, monitors)
- ▶ Televisions (up to 19")
- ▶ Scrap metal
- ▶ Paint

ITEMS THAT WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED

- ▶ Refrigerators or any appliance that has refrigerants
- ▶ Hazardous materials/chemicals (i.e. fuel, oil, antifreeze)
- ▶ Tires

Televisions over 19" cannot be recycled during the electronics collection, but they can be thrown away in the large dumpsters the City will have available during the event.



The Cherry Hills Village Art Commission is pleased to report the accession of a new sculpture to the City's permanent collection. Thanks to the generosity of the late Catherine Anderson, we have acquired a stunning untitled work by noted Colorado artist Robert Mangold. The donation of the sculpture by the Estate of Catherine Anderson was formally accepted by the City at the February 6th Council meeting.

The iron sculpture, located on the south lawn of Quincy Farm, stands ten feet tall and resembles a minimalist horse hock. The gentle lines, curves, and abstraction of Mangold's work stand in perfect contrast to the semi-rural setting of Quincy Farm and recall the history of the Farm as a pony and riding club.

We are very fortunate to have acquired a piece by such an influential and acclaimed local artist. Mangold has lived in Colorado since the early 1960s and taught sculpture locally for 30 years. A staple of Colorado sculpture for over fifty years, Mangold has been the focus of numerous one man exhibitions and his work can be found throughout collections locally, nationally, and internationally.

We look forward to Villagers being able to enjoy this important piece and its setting once Quincy Farm opens to the public. An Open House is being planned for late summer 2018.

As promised last month I will address the **Saga of South Suburban**. The Village has seventeen boxes of files documenting the exclusion of the Village from the South Suburban Recreation District.

The District was formed in 1959. It encompassed a large portion of cities on the western side of Arapahoe County and a portion of unincorporated Arapahoe County. It was designed to fund recreational facilities, parks and trails for the citizens living within the District using its taxing authority. Cherry Hills Village did not vote to be included in the District. Inclusion was automatic, unless citizens voted to opt out (the City of Greenwood Village opted out).

In the 1950s and 60s, Cherry Hills Village was very different than it is now. The Village had neither a City Manager nor employees dedicated to parks. The number of homes in the Village (the tax base) was small. As a result, the Council felt it made sense to become part of a larger entity for both funding and maintenance purposes.

Over the next few years, several citizens donated land for parks and the Village continued to dedicate trails and/or formalize trail easements. South Suburban required that all land donated for parks be donated to the District (this becomes significant later). From my review of correspondence, things began to go sideways within five or six years of inception of the District. Every single Mayor of the Village from the early 1960s onward sent letters to the District requesting maintenance of the trails and development of land that had been designated as parks. It appears to have been a constant battle. Correspondence from the District stated that the District did not have the funds to perform most of the work requested. One Mayor was told that the trail maintenance crews are given priorities and the trails in Cherry Hills Village were **NOT** a priority.

I can attest to the horrible state of our trails. In the early 1990s, Cherry Hills Village had arranged a meeting between a representative of the District and a group of concerned citizens including the Parks and Trails Committee. I was asked to attend



as an unofficial representative of the equestrian community. The gist of the meeting was a request by Parks and Trails that weeds and brush be removed from the trails. The trails were becoming unpassable on a horse so you can imagine how bad they were for people on foot. I will paraphrase the response, "Your residents have a lot of money so they can pay for it themselves."

Technically the Village had no legal right to independently maintain the parks or trails. It would have to go to the District for consent and the District was under no obligation to give consent, even if the Village agreed to pay.

By 2001, the situation had become untenable. Citizens were upset with the Mayor and City Council about the lack of maintenance of trails and the quality of our parks. Council began to look at the numbers underlying the Village's inclusion in the District. The District had rapidly grown into an area with 157,000 residents, including areas in Douglas County. The Village was a total of 6,000 people, but due to the increase in home values, was carrying three times the per resident financial contribution to the District. The Council looked at the fees charged to members of the District versus the fees charged to users outside of the District. For example, if you used the pool as a non-resident, the cost was \$5.00. As a resident, the cost was \$3.75 so the savings was \$1.25. For tennis and use of the ice arena, residents saved \$1.00 and \$1.50 respectively. There was a savings of \$5.00 per class for residents over non-residents for basket weaving (I am not making this up).

Our then Mayor, Jeff Welborn, met with South Suburban representatives to discuss whether issues could be amicably resolved. He suggested that these issues could be resolved if (i) the District allocated an agreed upon sum to Cherry Hills Village for parks and trails or (ii) the District appointed a representative from Cherry Hills Village to its board or (iii) the District capped the mill levy that Cherry Hills Village residents were paying. All suggestions were met with a resounding no. He was told, "We don't have any more time to talk now, you have to leave." And he did.

Exclusion from the District went to a vote to our citizens. The ballot measure included a provision to have the previously allocated mill levy for the Village used for

maintenance of parks and trails, acquisition of open space and reimbursement of fees incurred by Cherry Hills Village residents using qualifying public recreational facilities. The vote passed and South Suburban sued. The Village won the right to withdraw, but the court determined that Cherry Hills Village had to pay South Suburban for the land donated as parks and for capital improvements installed by South Suburban. The cost attributable to capital improvements was negligible, but the value of the donated land was substantial and the court created a long term obligation for the Village to pay for the land. This was particularly galling because, but for the creation of the District, this land would have been donated or acquired by the Village. Many Cherry Hills Village residents were angry that the payment to South Suburban had not been anticipated and disclosed prior to the vote on the ballot measure. We will soon be at the end of the South Suburban Saga as the last installment to the District is due in 2019.

Was withdrawal from South Suburban the right thing to do? **Yes, for the following two reasons.**

1. The Village was incorporated in order to control its own destiny. Abdicating the control of that which we value the most, our open space, trails and parks, to a governmental entity that cared little or nothing for Cherry Hills Village and its residents, was a terrible mistake. One that only became apparent with hindsight.

2. The financial cost to our residents would have been substantial with little or no corresponding benefit had the Village remained part of the District. When Cherry Hills Village withdrew, the mill levy was 1.021 and has stayed at that rate. That equates to approximately \$1,021.00 per annum per \$1,000,000.00 of assessed home value. Had the Village not withdrawn each homeowner would now see a South Suburban mill levy of 8.496 on their most recent tax statement from Arapahoe County. This equates to \$8,496.00 per annum per \$1,000,000.00 of assessed home value; a difference of \$7,475.00 per year that residents do not have to pay because of the exclusion. For homes valued higher or lower than \$1,000,000.00, you can do the math. If you feel guilty about not putting the tens of thousands of dollars you have, and will save over the next year, towards public recreation, I have lots of suggestions where it can be donated and used to great benefit. Just call me.

THE HIGH LINE CANAL

The High Line Canal Conservancy has launched the second phase of significant planning for the High Line Canal. This multi-jurisdictional planning initiative follows on the heels of the completion of the Community Vision Plan in early 2017. The nationally recognized planning team includes Denver-based Livable Cities Studio led by Meredith Wenskoski, and Agency Landscape + Planning along with Sasaki Associates out of Boston, led by Gina Ford. The team will focus on developing a Framework Plan, which is anticipated to be complete in the fall of 2018 and will result in a multi-year implementation plan. The Community Vision Plan includes complete plans for signage and wayfinding, as well as landscape guidelines for all 71 miles.

“Cities across the country are grappling with how to deal with 20th century infrastructure. The High Line Canal Framework Plan will advance the community-driven vision into tangible physical ideas that will become a regional treasure and a national model of best practices.” - Gina Ford, Agency, Landscape + Planning

The Conservancy's unprecedented community outreach effort in 2016, which engaged over 3500 people, led to an inspired long-term Community Vision for the High Line Canal that will be used as inspiration to develop the Framework Plan for the entire 71-mile system. The community-driven plan, endorsed by Denver Water and 10 governmental jurisdictions along the 71 miles, outlines a set of guiding principles - that the Canal remain a *natural, connected and continuous, varied, managed and enhanced resource for the region*.

Guided by these principles, the final Framework Plan will further ensure the Canal reaches its greatest potential as an environmental, recreational, social, historic and economic asset. The plan will focus on:

- Additional open space/parks and trailheads with user amenities
- Canal branded directional and interpretive signage

- Crossing safety and trail gap design solutions
- Environmental guidelines for landscape, tree planning and stormwater
- Health and education programs for increased access and use
- Long-term permanent protection and maintenance

Continued support and engagement from the citizens of the region is vital to ensure the future of the Canal is reflective of the public vision.

“Throughout this next phase of planning for the High Line Canal, we have an incredible opportunity to develop creative planning and design solutions that are community-specific, but reflective of the Community Vision Plan for all 71 miles of the Canal. One of the keys to success will be inclusive and authentic engagement among all the jurisdictions.” – Meredith Wenskoski, Livable Cities Studio.

2018 SPRING DRUG TAKE BACK

On April 28, 2018 from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. the Cherry Hills Police Department and the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) will provide the public another opportunity to dispose of potentially dangerous expired, unused, and unwanted prescription drugs. Bring your medications for disposal to the Cherry Hills Police Department at 2460 E. Quincy Ave. The service is free and anonymous, no questions asked.

In 2017, Cherry Hills Village residents turned in almost 200 pounds of prescription drugs during the Prescription Drug Take Back days facilitated by the Cherry Hills Village Police Department. It is important to remember that the following items are not accepted during these take back events. The items are as follows:

- **Needles & Sharps**
- **Mercury (thermometers)**
- **Oxygen Containers**
- **Chemotherapy/Radioactive Substances**
- **Pressurized Canisters**
- **Illicit Drugs**

This initiative addresses a vital public safety and public health issue. Medicines that languish in home cabinets are highly susceptible to diversion, misuse, and abuse. Rates of prescription drug abuse in the U.S. are alarmingly high, as are the number of accidental poisonings and overdoses due to these drugs. Studies show that a majority of abused prescription drugs are obtained from family and friends, including from the home medicine cabinet. In addition, Americans are now advised that their usual methods for disposing of unused medicines—flushing them down the toilet or throwing them in the trash—both pose potential safety and health hazards.

REMINDER REMINDER REMINDER INTERACTIVE ONLINE PARKS AND TRAILS MAP AVAILABLE AND READY TO USE!

The City is sending out a reminder to users of the Cherry Hills Village Parks, Trails and Open Space that the Parks and Trail Map is live and ready to be accessed! The map was created to provide general reference to public trails, parks and recreation amenities located within the City. The information contained in the map was collected from various outside sources and data. Although the City has taken every reasonable effort to ensure the accuracy of the information, there may be omissions or errors, including but not limited to accuracy of property lines, easements, etc. We welcome any suggestions or correction from users.

FEATURES OF THE ONLINE MAP THAT ARE AVAILABLE TO THE PUBLIC INCLUDE:

visuals of all parks, trails and open space, streets, trail heads, parking, bridges, streams, lakes, subdivisions, Arapahoe County Assessor parcels and aerial imagery of the entire City. The map also contains a wildlife spotting feature that allows users to identify unique and interesting sightings. Recommended sightings include: birds of prey, coyotes, foxes, deer, amphibians, endangered species, etc.

Follow the instructions below to use the wildlife spotting feature:

WILDLIFE SPOTTING FEATURE

1. Access the map at www.cherryhillsvillage.com/parkstrailsmap or by scanning the QR code found on City signage.
2. Click the  button to use the GPS on your device to locate yourself on the map.
3. After locating yourself, click the  button to bring up the wildlife spotting feature.
4. Once open, click **New Feature** and select the location on the map where you would like to place the wildlife spotting report.
5. Next simply fill in any relevant notes and click **Choose File** to add a photograph.
6. Once done, click the **Close** button. You can also click the **Delete** button if you do not want to submit your report.
7. Once you have clicked **Close**, the report will be submitted to City staff for review.

Once the City staff has reviewed and approved your report, it will be visible to all users on the map!

Also don't forget to download a QR code scanner for your phone or tablet. Go to any application purchasing program and download today. Once you are equipped with the application you can scan the QR code and start accessing the Parks and Trails Map!
