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UPDATE

ON CONSTRUCTION IN JOHN MEADE PARK

Construction is underway in John Meade Park! As a first step, the ponds and wetlands were dewatered to prepare for work. (Fish were relocated to another city pond.) The wetlands were then cleared of cattails, and dredging of the upstream pond has now begun. All old play equipment has been demolished and hauled away. In the next few weeks, the contractor (HPM, Inc.) will continue to dredge the ponds and begin installation of the boardwalk through the wetlands and the fishing piers in each pond.

For weekly updates on the construction by the park mascot, Max the Muskrat, follow the City of Cherry Hills Village on Facebook or NextDoor. The park is expected to be completed by September 2020. 

RECEIVES AWARD FOR 2019 BUDGET

The City of Cherry Hills Village was awarded the Distinguished Budget Presentation Award for the 2019 budget by the Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA) in August.

“Cherry Hills Village is one of over 1,600 participants in the Budget Awards Program, in which award recipients have pioneered efforts to improve the quality of budgeting and provide an excellent example for other governments throughout North America.”



This award is the highest form of recognition in governmental accounting and its attainment is a significant achievement for the City. The City received a score of outstanding for the structure of the financial policies and the understandability and usability of the document by one reviewer; while another reviewer commented “overall a very well put together document”.

The Finance Department for the City, worked on the budget document for over 6 months following a strict set of guidelines. These guidelines determine how well the budget serves as a policy document, financial plan, operations guide and communications device for the residents. Once the budget document was submitted, a panel of independent reviewers completed an examination to determine if the document met the requirements. The budget document must be rated “proficient” in all four categories, along with fourteen mandatory criteria within those categories, in order to receive the award. 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MAYOR'S REPORT

This month a report on our ranking as the safest city in Colorado, stargazing at Quincy Farm, reorganization of our Municipal Code, and progress on the Bellevue medians.

Public Safety

An analysis of FBI statistics by the website Security Baron ranks Cherry Hills Village as the safest city in Colorado. The ratings are based on the number of violent crimes, the number of property crimes, the ratio of citizens to police officers, and a half-dozen other factors. <https://securitybaron.com/safe-cities/colorado/>. Close behind the Village in the rankings are Louisville, Frederick, Dacono and Eaton, municipalities not adjacent to Denver and its urban challenges. Thank you and congratulations to the entire Cherry Hills Police Department for their hard work, achievements, and well-deserved recognition.

Village police are investigating recent thefts of mail from residential mail boxes. To avoid mail theft, pick up delivered mail promptly, post bill payments and other mail at the post office or central collection sites, and consider purchasing a locking mailbox. And always lock your cars and arm your home security system.

A few Village neighborhood homeowner associations have installed and maintain cameras to record vehicles and license plate numbers. Video recordings could provide valuable assistance to police when investigating and apprehending criminals. The Village encourages the installation and use of these private camera systems. If cameras are desired to be installed within the City right-of-way, then a permit is required from the Public Works Department and they will provide guidance to homeowner associations in locating equipment.


Stargazing at Quincy Farm

Friday October 4th was a special night at Quincy Farm. Master stargazer (and Kent Denver High School physics teacher) Evan Gaffney shared his knowledge of the cosmos. Mr. Gaffney turned Kent Denver School's telescope to the night sky and amazed assembled junior and adult stargazers with Saturn, its rings and newly discovered moons; Jupiter and its super storm; planetary nebulae; superclusters; binary stars and amazing surface features of a waxing moon. For the finale Mr. Gaffney explained how the Andromeda Galaxy is hurtling towards our Milky Way Galaxy and the likely result that could occur when they collide in a few billion years. Thank you to the Cherry Hills Land Preserve for organizing and hosting the sold-out and extraordinary event. And thank you to Kent Denver School for all its support.

Quincy Farm is a 17.55 acre property on Quincy Avenue that is bisected by the High Line Canal. The property was given to the Village by Catherine Anderson, subject to a conservation easement that requires farm property on the west side of the High Line Canal to be "managed primarily as a natural area with limited public access" and used only for agricultural, preservation, and scheduled educational events such as the stargazing, bee keeping, and horticulture. Watch for more events coming to Quincy Farm.

Bellevue Medians

Greenwood Village recently allocated about \$2 million to pay for improvements to ten Bellevue Avenue medians shared with Cherry Hills Village from South Quebec Street to University Boulevard. On October 2, 2019 Cherry Hills Village signed an agreement with Greenwood to contribute not more than \$60,000 annually for the next five years to irrigate and help maintain the new plantings.



The medians were constructed when the Colorado Department of Transportation (CDOT) widened Bellevue Avenue in the early 1980s. As the owner of the state highway, CDOT was (and is) responsible for irrigation and maintenance of the medians. Facing revenue restrictions and other road construction and repair priorities, CDOT stopped maintaining the medians. Following discussions with CDOT, Greenwood Village recently agreed to assume responsibility for upgrading and maintaining the medians, and Cherry Hills Village agreed to contribute money for irrigation and ordinary maintenance. Construction should be completed in 2020.

Development Code Modernization Project

In October the Council voted to implement a wholesale reorganization of Chapters 16, 17, 19 and 20 of the Village Municipal Code. These land development chapters regulate all construction and uses of real property, including signs, lighting, fences, walls, wireless communication, setbacks, parking, height restrictions, and floor area ratios. The project (1) reorganized the code into intuitive and logical order, (2) adopted consistent vocabulary and clarifying standards, (3) eliminated internal inconsistencies, (4) refined and deleted definitions, and (5) clarified and streamlined application and review procedures. The Village's Code effectively preserved and enhanced the semi-rural character of the Village, and the modernization project has produced clear, understandable, and much improved zoning regulations that will enhance property values and secure protection of private property for future generations.

Cherry Hills Land Preserves **HOSTS STAR GAZING AND A BIRD WALK AT QUINCY FARM**

A crowd of almost forty kids and adults spent the evening at Quincy Farm with Evan Gaffney, astronomy and physics teacher at Kent Denver School, for a look up at the stars on Friday, October 4th. Mr. Gaffney brought a high-powered telescope which allowed for views of stars and other celestial bodies over 100,000 light years away. After having to postpone the originally scheduled event on September 27th due to cloudy

skies, the group was rewarded with a clear night and not a cloud to be seen. Hot chocolate and treats were enjoyed as everyone had plenty of opportunities to observe different stars, moons and galaxies through the telescope.

On October 12th, Quincy Farm hosted a Bird Walk. Volunteers from *Denver Audubon Society* led the trail walk through the west area of the Farm. Attendees discussed migration habits, non-migrating birds, and the Great Horned Owl, a resident in the woods at the Farm. The group then followed the canal to the pond at Quincy Farm where they observed a Great Blue Heron, ducks, and other birds. Both events were hosted by Cherry Hills Land Preserve, a Village non-profit dedicated to preserving open lands and inspiring land stewardship through education.

Holiday Season

S A F E T Y T I P S

The Holiday Season is a special time of year, and often this is also a time when busy people can become vulnerable to theft and other holiday crime. The Cherry Hills Village Police Department hopes that the following tips will assist in keeping everyone safe during the upcoming Holiday Season. You can never be too careful, too prepared or too aware.

AT HOME

- **Keep your garage door** closed and locked.
- **Lock all outside doors and windows** before you leave your home.
- **Never leave your keys** under doormats, in flower pots, mailboxes or any other “secret” hiding places. Thieves know where to look for hidden keys.
- **An alarm system is excellent** for home security. If you own an alarm system, make sure it is activated. Also, provide the alarm company with an emergency contact.
- **Indoor and outdoor lights** should be on automatic timers while you are away.
- **If you are away for an extended period of time**, arrange for someone to shovel your driveway so it appears that someone is at home.
- **Large displays of holiday gifts** should not be visible through the windows and doors of your home.
- **During your vacation**, do not have daily deliveries (such as mail, newspapers or flyers, and packages) pile up while you

are away. Have the Post Office hold your mail or arrange for someone to empty your mailbox and pick up your newspapers.

- **If you are having any services performed while you are gone** (such as housekeeping or landscaping), make sure they secure your residence when they are finished.
- **Have a responsible person** check on your home frequently during your vacation.
- **Be cautious of individuals going door-to-door** asking for donations for charitable causes as it is a common scam used by criminals.

SHOPPING

- **Shop during day time hours whenever possible.** If you must shop at night, go with a friend or a family member. If you are shopping alone during the evening hours, you can ask mall or store security for an escort to your vehicle.
- **Avoid wearing expensive jewelry.**
- **Even though you are rushed** and thinking about a thousand things, stay alert to your surroundings.
- **Avoid carrying large amounts of cash.**
- **Keep cash, credit cards or wallet** in your front pocket.
- **Notify the credit card company immediately** if your credit card is lost, stolen or misused.
- **Be extra careful if you do carry a purse.** They are prime targets of criminals in crowded shopping areas.
- **Avoid overloading yourself with packages.** It is important to have clear visibility and freedom of motion to avoid mishaps.
- **Beware of strangers approaching you for any reason.** At this time of year, “con-artists” may try various methods of distracting you with the intention of taking your money or other belongings.

HOUSEWATCH PROGRAM

The Cherry Hills Village Police Department offers a housewatch program for all residents. It is a community program that allows residents to request additional police patrol of their unoccupied residential property when they are on vacation or any other absence of the residence. To request this additional housewatch patrol, you can contact the Police Department at (303) 761-8711 during normal office hours (8:00-4:30 p.m.) and provide the following information:

1. Name, address and telephone number
2. Dates of departure and return
3. Names and telephone numbers of housesitter and emergency contacts
4. Specific information regarding your residence, such as persons who may be visiting the residence, your alarm company, vehicles that will be parked at the residence, and animals at the residence
5. Any other information that will assist officers in monitoring your property

The mission of the Cherry Hills Village Public Works Department is to provide high quality, streets, infrastructure, parks, and open space for all residents. The Department strives to be stewards of the environment and be fiscally responsible in all aspects of its operations. The Cherry Hills Village Department of Public Works is comprised of 2 main divisions (Parks and Streets) with 12 full-time, 2 part-time, and 6 seasonal employees who possess special skills and knowledge acquired through education, training and experience to meet the public's needs. Some of the many responsibilities of the Department include:

- Maintain 50 miles of streets (100 lane miles)
- Maintain 26 miles of bridle trails, 55 acres of open space and park land
- Stormwater management
- Operate 36,000 feet of sanitary sewer lines
- Oversee all City facility maintenance and repairs
- Plan and manage recreation special events
- Administer the Recreation Reimbursement Program
- Manage the household hazardous waste program and Spring Clean-Up
- Right-of-way construction permitting
- Capital construction management
- Snow removal

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

VILLAGE TRAIL SIGNING PROJECT NEAR COMPLETION

The Village Trail Signing Project is almost complete thanks to many hours and efforts put forth by Fred Wolfe, Vice Chair of the Parks, Trails, and Recreation Commission, who was the mastermind behind this project. Cherry Hills Village staff has nearly all of the new signs and bollards installed, with a few exceptions around the John Meade Park construction area.



The Village Trail meanders through Cherry Hills Village, connecting points of interests in the village such as the High Line Canal, Quincy Farm, the Village Center, and John Meade Park, to name a few. The Village Trail signing project consists of 45 newly designed and easily understood signs (unlike the old signs). The total distance of the Village Trail is 5.85 miles. Two miles are on the High Line Canal Trail. The whole Village Trail takes approximately 2 hours to walk according to Vice Chair Wolfe.

What a perfect time to get out and explore our wonderful trails in the Village and take in the changing colors that fall brings.
