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## CHERRY HILLS VILLAGE POLICE DEPARTMENT EARNS STATE ACCREDITATION

The Cherry Hills Village Police Department has received accreditation from its peers by earning the PROFESSIONAL COMPLIANCE AWARD, which recognizes outstanding police and sheriff's departments throughout Colorado based on 186 established professional standards. Broomfield Police Chief Gary Creager, President of the Colorado Association of Chiefs of Police (CACP), presented the award to Chief Michelle Tovrea during the August 20, 2019 Cherry Hills Village City Council meeting. Chief Creager stated, “The Cherry Hills Village Police Department demonstrated professionalism and adherence to the highest standards of law enforcement and service to its citizens”. Standards such as ethics, organization, crime prevention, operations, and others were verified by an on-site assessment and the Cherry Hills Village Police Department met or exceeded the established standards. The accreditation program is sanctioned by CACP and the County Sheriff's of Colorado, which represents all local and county law enforcement in Colorado. Chief Creager also presented Chief Tovrea with the Law Enforcement Executive Certification stating, “the certification demonstrates Chief Tovrea's professionalism, executive growth and

# Fall Garden Clean-up

**W**ith the days growing shorter and cooler, it is easy to feel you've earned a break from your yard and garden chores. Fall is the ideal time to get your landscape ready for its winter rest and for beautiful blooms and a green lawn next spring. Get out your gardening gloves and we'll talk about the things you can do this fall in your garden.

**LEAVES** – need I say more? Those leaves that shaded your house and patio over the summer are now scattered across the lawn and garden. If there aren't many (10-20% lawn covered), you can mulch the leaves with your mower and leave them to provide helpful organic nutrients. You can also add them as needed "brown" material to your compost pile or you can use them to mulch your roses. Before you bag leaves to put them out with the garbage, check with your local municipality to find out if there are opportunities for composting.

In your vegetable garden, pull up dead plants and add them to the compost pile. (Dispose of diseased plants; don't add them to compost.) Before the first hard frost, harvest any remaining green tomatoes and store them indoors in newspaper or paper bags until they ripen. Freeze, can or dehydrate any other goodies left in your garden to bring a taste of summer into your winter.

Clean up your flower beds and pots. Pull up and compost any annuals. (Same rule applies, dispose of diseased plants.) For perennials, cut them back if you prefer a neat, tidy bed. You can also leave the plants standing until next spring. Leaving the plants allows them to funnel winter moisture to the soil and to protect the plant crown from drying winter winds. Seed heads also provide birds with scarce winter food. Mulch roses with those leaves from your lawn when overnight temperatures stay in the twenties for several nights. Dig up any summer flowering bulbs and corms like gladiolas, cannas and dahlias after the foliage has died back. Store in a cool, dry place until next spring. For a dazzling spring floral display, plant bulbs and corms -- crocus, tulips, daffodils, iris and many more -- before the ground freezes.

Fall is a great time for a second aeration for your lawn especially in any trouble areas you noticed during the summer. If you haven't already, give your bluegrass lawn some high-nitrogen fertilizer for an early green up next spring.

Any recently planted (in the last two or three years), thin-barked trees should be wrapped to protect trunks from sun scald and frost cracks. You can find tree wrap in most garden centers.

Finally, and most importantly, make a plan to water your lawn, trees and shrubs during dry winter months to avoid more serious landscape problems next year.

leadership excellence". He noted Chief Tovrea is "among the leaders of Chiefs of Police in Colorado".

The Cherry Hills Village Police Department includes 23 sworn officers and 4 civilian employees and is known for its commitment to providing the highest quality of police service to its residents, businesses, and guests. The accreditation process is a voluntary approach to achieve high quality operations that are then objectively verified by CACP. To accomplish this, CHVPD went through CACP accreditation process which includes an application for accreditation, self assessment, on-site assessment and continued compliance. The accreditation standards address every area of police operations, including areas such as hiring, patrol, prisoner rights, evidence/property, court security and investigations.

The agency self-assessment period includes a complete review of policy and procedure as well as department facilities and equipment. When the department notifies CACP that the self-assessment has been completed, CACP assigns a team of assessors who review the department's accreditation files which include proof of compliance to the accreditation standards. Compliance may occur through department policy, use of required equipment, or facilities used by the department. The assessors later conduct an in-depth on-site evaluation to include inspection of facilities, vehicles, property and evidence, the records function, and the accreditation files.

By complying with recognized professional standards, the residents of Cherry Hills Village can be confident that their police department is committed to the highest level of service, integrity and professionalism as verified by the Colorado Association of Chiefs of Police.

# CHERRY HILLS VILLAGE CITY COUNCIL APPROVES VIDEO RECORDING AGREEMENT

**C**herry Hills Village City Council has approved a video recording and production agreement with Open Media Foundation. Open Media will install a camera system in the Council Chambers at City Hall so the City Council meetings can be streamed live on the City's website. If residents are unable to view the live meeting, the recordings of the City Council meetings will be archived on the City's newly created YouTube page. Archived videos provide closed captioning options for the hearing impaired and a transcription of each meeting so residents can search for a specific topic without having to watch the entire video. The video recording equipment should be installed at the beginning of November. City staff will send out an email blast once the equipment has been installed and residents can begin watching the live video.

# MAYOR'S REPORT

***This month an update on the Bellevue traffic signal, undergrounding utilities, a change in our municipal court and a vote on a tax increase for a new jail.***

## **Glenmoor/Bellevue Traffic Signal**

There is progress to report on the installation of a new traffic signal at the intersection of Bellevue Avenue and Glenmoor Drive/Steele Street. Improving safety and accessibility along Bellevue has been a priority for Glenmoor residents and the Village for many years. This location has experienced many serious accidents, including one fatality.

Bellevue Avenue is owned and maintained by the Colorado Department of Transportation (CDOT) which recently approved our request for a new signal at Bellevue and Glenmoor. The City has partnered with the City of Greenwood Village, Glenmoor Country Club, and the Glenmoor Homeowner's Association to pay for the signal. The project was recently placed out for bid and the total cost for design and construction is approximately \$483,000. The cost sharing for this project is to be split as follows: 50% by Greenwood Village; 25% by Cherry Hills Village; and 25% by Glenmoor Country Club and the Glenmoor HOA. The construction project is anticipated to begin in October and will be complete in spring of 2020.

## **Utility Line Undergrounding Project**

At its August 6, 2019 meeting, Council directed staff to proceed with engineering design work for undergrounding utility lines along Quincy Avenue from Happy Canyon to Holly Street. This segment is a priority

because of the view corridors from Quincy Avenue and the damage to the mature tree canopy when Xcel Energy trims tree branches along the lines.

Undergrounding utilities in public rights-of-way has long been a part of the Village's Master Plan. In 2014 City Council appointed a Utility Line Undergrounding Study Committee ("UGSC") to evaluate strategies and options to bury existing overhead utility lines. The Committee studied the likely cost, the possibility for cost sharing, the priority for a sequence of work, and possible changes to the Municipal Code. The Committee issued a comprehensive report on June 2, 2015. <http://www.cherryhillsvillage.com/309/Utility-Line-Undergrounding-Study-Committee>. One of the Committee's recommendations was "The City should use the 1% Xcel fund and initiate construction of underground utilities in accordance with the recently completed Quincy design. The current balance of the 1% fund would cover the cost of design and construction for this section."

Xcel Energy is required to reserve an amount equal to 1% of the proceeding year's electric gross revenues for use in burying overhead power lines located in public rights-of-way. There is currently available to the Village about \$1.2 million in the "1% Xcel Fund". Design for the project will begin in 2019; construction in 2020. Based on rough estimates, the Quincy Avenue segment should cost approximately \$1 million to complete.

## **Public Safety**

This November voters will be asked by the Board of County Commissioners of Arapahoe County (BOCC) to approve Measure 1A, a property tax increase for funds to construct a jail to replace the existing facility on Potomac Street south of Arapahoe Road. The existing jail, designed to hold about 350 inmates, is overcrowded, unable to expand, and is now well beyond its original design

life. The new facility will have 1,600 beds and a design that can be expanded to meet future needs. This summer a citizens' 25-person Long Range Planning Committee studied the matter and unanimously recommended that the BOCC ask voters to approve a tax increase to fund the new facility. Several Council members and I toured the facility in July. We would be happy to discuss the issue with Village residents before the November election.

## **Municipal Court**

Judge James E. Turre, has transitioned from the position of Municipal Judge to Alternate Municipal Judge. Our current Alternate Municipal Judge, former Mayor Jeff Welborn, will assume the role of Municipal Judge. Judge Turre will remain as the appointed Alternate Municipal Judge until the Council appoints a new Alternate Municipal Judge.

Our Municipal Judge hears and decides all cases arising under our Charter and ordinances, and supervises the operation of the Municipal Court. Judge Turre was first appointed as an Alternate Municipal Judge in 1972, and moved to the primary role in 1978. His 47 uninterrupted years of service in these municipal roles may be a record tenure in Colorado. Judge Turre has made an extraordinary contribution to our Village over those many years by presiding over a Municipal Court with a sterling reputation for dispensing justice with integrity, fairness, and compassion. Thank you Judge Turre for your dedication and many years of service as Municipal Judge.



## RECREATION REIMBURSEMENT REMINDER

**R**emember to submit your recreation reimbursement receipts for 2019. The City processes recreation reimbursement requests every two weeks. The deadline for submitting your 2019 recreation receipts is January 15th of every year. There will be no exceptions to the January 15th deadline so residents are strongly encouraged to submit all receipts early. If you belong to Greenwood Athletic Club and pay monthly dues, you are eligible for your \$500 reimbursement after 10 months; you do not need to wait until the end of the year to request your reimbursement.

As part of the recreation reimbursement program, residents have the option of donating their eligible reimbursement to the Catherine H. Anderson Land Donation fund. The money in the Cat Anderson

fund is used to foster the preservation of natural open space and may also be used for other park related purposes. Residents that would like to donate their reimbursements to the Cat Anderson Land Donation Fund will still need to complete a recreation reimbursement form and submit all eligible receipts to the City (be sure to indicate on the reimbursement form what portion of the reimbursement you would like to donate). All donations to the Cat Anderson Land Donation Fund are tax deductible and the City will automatically mail you a donation receipt.

Residents can drop off their reimbursement submittals Monday-Friday 8:00 am - 4:30 pm at City Hall or mail them to 2450 East Quincy Avenue Cherry Hills Village, 80113 (please make sure to apply enough postage, submittals that arrive with postage due will not be accepted). 

## PREScription DRUG

TAKE-BACK  
DAYS!

**ON SATURDAY, OCTOBER 26th from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.** the Cherry Hills Police Department and the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) will provide the public another opportunity to dispose of potentially dangerous expired, unused, and unwanted prescription drugs. Bring your medications for disposal to the Cherry Hills Police Department at 2460 E. Quincy Ave. The service is free and anonymous, no questions asked.

In 2018, Cherry Hills Village residents turned in almost 200 pounds of prescription drugs during the Prescription Drug Take Back days facilitated by the Cherry Hills Village Police Department. It is important to remember that the following items are not accepted during these take back events. The items are as follows:

- Needles & Sharps
- Mercury (thermometers)

- Oxygen Containers
- Chemotherapy/Radioactive Substances
- Pressurized Canisters
- Illicit Drugs

This initiative addresses a vital public safety and public health issue. Medicines that languish in home cabinets are highly susceptible to diversion, misuse, and abuse. Rates of prescription drug abuse in the U.S. are alarmingly high, as are the number of accidental poisonings and overdoses due to these drugs. Studies show that a majority of abused prescription drugs are obtained from family and friends, including from the home medicine cabinet. In addition, Americans are now advised that their usual methods for disposing of unused medicines—flushing them down the toilet or throwing them in the trash—both pose potential safety and health hazards.

## FLU SHOT CLINIC

Front Range Flu Shots will be holding a flu shot clinic in conjunction with the Prescription Drug Take Back event on **Saturday, October 26th from 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m.** The flu shot clinic will be at City Hall (located at 2450 East Quincy Avenue). This is a **walk-in clinic** so there is no need to make an appointment. Front Range Flu Shots accepts the following insurance plans:

- Aetna
- Cigna (Cigna Connect is NOT accepted)
- CNIC
- Cofinity
- Humana (HMOx is NOT accepted)
- Medicate Part B  
(when it is the primary insurance plan)
- Medicare Advantage PPO
- Rocky Mountain Health Plans
