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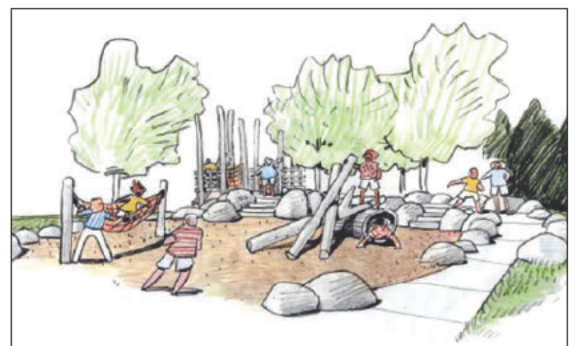
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CONSTRUCTION BEGINS ON JOHN MEADE PARK

The countdown begins! The city is kicking off construction on John Meade Park, the last of three major projects renovating the Village Center. This park is made possible by extensive involvement from our community. Cherry Hills Village received a grant of \$500,000 from Arapahoe County Open Space for the new natural play spaces and wetland boardwalk through the park. Cherry Hills Land Preserve has donated \$10,000 towards trees and landscaping. Staff would especially like to thank former and current members of the Parks, Trails, and Recreation Commission and City Council for their years of dedication and careful attention creating the Master Plan and the final design for the park.

The center of the park will feature a picnic shelter with seating and restrooms. The adjacent playground will contain natural play features like logs and boulders, as well as large hammocks for kids and families to enjoy. A "shaky-bridge" will lead from the playground to an observation tower overlooking the wetlands, which will be graded and replanted to create better habitat and water quality. Fishing piers at each pond will give better access to anglers of all ages. Across Meade Lane, Alan Hutto Memorial Commons was donated by the Hutto family in memory of their son.

The City has awarded the just over \$3M construction contract to HPM, Inc., and the park is expected to be completed by September 2020. Prohibited Use of Motorized Vehicles on Trails

The Police Department has recently received telephone inquiries regarding the use of motorized vehicles on City trails. The City Code prohibits the operation of motor vehicles in any park or on any trail within the City.

A motor vehicle is defined in the City Code as, **“any wheeled vehicle propelled wholly or in part by internal combustion or electric engine or motor, except for individual handicapped propulsion devices.”**

An exception is made for all government, police, fire, ambulance, water, or other “public” vehicle. This includes all 2 or 4-wheeled vehicles of any type, to include golf carts of any type and electric bicycles or scooters.

Please be considerate of other trail users and do not drive any prohibited motorized vehicles on the City trail system.

PRESCRIPTION DRUG

TAKE-BACK
DAYS!

ON SATURDAY, OCTOBER 26th from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. the Cherry Hills Police Department and the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) will provide the public another opportunity to dispose of potentially dangerous expired, unused, and unwanted prescription drugs. Bring your medications for disposal to the Cherry Hills Police Department at 2460 E. Quincy Ave. The service is free and anonymous, no questions asked.

In 2018, Cherry Hills Village residents turned in almost 200 pounds of prescription drugs during the Prescription Drug Take Back days facilitated by the Cherry Hills Village Police Department. It is important to remember that the following items are not accepted during these take back events. The items are as follows:

- Needles & Sharps
- Mercury (thermometers)

- Oxygen Containers
- Chemotherapy/Radioactive Substances
- Pressurized Canisters
- Illicit Drugs

This initiative addresses a vital public safety and public health issue. Medicines that languish in home cabinets are highly susceptible to diversion, misuse, and abuse. Rates of prescription drug abuse in the U.S. are alarmingly high, as are the number of accidental poisonings and overdoses due to these drugs. Studies show that a majority of abused prescription drugs are obtained from family and friends, including from the home medicine cabinet. In addition, Americans are now advised that their usual methods for disposing of unused medicines—flushing them down the toilet or throwing them in the trash—both pose potential safety and health hazards.

CHERRY HILLS VILLAGE MUNICIPAL COURT **SEEKING ALTERNATE MUNICIPAL JUDGE**

The City of Cherry Hills Village is seeking an alternate Municipal Judge for Municipal Court services. The City holds court every other Wednesday morning and primarily hears traffic and code violations. The alternate Judge would run the court on days when the primary judge is unavailable. It is anticipated that this would only occur a few times a year.

Qualifications: Citizen of the United States, Arapahoe County resident, over the age of thirty years, and duly licensed to practice law in the State with at least five years' experience as a practicing attorney or judge. Select candidates will be asked to participate in an interview process.

MAYOR'S REPORT

This month's theme is remodeling and renovation, at Kent Denver School and John Meade Park.



alternatives for its students.

Council plans to revisit and update the Village Master Plan in 2020. When last revised in 2008, the Master Plan adopted three guiding transportation goals: (1) minimize cut-through traffic

on Village streets; (2) maintain the existing hierarchy of streets and their designated functions, and (3) improve safety on Village streets and intersections <http://www.cherryhillsvillage.com/400/Master-Plan>. A public discussion of existing Master Plan goals and implementation strategies will be a priority for the Planning and Zoning Commission, Village Council and Village staff in 2020.

ARAPAHOE COUNTY'S \$500,000 GRANT AWARD FOR JOHN MEADE PARK

On July 23, 2019, Arapahoe County Commissioners awarded a \$500,000 grant to Cherry Hills Village, to help fund construction of improvements to John Meade Park. When completed in 2020, John Meade Park will be the final piece of the Village Campus, taking its place at University Boulevard and Quincy Avenue alongside the Joint Public Safety Facility and the new City Hall.

In 2003 voters approved the creation of the Arapahoe County Open Space and Trails Advisory Board ("OSTAB"). The seven members of OSTAB are appointed by Arapahoe County Commissioners to recommend the acquisition of open space and new trails, and to recommend capital improvements for existing recreational facilities. To fund these acquisitions and improvements voters also approved a .25 percent sales tax on all purchases in Arapahoe County. Fifty percent of the revenue is returned directly to cities and towns, 25 percent is used to acquire open space and develop trails, and 12 percent is set aside for competitive grants. From 2003 to 2018, Arapahoe County constructed 214 miles of trails, supported 150 park projects, and conserved more than 33,000 acres of open space through purchase and other means. Since 2003 Cherry Hills Village has secured grants for 17 projects totaling more than \$1,000,000.

In April this year the Village applied for a \$500,000 grant, its largest single

request ever, to assist in the renovation of John Meade Park. OSTAB members visited the site on May 15. In July OSTAB formally recommended approval of 10 grant requests in the County, including the request for John Meade Park. Several weeks later the Arapahoe County Board of Commissioners approved the OSTAB recommendations, and this August Cherry Hills Village signed an intergovernmental agreement accepting the grant money. Thank you to Councilmembers, Village staff, the Cherry Hills Land Preserve, and all others who helped to write and support the successful application.

PUBLIC SAFETY

In cases of violent crime or crime with potential for personal harm, such as murder, assault, robbery, and burglary, the Police Department will, within a few hours or as soon as practical given the situation, issue an alert through the City's Notify Me® to all residents who have signed up through the website (<https://www.cherryhillsvillage.com/AlertCenter.aspx>). The Police Department may also alert the community through social media. The Village Community Crime Map is also on the website (<https://www.communitycrimemap.com/?address=cherryhills,co>).

If you have questions or concerns about crimes in your neighborhood, please call the Police Department at 303-761-8711 or if you witness a crime or suspicious activity, call 911.

For those trained in cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) or who keep an automatic external defibrillator (AED), there is an interesting android and IOS application, PulsePoint, that is worth a look. The app monitors the current location of users and will send an alert if a victim, in a nearby public location, requires CPR. The application now interfaces with South Metro Fire and Rescue <https://web.pulsepoint.org/>.

KENT DENVER/QUINCY TRAFFIC

In September 2017 Kent Denver School applied for a building permit to remodel the original 1960-era upper school building and to construct a new adjacent facility for office and classrooms. The number of enrolled students will not increase. The request prompted discussion about traffic congestion on Quincy Avenue in the mornings before the 8:00 a.m. start times for Kent Denver and Cherry Hills Village Elementary. In February 2018 Council approved Kent Denver's request for a permit on the condition that before the issuance of a final certificate of occupancy, the school convey land to the Village for construction of a roundabout at the intersection of Quincy Avenue and Colorado Boulevard. In April 2018, following public input, Council voted to suspend design work on the roundabout.

In May 2019, Council voted to delete the condition that Kent Denver convey land for a roundabout to the Village and Kent Denver was issued a final certificate of occupancy for the new space. Renovation of the upper school building (the original Kent Girl's School) will be completed in the spring of 2020. The new upper school complex, along with the dining hall and the 2018 remodeling of the middle school, will complete construction of beautiful, first-class educational facilities in the heart of our Village.

Following Council's May 2019 decision, the Board of Trustees for Kent Denver conveyed to the Village and its residents, an expression of the school's desire and commitment to work with the Village to explore ways to mitigate peak period congestion on Quincy Avenue and to partner with the Village on other matters of mutual concern. For this school year, Kent Denver is (1) adding a second late start (Fridays) to the 2019-2020 school schedule; (2) staggering dismissals to smooth afternoon traffic flow; (3) setting aside preferred parking for carpoolers; (4) encouraging the use of RTD and cycling

The City Charter mandates that the City Council adopt a budget calendar by resolution each year. The following calendar was adopted as the budget calendar for the preparation of the 2020 annual budget by the City Council at the September 3, 2019 meeting:

1. The City Manager submits the proposed 2020 budget on or before September 17, 2019.
2. The City Council holds a study session to review the proposed 2020 budget on or before October 2, 2019.
3. A public hearing will be held concerning the proposed 2020 budget and first readings of the Appropriations Ordinance and Mill Levy Ordinance on or before November 19, 2019.
4. The Appropriations Ordinance and Mill Levy Ordinance will be adopted on second reading before the certification of tax levies deadline of December 15, 2019 required by Arapahoe County Assessor's Office.

PLANT SPRING FLOWERING BULBS IN THE FALL

September and October are the best time to plant bulbs for beautiful spring blossoms. The bright colors of crocus in early spring, the nodding blooms of yellow daffodils and the vivid-hued tulips at Easter can only be enjoyed if you plant these bulbs in the fall. Find the biggest bulb for the variety and hand-select individual bulbs at your local garden center to be sure they are free from defects.

Plant a grouping of the same bulbs together to give a conspicuous splash of color. Consider early, mid and late-season varieties for an on-going show in the spring. Plant bulbs with the tip side up and at a depth of about 3-4 times the height of the bulb. Bulbs should be planted in a well-drained location, and can perform in either sun or filtered shade, depending on the variety. Bulbs provide their own food for growing and flowering, but it is a good idea to spend time preparing the planting area for continuous flowering in multiple seasons.

Prepare the planting bed by loosening and amending the soil with well-composted organic material. Add a slow release phosphorus fertilizer, such as 0-20-0. Mulch the bulbs after planting to protect them over winter.

The large showy Dutch or Darwin tulip may be what first comes to mind when growing bulbs in your garden, but they don't always do well in our climate. If they are your favorites, you may have to replant every few years. Some bulbs do better than others in terms of naturalizing to become a permanent part of your landscape.

Crocus, daffodils, grape hyacinths and species tulips generally do a good job of naturalizing and spreading.

The tulips that do better in our climate include species like bakeri, batlinii, trada, raestans or clusiana. Although these tulips are not as showy as the larger and flashier Dutch or Darwin tulips, they generally do better in our environment. Daffodils are resistant to deer and come in a wide range of colors and sizes. If you carefully select for bloom times you

can spread out the season of display for a couple of months. Grape hyacinth, scilla, and dutch iris are also generally considered to be deer resistant.

We recommend that you mulch bulbs after planting. In the spring, you should remove spent flowers but allow the foliage to wither naturally before removing it. This feeds the bulb for next year's blooms. If possible, incorporate some ground covers or early spring perennials in your planting plan to hide any unsightly bulb foliage. You may have to divide the bulbs after a few seasons.

Grab a bulb catalog or go to your favorite garden center now and get the first pick of flowering bulbs that you will love for seasons to come.
