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PUBLIC ART FOR CITY HALL

The Cherry Hills Village Art Commission (CHVAC) has begun the process of looking for a permanent piece of art to be placed outside the front entrance of the new City Hall building. We are eagerly hoping that residents will attend some of our meetings (the last Monday of the month at 9:30 am in City Hall) to give us their input and hear what we learn as we proceed through the process. The City Council has set aside 1% of the cost of City Hall, \$45,000, for the purpose of purchasing a piece of art.

Kendall Peterson of ThereSquared LLC serves as the Commission's art consultant and is leading the Commission in this process. At the June 24th Commission meeting, the group discussed how to go about finding artists and what features of artwork we value. CHV resident Janet Sacks suggested the Commission attend the Loveland Sculpture in the Park Show in August as the Loveland High Plains Arts Council has already previewed thousands of artists for this show.

In addition, the Commission discussed ideas important to CHV residents. Kendall asked the group to brainstorm words and concepts important to them in the decision making process.

“Rural, pastoral, nature, wildlife, unique, preservation, outdoors, western heritage, family, children, fitting in with the space and the architecture of the municipal buildings, and complimenting the Deborah Butterfield piece across the road” were some of the ideas expressed. The Commission feels we have set a high standard by having Charlo, a piece by nationally acclaimed artist Deborah Butterfield, in our collection and our next piece needs to meet an equally high standard. At this point, we want to keep all options open knowing we are limited by funds and location for the new piece.

The CHVAC cancelled their July meeting and will meet on Monday, August 26th at 9:30 am at City Hall to discuss ideas gleaned from visiting the Loveland show as well as artists we might want to invite to take part in the process of selecting the new piece. No one wants to rush this process and our hope is to collaborate with artists to get the best possible piece for the Village. We would love your input and hope you will join us in this selection journey. We are purchasing a piece for both today and tomorrow.

Fight the Bite!

The Tri-County Health Department strives to protect its residents from mosquito borne diseases through surveillance and education. Mosquito season in Colorado begins in the spring and ends in mid-September. The following are tips you can use during the summer to protect you and your family from mosquito borne diseases such as West Nile Virus.

- Mosquitoes are most active at dawn and dusk so try to plan your outdoor activities during daylight hours or later in the evening.
- Steer clear of trees, bushes and high grasses where mosquitoes may hide during the day.
- Keep grass cut short and bushes trimmed back to eliminate places for mosquitoes to hide.
- Avoid wearing perfume or scented products that may attract mosquitoes.
- Use insect repellant containing DEET, but check with your child's doctor before applying repellant to an infant or child.
- Keep repellents away from eyes, nostrils and lips; do not spray on children's hands as they may rub their eyes or put their hands in their mouth.
- Attach door sweeps to the bottom of outside doors or consider using self-closing mechanisms.
- Repair any holes in screened doors or windows.
- Drain any standing water found around your home weekly.
- Check roofs and gutters to ensure they're in good condition and not collecting puddles.
- Make sure ditches and retention ponds are clean and drain properly.

Demonstrating Research on
Flowering Annuals and Perennials -
Visit the Trial Gardens at CSU
in Ft. Collins

Looking for something new to do this weekend? Would you like to see the latest in annuals and perennials for your garden – some before they've even hit the market? Then hop in your car and head toward Fort Collins and the Colorado State University Flower Trial Garden where you will find over 1,100 annual and perennial plants in a rainbow of colors just waiting for you to enjoy. The garden is open daily to the public, free of charge.

The trial garden got its start in 1971 and finished relocating to its current location at the corner of Remington and Lake Streets in 2006. With 20,000 square feet of space for planting beds, you're sure to find something to tickle your fancy. There are annuals that love the sun while others prefer the covered shady areas. You will find petunias in every color imaginable and some you probably couldn't imagine in your wildest dreams. Learn about new coleus varieties that like to grow in the sun. If you're looking for something new for your containers, there are container mixes sure to dazzle your friends and neighbors. While you're there, don't forget to meander over to the east side of

Remington Street in front of the CSU Center for the Arts where you will find the perennial test garden. You can also find your favorite Plant Select plants on display.

The purpose of the trial garden is to evaluate the performance of different annual and perennial cultivars in our challenging Colorado climate. Where else can you subject plants to blistering sun, rain, hail and even snow – often in the same week? Each year, plant companies from all over the US and international companies enter their plants in the trial. In early August, the entries are judged by horticulture students and faculty, industry representatives and others in the horticulture field for their vigor, uniformity, abundance of flowers and how well they tolerate our climate. The top-rated plants are evaluated again in September to ensure they are still of the best quality and the winners for the year are selected. If you'd like to try your hand at judging the plants, don't miss Consumer Day at the Annual Trial Garden on Saturday, August 10, 2019, from 9:00 am to noon. The fun-filled morning includes refreshments, guided garden tours on the hour, a children's program and door prizes awarded every hour. The best part is you get to help select the Colorado Garden Foundation Consumer Choice Awards. Who knows? You might find your favorite plants in garden centers next year.

MAYOR'S REPORT

Metroplex FAA Environmental Assessment

As reported in June's Crier, the FAA's Draft Environmental Assessment was published on April 22, 2019. The D/EA contains a comprehensive and detailed noise model that compares five years of actual flights over Cherry Hills Village with estimates of FAA's "Preferred Alternative" and change in flight paths. The FAA model represents that the changes in flight patterns proposed by the "Preferred Alternative" will result in either a *decrease* or *no change* in noise in our Village over the next 5 years compared with the "No Action Alternative."

On June 5, 2019 the Arapahoe County Public Airport Authority wrote to the FAA and urged the FAA to delay implementation of the "Preferred Alternative" (planned implementation fall of 2019) until the FAA (a) completes the studies mandated by Congress in the 2018 Reauthorization Act, (b) address cumulative impacts over 20 years, and (c) retain the PUFFR approach for general aviation traffic arriving at Centennial Airport from the north and east. Centennial Airport contends that the FAA's failure to make these calculations and the FAA's decision to eliminate PUFFR, violates rule-making procedures required by the National Environmental Policy Act. The Final Environment Assessment, which starts the clock ticking for legal challenges, will be published this fall. We are in regular communication with the mayors of Littleton, Sheridan, Greenwood Village, Englewood, and Centennial and will continue to coordinate with them and Arapahoe County where our interests align on Metroplex and NextGen matters.

COLORADO MUNICIPAL LEAGUE ANNUAL MEETING

In late June, the Colorado Municipal League held its annual meeting in



Breckenridge, Colorado. The League provides information, training, and advocacy to its member municipalities, including Cherry Hills Village. At the mayor's session discussions touched on several topics of interest to our Village.

First, several years ago the Town of Castle Rock adopted an ordinance prohibiting door-to-door sales after 7 p.m. A pest control company Aptive Environmental, sued to annul the ordinance, arguing that the restriction, which applies to commercial solicitations but not religious or political messaging, violated its free speech rights. The federal district court agreed with Aptive and ruled that the curfew restriction singling out commercial speech violated the company's First Amendment rights. Following its victory,

Aptive notified several other municipalities that it intended to challenge so-called peddler ordinances. Castle Rock appealed the trial court decision to the Tenth Circuit Court of Appeals, which heard arguments and will deliver an opinion in the next several months. Our Village and other municipalities will likely be reviewing existing commercial solicitation ordinances, whoever wins the appeal.

Second, there was extended discussion of a Lakewood's citizen initiative 200 which caps new housing projects at 1 percent of the City's current housing stock. There are about 68,000 residences in Lakewood, so in 2020 new construction permits will be limited to 680 units. The win was certainly a reflection of the increasing frustration of citizens with growth, traffic, and infrastructure demands. Opponents argued that limited supply of new construction will significantly raise home prices and taxable valuations, and will make it difficult to attract new business that needs housing stock. But similar slow-growth initiatives are likely to appear on ballots in more metro and mountain communities.

Third, there was early reaction to the most significant new United States Supreme Court decision affecting municipalities in more than 30 years, *Knick v. Township of Scott*. In Knick, the Township of Scott passed an ordinance requiring all cemeteries be open and accessible to the general public. Ms. Knick owned a rural property with a small family graveyard, and was told by the township that she was in violation of the ordinance

because there was no public access. Ms. Knick sued, alleging that the ordinance took her private property for public use without payment. The township argued that under the 1985 Supreme Court decision in *Williamson County Regional Planning Comm'n v. Hamilton Bank*, Knick must first seek compensation under state court under state law before bringing a federal taking claim under 42 U.S.C. § 1983.

In one of its final decisions issued this term, the Supreme Court overruled *Williamson County*, and held that Ms. Knick could bring her case alleging violation of her 5th Amendment rights directly to federal court, without first seeking compensation in state court. This ruling marks a profound change in takings litigation. The *Williamson County* rule often meant that property owners would seek compensation in state court, be denied, and then be prevented by legal doctrines of claim and issue preclusion from ever seeking relief in state court. The majority opinion explained: "The takings plaintiff thus finds himself in a Catch-22: He cannot go to federal court without going to state court first; but if he goes to state court and loses, his claim will be barred in federal court. The federal claim dies aborning."

This state-litigation requirement relegated the Takings Clause to the status of a poor relation among the Bill of Rights. The *Knick* case restores to Fifth Amendment takings claims the same respect afforded other federal constitutional rights. Why is this so controversial?

The dissent in *Knick* suggests the answer in warning that overruling *Williamson County* will "channel" to the federal courts a (potentially massive) set of cases." The dissent worries not just the potential flood of takings cases in federal court against cities, but also the fact that plaintiffs advancing federal takings claims under § 1983 are entitled to seek attorney's fees and punitive damages, remedies not usually available under state law. The *Knick* decision marks a profound shift in favor of the protection of private property rights at the expense of municipalities and land use regulation.
