

2019 Arapahoe Invitational PLATFORM TENNIS TOURNAMENT

The Arapahoe Tennis Club (ATC) hosted 160 tennis players from around the country for the 2019 Arapahoe Invitational Platform Tennis Tournament February 21st through February 24th. Paddle (or platform) tennis was invented in 1928, but is rapidly gaining popularity in Colorado. There are currently six locations where this game can be played in the state, including Arapahoe Tennis Club with five courts. Paddle tennis is played with a solid paddle, as opposed to the typical strung tennis racquet, and a solid sponge ball. The game is primarily played in doubles format and closely scored according to tennis rules. Typically, platform tennis is played outside, preferably on a cold, winter day (or night) in a fenced-in, elevated court. The smaller court size adds an advantage to net play and creates a fast and reaction-based game off the surrounding screens. Platform tennis is sometimes confused with pickleball, but it is nothing like pickleball.

NEW COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT CLERK - *Ethen Westbrook*



The Community Development Department welcomed a new Community Development Clerk in February. MAYOR'S REPORT

I'd like this month to report on the success of our Police Department in solving several recent crimes, developments in the Quincy Farm property, and a change in name for one of our oldest subdivisions.

PUBLIC SAFETY

On January 15, 2019, Cherry Hills Village Police, responding to a 911 hang-up call and home intrusion, arrested a suspect hiding near the High Line Canal. Excellent work and arrest as a result of prompt action by officers.

On February 13, 2019, an arrest was made of a second suspect in the shooting of Officer Cory Sack. Officer Sack was injured by gunfire in August 2018 while responding to a home intrusion in a Cherry Hills Village residence. The suspect is a juvenile and currently in custody. The investigation involved many hours of police work by several cooperating jurisdictions, including the Cherry Hills Village Police Department, the Arapahoe County Sheriff's Office and the ATF.

On March 8, 2019, police arrested Tre Miekale Carrasco for suspected involvement in a February 12, 2019 sexual assault in the Village. Carrasco is in the Arapahoe County Jail, charged with sexual assault, aggravated robbery, first degree burglary, false imprisonment, and theft. Congratulations to the Police Department for their outstanding work leading to the arrest of the suspect.

Our Police Department appreciates the critical importance during crisis and emergencies of keeping residents accurately updated and informed of possible danger. Accordingly, in all cases with the potential for personal or community harm, the Police Department will evaluate the information and release it as soon as possible through the City's NotifyMe® to all residents who have signed up through the website (<https://www.cherryhillsvillage.com/AlertCenter.aspx>). The first alert may indicate simply that the Police are investigating the situation. Subsequent alerts may seek help with suspect identification and report details. The alerts may also be posted to the City's Facebook and NextDoor pages. For property crimes the Police Department will determine if and when notification is appropriate, such as where there may be a pattern of conduct.

In addition, the Village will soon be partnering with LexisNexis® to have our crime information statistics posted on their mapping website. A link to the crime map will be placed on the City's website within the next month. This website will provide general information about crime activity in the Village. Keep in mind that the new service will not be 100% accurate for all cases and it does take a few weeks to update. We will be interested in obtaining your thoughts and comments about the website when it goes live.



Cherry Hills Village consistently ranks as one of the safest cities in Colorado for both property and violent crime. We are very proud of their professionalism and commitment to serve and protect our community. If you have questions about notifications, recent criminal activity, or any other public safety

QUINCY FARM

Quincy Farm is a 17.5-acre property at 4500 East Quincy Avenue bisecting the High Line Canal in the heart of Cherry Hills Village. Bequeathed to the Village by Catherine (Cat) Huber Anderson following her death in June 2016, is described in the National Register of Historic Places as "a rare agricultural complex that has all but disappeared from urban Arapahoe County." The Hopkins House was built in 1898 and is the oldest remaining farm house in the Village.

The entire property is subject to a conservation easement held by Colorado Open Lands that protects most of the existing buildings and open spaces. The Farm currently may be used only for Agricultural and Preservations uses, which are defined terms in the easement.

Many of the residences and structures on the Farm remain subject to private long-term leases. However, the Anderson House curtilage and pasture areas are in the possession of the City. The conservation easement provides that this portion of the Farm "shall be managed primarily as a natural area with limited public access." The Anderson house "may be used only as a caretaker's residence . . . or as a Nature Center/interpretive facility."

In the summers of 2017 and 2018 the Nature Center was home to young children's summer nature and art classes sponsored by Kent Denver. This year the Village is replacing the septic system and connecting the Hopkins and Nature Center to the public sanitary sewer system. The Village also secured a grant from Arapahoe County to replace the irrigation system on the property. Two gardens (native and pollinating plants) were designed and installed with a grant from the Cherry Hills Land Preserve. A nature trail was also constructed, again with a donation from the Land Preserve.

Over the last few months there have been public meetings involving City Council, the Quincy Farm Committee, Parks Trails and Recreation Committee, and staff regarding the public opening and use of Quincy Farm and hours of operation. At its February 19, 2019 meeting, Council voted to seek approval from Colorado Open Lands to allow the opening of the grounds and pastures of the west side (but not the Nature Center) to the general public

from sunrise to sunset without monitoring by staff or docents.

By letter dated February 22, 2019, Colorado Open Lands responded with concern that such open access may negatively affect the conservation values of the easement. Colorado Open Lands asked the Village to first provide "a comprehensive public use plan that includes all proposed uses by the general public of the property" and which describes among other things, how "potentially negative impacts from public use of the property will be identified, monitored, prevented, and managed."

The Quincy Farm Committee is evaluating and will make recommendations on desired uses and programming for the entire property as part of the 10 year Master Plan. The Quincy Farm Committee will as part of that endeavor, provide recommendations on public use and operation that will provide monitoring, uses, and programming consistent with the conservation easement. These recommendations will be provided to Council and then submitted to Colorado Open Lands for approval.

SWASTIKA ACRES

In 1908 a new subdivision in Arapahoe County was created and named Swastika Acres. At that time the swastika symbol, an equilateral cross with 4 bent arms bent at 90 degrees, had commonly used by many American Indian tribes where it had a number of different meanings. The symbol was also used by ancient civilizations Mesopotamia, and is found in early Byzantine and Christian artwork. In Hinduism today the symbol with arms pointing clockwise symbolizes the sun, prosperity and good luck. In Buddhism the icon symbolizes the footprints of the Buddha.

However, the understanding of the swastika symbol changed forever in 1925 with the publication of Mein Kampf. Adolf Hitler himself created and described the red, white and black National Socialist German Workers Party flag. Hitler wrote that the swastika represented "creative work, which has been and always will be anti-Semitic." The swastika, thereafter, in Hitler's mind and Nazi party dogma was a symbol of anti-Semitism and the eventual murder of six million Jews between 1941 and 1945 in the Holocaust. The swastika will now always be a symbol of that catastrophe.

In 1945 the City of Cherry Hills Village was incorporated, and included later within the borders of the new City were parts of Arapahoe County that included Swastika Acres.

A public hearing is scheduled for the April 16th City Council meeting to consider a petition to change the name of the subdivision to "Old Cherry Hills." Expect the name change to occur promptly following Council action. Thank you to our City Council and staff for relaxing City Code regulations to ease the subdivision name change process and to expunge the swastika from any association with our community.

Arbor Day APRIL GARDENING

The first Arbor Day celebrated in the United States was in Nebraska in April 1872... the pioneers missed their trees along with the shade and building materials they provided. An estimated one million trees were planted in Nebraska on that single day.

Arbor Day, or some version of it, is recognized around the world. From Mongolia to New Zealand, Republic of Congo to Iran, people plant trees. The first Arbor Day celebrated in the United States was in Nebraska in April 1872. The Arbor Day Foundation tells us the pioneers missed their trees along with the shade and building materials they provided. An estimated one million trees were planted in Nebraska on that single

day. The Colorado legislature adopted the idea and designated the third Friday of April as Arbor Day, a day to be observed by the “planting of forest trees for the benefit and adornment of public and private grounds and places.”

What better way to take part in Arbor Day than by planting a tree (or two or three) in your own yard? Granted, with so many trees to choose from, it can seem a daunting task. Don’t worry, the Colorado State University Extension has abundant resources to help you choose the right tree, plant it correctly and provide it with proper care so it thrives and gives you years of pleasure.

The first thing to consider when selecting a tree for your yard is “right place, right plant.” The Extension’s website <https://extension.colostate.edu/> can help you find the perfect tree for your yard. The aptly named “Front Range Tree Recommendation List” (<https://extension.colostate.edu/docs/pubs/garden/treelist.pdf>) rates numerous deciduous and conifer trees for their suitability along the Front Range. If you’re interested in native trees, the Extension fact sheet on “Native Trees for Colorado Landscapes” (<https://extension.colostate.edu/topic-areas/yard-garden/native-trees-for-colorado-landscapes-7-421/>) has an informative list of Colorado’s native trees along with information on how to care for them. If you’re considering an ash tree, check with your city first; some cities in Colorado prohibit planting new ash trees because of the Emerald Ash Borer threat.

After you decide on the tree you want, several cities offer special Arbor Day tree sales for residents. Centennial, Cherry Hills Village and Littleton are just a few municipalities with these special offerings. The trees are available in sizes that homeowners can plant themselves and at reasonable prices.

Now that you have your new tree, you are ready to plant and care for it. Again, the CSU Extension has helpful resources to make sure you get the most from your new tree. PlantTalk Colorado™ has instructions, and even videos, on planting your tree (<http://planttalk.colostate.edu/topics/trees-shrubs-vines/1711-planting-trees-shrubs/>). For those wanting more detailed information, “The Science of Planting Trees” (<http://cmg.colostate.edu/Gardennotes/633.pdf>) gives step-by-step instructions for tree planting including the size and depth of the planting hole, whether to amend the backfill soil and how to stabilize the tree. After your new tree is planted, the PlantTalk Colorado™ site has everything you need to know about how to care for it: watering (including during the winter), pruning and how and when to fertilize.

SELECTS NEW SCULPTURE ON LOAN

Since its inception in 2011, the Cherry Hills Village Art Commission (CHVAC) has solicited loans of sculpture from artists for display in the City. "The Cherry Hills Village Art Commission would like to provide more access to great art in our community," states Ann Polumbus, CHVAC Chair, "loan programs can help us do that with very little risk." Loan periods typically last at least two years and provide Villagers and those visiting our community with an opportunity to experience and interact with a variety of artists, styles, and mediums, all on a rotating basis. The City normally pays the artist a stipend for the loan of the artwork.

The CHVAC is recommending that the City enter into an agreement for the two-year loan of *Really* (2017) by Colorado sculptor Wayne Salge (salgesculpture.com). "Wayne is a very well-respected artist who lives and works in Colorado. His piece *Really* leaves one wondering what his character is actually thinking" stated Polumbus. Depending on where he is located, he may be wondering about the students at CHV Elementary, or *Big Bronze Walking Eye Flower*, or the drivers on University. The CHVAC believes that the southeast corner of Quincy Avenue and University Boulevard may be an ideal location for this sculpture during its loan period.

VEHICLE TRESPASS PREVENTION TIPS

*IN THE UNITED STATES, A VEHICLE IS STOLEN
EVERY 21 SECONDS.*

Below are a few tips to prevent vehicle trespasses and vehicle thefts:

- ▲ Use a garage or secure location whenever possible.
- ▲ Park your car in a well-lit area.
- ▲ Never leave your car running or the keys in the ignition when away from your vehicle, even if it is for "just a minute."
- ▲ Roll your windows up, close the sunroof and lock all the doors.

▲ At home, park your car in the garage whenever possible. Close and lock the garage door, and do not leave your keys in the vehicle.

▲ **DO NOT** leave the garage door opener in plain view.

▲ Remove your purse and other valuables from your car.

▲ Carry the registration and insurance card with you. **DO NOT** leave personal identification documents or credit cards in your vehicle.

▲ **DO NOT** leave any valuables in plain sight. If you have to leave valuables in the vehicle, place them in the trunk of the car or out of sight before you arrive at your destination.

▲ **DO NOT** hide valuables under the seat or in the glove box of your vehicle. Thieves know about these common hiding places.
