Cherry Hills Village City Council SELECTS NEW CITY MANAGER

After interviewing numerous qualified candidates, the City of Cherry Hills Village City Council is pleased to announce the selection of Chris Cramer as the next City Manager. Mr. Cramer's promotion to City Manager will be effective August 1st.

Mr. Cramer joined the City in July of 2019 as the Community Development Director. Prior to Cherry Hills Village, he was the Community Development Director for the City of Commerce City, where he served as the Director of Community Development since 2014.

Throughout his time as Community Development Director for the City of Cherry Hills Village, Mr. Cramer finalized the City's Code Modernization Project and kicked off the City's Master Plan Update process.



A few of his achievements in Commerce City include: overseeing the adoption of a Comprehensive Master Plan for the first time in over 20 years, overseeing the adoption of a Zoning Ordinance re-write and leading the successful efforts of two new bus routes in Commerce City through securing grant funding. In addition, he successfully managed a series of neighborhood plans, including the Irondale Neighborhood Plan, RTD Station Area Master Plan, Commerce City Housing Plan and Public Art Plan.

Mr. Cramer has a Master's in Urban and Regional Planning from the University of Washington in Seattle and a Bachelor's in Political Science from Oklahoma State University.

JOHN MEADE PARK UPDATE

John Meade Park construction continues! Since our last update, the boardwalk over the wetlands and fishing piers at each pond have been completed. The rock wall around the play area is now under construction, and the logs for the Observation Platform are being prepped for installation. Nearly all of the 125 new trees have been planted! On the Alan Hutto Memorial Commons parcel, the concrete performance area, pathways, and terraced grass amphitheater are complete.

Our park mascot, Max the Muskrat, has resumed his regular posts - follow the City of Cherry Hills Village on Facebook or NextDoor for weekly updates. Big Bronze Walking Eye
Flower leaves the City

The loan period for *Big Bronze Walking Eye Flower* has come to an end and the sculpture will be removed in July. *Big Bronze*

Walking Eye Flower sat at the northwest corner of Quincy Avenue and University Boulevard for the past two years. The sculpture, by world-famous Colorado-based artist James Surls, is made of stainless steel and bronze, weighs 1100 pounds and stands almost 18 feet high.

Surls' work is often organic in nature inspired by the natural landscape. *Big Bronze Walking Eye Flower* was selected by the Cherry Hills Village Art Commission for its energy, its organic nature and its beauty. The CHVAC hopes to work with Surls again in the future.




NATIONAL NIGHT OUT EVENT **CANCELLED**

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MAYOR'S REPORT

This month: Initial thoughts about the new Colorado Law Enforcement Integrity Act and its effect on our Village, and an update on long planned Village Sanitary Sewer improvements.

Public Safety/Law Enforcement Integrity Act

Following the death of George Floyd and many nights of protests in Denver, the Colorado General Assembly passed Senate Bill 217—a Bill to Enhance Law Enforcement Integrity—with strong bipartisan support. When signed by Governor Polis, SB 217 will be the newest, most ambitious, and comprehensive legislation addressing police accountability in the United States.

Senate Bill 217 requires our Village, other municipalities, counties, and the state patrol to issue body-worn cameras to uniformed peace officers, before July 1, 2023. Recordings from the cameras must be retained, and recordings of incidents released to the public, in most cases 21 days after a city, county, or the state receives a complaint of misconduct. Body-worn cameras must be active and recording whenever a peace officer responds to a call or initiates contact with the public.

Cities, counties and the state patrol also must report to the state whenever peace officer use force that results in death or serious bodily injury, whenever peace officers enter property unannounced (no-knock raids), and whenever peace officers resign while under investigation for violating department policy.

A peace officer may use deadly force if the officer believes in good faith that the peace officer or another person is in imminent danger of serious bodily injury. Any peace officer convicted or pleading guilty to a crime involving the unlawful use or threatened use of physical force lose certification by the



Police Officer Standards and Training Board (P.O.S.T). P.O.S.T certification, required for all employed peace officers cannot be reinstated, under any circumstances, unless the peace officer is exonerated by a court. P.O.S.T. will also maintain a public database with information on all peace officers in Colorado.

SB 217 also creates a civil cause of action for damages for any person who alleges that a peace officer violated the person's constitutional rights. Under SB 217 cities and counties must indemnify peace officers for such claims if the peace officer acted in good faith belief that their conduct was lawful. If a city, county, or the state determines that a peace officer did not act in good faith, the peace officer will be personally liable for five percent of the judgment or twenty-five thousand dollars -- whichever is less. A city, county, or state patrol does not have to indemnify a peace officer if the officer was convicted of a criminal violation for the conduct from which the claim arises.

Body cameras are an excellent tool to protect peace officers and citizens. But they are not inexpensive. In addition to the capital cost for the new camera equipment, continually organizing, and storing large amounts of digital video footage will require computer server capacity and additional staff time. The Colorado Municipal League lobbied for additional time (until July 2023) to comply with and find funding to pay for this state mandate. CML will advocate next year for amendments to SB 217 to provide some reasonable limits on municipal liability arising from the actions of peace officers.

Sanitary Sewer District Consolidation

The existing sanitary sewer system in the Village is a patchwork of multiple districts each of which is owned and maintained by separate entities. Developers routinely installed residential sewer lines and then conveyed

responsibility for maintenance to the equivalent of a home owner association. Many of those small districts are underfunded and have no expertise or desire to maintain their systems. This led to uneven sewer fees and services in the Village. These concerns, in turn, prompted the Planning and Zoning Commission to recommend in the 2008 Comprehensive Master Plan to have the Village “expedite efforts to consolidate sanitary sewer and water districts in order to enhance the quality and efficiency of the overall sanitary sewer and water service systems within the Village.”

Several large sewer districts may be willing to take over and assume responsibility for the sewer lines on a permanent basis, but only after the smaller neighborhood lines are cleaned, restored and improved to meet current codes and construction standards. In 2014 the Village imposed a fee increase for residents within City-owned sewer districts. In 2019 the Village issued a request for proposal to perform a substantial part of work that involved several other sewer districts. At the May City Council meeting the Village accepted the lowest responsible bid and approved the expenditure of more than \$1.2 million for the project. Cost of the rehabilitation work will be shared with Southgate, Cherryvale, and Country Homes sewer districts.

All of the work will occur in Council Districts 1 and 2. The work will require the temporary closure of trails and access to several easements on private property. Work on this part of the rehabilitation project is expected to begin in 2020 and be completed by 2021. A final piece of the rehabilitation work to be completed before the system can be conveyed will take place on City owned property thereafter.

Mayor Mondays. City Hall has now reopened following the COVID-19 lockdown, and I will restart regular Mayor Monday hours on August 3rd from 9 to 11 a.m. We can observe social distancing guidelines—and if the weather is nice — move to the outdoor patio. BE PREPARED FOR Japanese Beetles

Japanese beetles appear around mid-to-late June. They can cause damage during the larval/grub stage in turf grass, and adults cause damage by feeding on a variety of landscape plants and trees. Also, adult beetles feed on blooming flowers at the same time pollinators and beneficial insects are pollinating those flowers, which limits control options.

Here are some things you can do now in preparation:

- Keep your plants as healthy as possible. A healthy plant will be able to sustain more damage. Practice good cultural care to reduce stress on your plants.
- Keep turf as healthy as possible, too. A strong root system will be able to tolerate more feeding from grubs.
- Be creative with plant selection when you are shopping for plants! Evergreens, annuals, perennials, some vegetables, and many tree varieties are

not susceptible to the beetle. Research which cultivars are not susceptible to Japanese beetles.

- Research control options:

➤ Choices can be limiting depending on if pollinators are foraging on the same flowers that the beetles are feeding on. Pollinator-safe options include *Bacillus thuringiensis* var. *galleriae* (marketed as beetleGONE!, beetleJUS!) and chlorantraniliprole (marketed as Acelepryn SC).

➤ Look for plants that do not produce flowers or their flowers bloom at a different time than when the adult beetles are active. For example:

crabapple trees bloom in the early spring when adult beetles are not active and other treatments may be an option.

➤ Remember the label is the law! If you chose to apply pesticides, the directions must be followed exactly.

➤ For a complete list of control options on foliage and turf and

When the beetles arrive:

- Hand-pick Japanese beetles is tedious,

but effective! You can squish them or dump them in a bowl of soapy water. Hand-picking will reduce the volatile attractants produced by plant wounding. Hand-picking will also prevent those females from laying 40-60 eggs.

• Think twice before using Japanese beetle traps. Research shows that traps can attract more beetles to the area because the pheromone scent in the trap is strong. If you choose to use traps, place them at least 30 feet from any vegetation that is important to you.

- Make sure you have grubs in your turf before treating the turf. This can save you time and money. Grub damage looks very similar to a variety of other common turf issues. Try doing a “tug test”. If you tug on your turf and the grass pulls out of the ground immediately, then you have may have grubs that have been feeding on the roots. If the grass is rooted into the ground, you may have another issue.
- If you do have grubs, try making sure your turf dries out in between watering. Grubs will not survive in soil that dry.
