

HIGH LINE CANAL TRAIL UNDERPASSES at Hampden and Colorado

On May 4, Denver's Department of Transportation and Infrastructure (DOTI) began work to create a safer connection for people using the High Line Canal Trail. Currently, the trail leaves pedestrians and cyclists at the intersection of Colorado Boulevard and Hampden Avenue, a busy intersection that can be intimidating to cross. This project will build two underpasses to reroute the trail under Colorado and Hampden. The new underpasses will provide a safer experience in alignment with Denver's Vision Zero efforts to provide safer streets for all.



TRAFFIC INFORMATION –

Work hours are 7:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday.

While work is underway, the westbound right lane on Hampden Avenue will close for the duration of the project. People can also expect lane closures near the Colorado and Hampden intersection; however, all travel lanes will remain open during peak travel times. For those who walk and ride bikes along the High Line Canal Trail, detours will be in place throughout the project.

In addition, between the two underpasses, DOTI will also add a new, 10-foot wide multi-use trail along the north side of Hampden that will also give people more space to bike and walk. The City of Cherry Hills Village will install a new footbridge across the canal at the current dead-end of the High Line Canal trail immediately south of Hampden Avenue, and additional trail parallel to Hampden Avenue to connect the footbridge to the underpass.

Crews will close Colorado Boulevard and Hampden Avenue on separate weekends to install the underpasses. The closures will occur close to the intersection and through-traffic will be detoured. Full closure of the corridors on weekends prevents

crews from having to do multiple lane closures and traffic configurations during the week over a longer period of time. Dates for this work are still being determined, and DOTI will give the public advance notice before weekend work is scheduled to begin.

The public's patience and cooperation during construction are greatly appreciated. All work is weather dependent and subject to change.


THE GREAT WEED INVASION

USING INDICATOR WEEDS FOR A HEALTHY LAWN



Spring is here. Trees are greening and flowers are blooming, including those darn dandelions! Every year we fight weeds in our lawns and every year they come back. With a little detective work and some changes to your lawn care program, you can keep those weeds at bay.


Of course, the best defense against weeds in your lawn is good lawn maintenance. A thick healthy lawn will choke out most weeds over time. That means proper watering, fertilizing and mowing.




Black medic (Medicago lupulina)




Prostrate spurge (Euphorbia supina)




Knotweed (Polygonum aviculare)

You may not know that you can use the types of weeds growing in your lawn, called indicator weeds, to give you an idea of what may be going wrong with your lawn.

If you see prostrate spurge, knotweed, mouse-ear chickweed, or annual bluegrass, the soil is likely compacted. To correct this, core aerate twice per season to break up the compaction.

Crabgrass, yellow wood sorrel and white clover are a sign that your mower is set too low. Make sure your mower height is set to 2.5 to 3 inches. Because higher turf grass shades the ground, new weed seedlings have a harder time with germination.

Too little water encourages dandelions, black medic, and bindweed.

Check your irrigation system to make sure it's properly covering the lawn areas. Use a catch-can test to determine if you have head-to-head coverage. If poor coverage isn't the problem, you may need to increase the amount of water. A cycle

and soak setting on your irrigation clock reduces water run-off.

On the flip-side, overwatered lawns invite annual bluegrass, crabgrass, violets and ground ivy. Make sure your sprinklers aren't running too long or too often.

Too much fertilizer and you'll find henbit, yellow wood sorrel and annual bluegrass. Fertilize once in May to mid-June, once in September and once in November using only the amount recommended for your turf type.

Too little fertilizer and too much water makes ideal conditions for black medic, plantains and white clover. Cut back on the water and fertilize your lawn.

Herbicides are an option for controlling weeds until the changes you've made to your lawn care take effect. If you have only a few weeds, spot treat them rather than applying herbicide to the entire lawn. Apply herbicides on a calm, clear day when the temperature is between 50 and 85 degrees. Don't apply if it will rain in the next 12 hours and don't irrigate for 12 hours after application. And, most importantly, always read and follow all directions on the herbicide label.

MAYOR'S REPORT

This month a report on Safer-at-Home; Face Coverings; a Village virtual food drive, and the City Manager search.

Cherry Hills Village Stay at Home/Safer at Home Public Health Orders

Governor Polis and our Tri-County Health Department face a daunting challenge: to balance lifting public activity restrictions while controlling transmission of the COVID-19 virus and protecting against overwhelming our health care providers and facilities.

Governor Polis signed Executive Order 44 on April 27, 2020 (Safer-at-Home) with authority conferred by the Colorado Disaster Emergency Act. The Act allows the Governor to declare an epidemic emergency when there are “cases of an illness or condition . . . caused by pandemic influenza or novel and highly fatal infectious agents.” 24-33.5-703, C.R.S. The declaration expires May 27, 2020 but is expected to be modified and extended by the Governor.

The Safer-at-Home order suspends all P-12 in-person school instruction, prohibits businesses from having more than 50% of its employees at work; prohibits gatherings of more than 10 persons; prohibits restaurants, bars, and other places of public accommodation from offering food or beverage for on-premise consumption; and shuts all gyms, movie theatres, performance and concert venues, casinos, and off track-betting.

The Safer-at-Home order was issued to “protect against overwhelming our health care resources.” The key metrics for the capacity of the healthcare system are the number of new COVID-19 hospitalizations and the number of available ICU beds. Because Coloradans have stayed at home and followed common sense suggestions for avoiding infection, the number of hospitalized COVID-19 patients declined from a high of 888 in April to 497 today¹.

Since the Colorado Health Department began collecting ICU data in mid-April



the number of available adult critical care ventilators has remained virtually the same: from 722 to 728 today¹. The number of ventilators in use (for all adults not just those with COVID-19) declined from 463 to 355¹. The number of ICU ventilators in use in the Denver area is about the same today as it was on this date in 2019. Staying at home, physical distancing, handwashing, and other measures, voluntary and compelled, have flattened the COVID-19 curve for the number of cases, hospital admissions, and ventilators used.

Most COVID-19 fatalities in Colorado have affected persons 60 years of age and older². No fatalities among persons younger than 20 have been reported in Colorado². Children are largely unaffected by COVID-19 and minimally contagious when they are infected. The Journal of the American Medical Association reports that in China just 1 percent of COVID-19 patients were under 10 years old, and another 1 percent of patients were 10 to 19 years old. There were no deaths in those age cohorts³. In Italy, just 2 of the country's 30,000 recorded deaths were children or teens. Studies suggest that when infected by COVID-19, children are unlikely to transmit the disease to others, although the reasons for this are not fully understood^{4,5}.

Cherry Hills Village, COVID-19, and Face Coverings

Tri-County Health recommends (but has not ordered) the wearing of face coverings in public indoor spaces. Because infected persons may be contagious for days before the onset of symptoms, wearing masks might help avoid unknowingly infecting others. To protect City staff, the Village asks that everyone use face coverings when entering City Hall or the Joint Public Safety Facility.

Studies show that airborne transmissions and infections almost always occur in indoor enclosed spaces — homes, senior residence facilities, public transit, workplaces, social gatherings and indoor restaurants⁶. Coloradans engaging

in outdoor activities are not required to wear face coverings. But while enjoying the High Line Canal trail and Village roads and parks, everyone should avoid gathering in groups and maintain at least 6 feet (about 2 arms' length) of physical distancing.

Virtual Food Drive

The lockdown orders caused record unemployment and placed great stress on food bank supplies across Colorado. The Food Bank of the Rockies anticipates their needs to double this year because of the loss of jobs caused by the Stay-at-Home and Safer-at-Home public health orders.

Several of our neighbors established a virtual food drive to benefit the Food Bank of the Rockies. Residents interested in helping can visit the Facebook site — From Our Village to Yours. City Council will consider a Resolution supporting the efforts of our residents at its May 18th meeting.

City Manager

As reported on this page last year, City Manager Jim Thorsen announced he would be retiring effective July 31, 2020. Shortly before the emergency declaration, Council interviewed candidates and narrowed the list to 3 finalists. Council appointed the Mayor and Mayor Pro Tem to draft and negotiate an employment agreement. That process is underway, and Council expects to soon announce the final selection.

TRAIL SAFETY UPDATE

The City continues to receive calls and emails about unsafe social distancing taking place particularly on the High Line Canal. Please follow all recommendations that have been outlined by the CDC and other health organizations. With everyone wanting to get out and use the trails we have also seen increased use of the parking areas near the High Line. If the lots are full do not park in areas marked with no parking signs or in a manner that is unsafe, or that blocks access to residents' driveways. Officers will issue tickets for all vehicles that are parked illegally or that cause a dangerous situation.

Parks crews have increased the number of times that trash cans are emptied each week due to the higher use. We ask that if you can pick up trash along the trail and deposit it in the trash cans that it would be a great help. Please also remember to pick up after your pets too.


TO HELP KEEP THE TRAILS SAFE FOR EVERYONE, REMEMBER TO:

- Stay home if you are sick.
- Continue moving along the trail and do not convene in one spot.
- Maintain a minimum of six feet of distance between you and other trail users.
- Avoid approaching code officers or trail maintenance workers as they are performing essential work. If it is necessary to speak with on-trail crews, maintain six feet of distance between.
- State your presence before passing others while biking/running/horseback riding on the trail to allow for others to get to a safe distance.
- Practice daily exercise at off-peak times to allow for more users to safely access the trail throughout the day.
- Access the trails near your home to avoid unnecessary travel.
- Leave it better than you found it – take all trash, recyclables and belongings with you when you leave to help keep the trails safe and clean.

The City is closely following the national, state and local regulations for outdoor activity as it relates to COVID-19 and will keep you up to date on our website. We can all do our part to help slow the spread of this illness and allow for safe, shared outdoor space by following the recommendations in the graphic below.

Tips for Physical Distancing In Parks

Know what 6 feet looks like. Lay measuring tape on the ground. It's the distance of a surfboard, long yoga mat or adult bike.



Do not use playgrounds or other frequently touched surfaces.

Go by yourself or those you live with. Strongly consider the use of a face covering.



Avoid crowded areas. If a space cannot be enjoyed safely, go home or discover a new park in your community.

HIGH LINE CANAL TRAIL IMPROVEMENTS

The High Line Canal Conservancy keeps momentum up to preserve, protect and enhance the Canal.

Over the last two months, the Canal has proven to be essential to the community during this pandemic, immeasurably supporting our health and well-being. Because of this, the High Line Canal Conservancy staff is working harder than ever to enhance the Canal for all communities and to protect the treasured greenway for years to come. Canal projects you'll see moving forward this summer include:

- Signage, including new mile markers
- Stormwater transformation in four locations
- Safer crossings and access, including underpasses at Hampden Ave. and Colorado Blvd.
- Connected open space, including Long's Pine Grove Open Space
- New trail connections, including I-70 to Green Valley Ranch
- Neighborhood trail enhancements in Laredo Highline, Aurora

VEHICLE AND MAILBOX THEFT PREVENTION

Warmer weather means more individuals will be taking advantage of the beautiful trails in Cherry Hills Village. Arapahoe County is still under a Safer-at-Home order so keep in mind that social distancing guidelines, staying six feet apart from other walkers, are important for everyone's safety on the trails. Here are a few tips to prevent vehicle trespasses so a walk outdoors does not end with a phone call to the police department.

- Roll your windows up, close your sunroof and lock all your doors.
- Do not leave your garage door opener in plain view.
- Do not leave any valuables in plain sight. If you have to leave valuables in

the vehicle, place them in the trunk of the car or out of sight before you arrive at your destination.

- Do NOT hide valuables under the seat or in the glove box of your vehicle. Thieves know about these common hiding places.


PREVENT PACKAGE AND MAILBOX THEFTS WITH THE FOLLOWING TIPS:

- Schedule packages to arrive at your residence when you know you will be at home.
- Consider alternate delivery locations, such as a neighbor, a family member or an office location.
- Sign up for Informed Delivery from the USPS, which includes a tracking option for packages. For more information or to sign up go to <https://informedelivery.usps.com/box/pages/intro/start.action>
- Sign up for UPS My Choice to receive notifications about the progress of packages. For more information or to sign up go to <https://www.ups.com/us/en/help-center/sri/ups-my-choice-delivery-alerts.page>



- USPS, FedEx and UPS allow customers to indicate where to leave the package if you are not home (i.e. back door, neighbor or garage).
- Amazon Locker is a service where your packages are routed to a locker drop off. Once the package has been delivered, the customer will receive an alert and has three days to pick up the package.
- Ask for signature delivery and insure your packages.
- Vacation mail and package hold are offered for free online by USPS and FedEx. The packages will be held at terminals or delivery centers for a period of time.

CITY FLOODPLAIN DEVELOPMENT REGULATIONS and National Flood Insurance Program Requirements

The City has participated in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) Community Rating System (CRS) since 1978, making residents eligible for federal backed flood insurance and flood insurance discounts. In October 2017, the City was designated a Class 7 through the NFIP Community Rating System. While there are many benefits to CRS class designations, the most significant is lowered cost flood insurance rates. As a Class 7 community, residents of Cherry Hills Village are eligible for a 15% NFIP policy premium

discount. CRS Classes are rated from 10-1 with a Class 1 being the highest level of floodplain management.

In order to participate in this discount program, the City has adopted minimum standards and regulations for floodplain development, conducts regular drainage way maintenance and provides community outreach on floodplain issues. Cherry Hills Village is then rated on a 'credit point system' in order to determine eligibility for lowering the CRS Class. The City continues to work towards a lower rating and continues to expand our best management practices in dealing with floodplains. There are approximately 200 properties in the city limits that intersect a floodplain designated on the FEMA Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRMs) adopted by the City. If the residential structure on the property is located in a floodplain, flood insurance will be required by most mortgage lenders.

In Cherry Hills Village, most development in the floodplain is prohibited unless a special development permit is granted by City Council. If you want to know if your property

is in the designated floodplain or for more information on floodplain development permit requirements, you can contact the Cherry Hills Village Community Development Department at (303) 783-2721 or stop by the Village Center at 2450 E. Quincy Avenue. The Community Development Department maintains records of all current and past adopted floodplain maps and Flood Hazard Area Delineation (FHAD) areas, flood depth data for most currently mapped areas of the City and FEMA issued elevation certificates.

HELPFUL TIPS...

The following are helpful tips for residents who live in flood prone areas:

- Know the extent and nature of the flood hazard in your area.
- Plan escape routes to high ground.
- Buy flood insurance for your property.
- During times of heavy rainfall watch the level of water in the drainage way and stay tuned to radio or television for possible flood warnings.
- Evacuate the flood hazard area in times of an impending flood.
