## THE CREW SERIES

The Crew series pieces were donated to the City by artist Emmett Culligan in 2015. These three pieces were

originally placed in the median on Holly Street just north of Bellevue Avenue, then moved in 2016 to the Denver Water park on the southwest corner of Holly Street and Quincy Avenue where they are today. The Cherry Hills Village Art Commission (CHVAC) has been discussing a better, permanent home for the Crew series pieces since 2018, and after much deliberation, have chosen a location in the newly redesigned John Meade Park. The pieces are meant to be “found objects” and the CHVAC believes the natural landscaping and pedestrian trails of John Meade Park create the perfect location to showcase these pieces. The proposed location is between the southeastern pond and the gravel parking lot, south of Meade Lane and northwest of the equestrian arena.

The Parks, Trails and Recreation Commission will consider the Crew series relocation at their October 14th meeting. The final decision will be made by City Council at a future meeting.

# Remembering Stacy Lynn Pepper

*With deep sadness and disbelief we share the devastating loss of our beautiful, brilliant, joyful, thoughtful, affectionate, infinitely beloved, Stacy Lynn Pepper. She was killed July 26th in a hit-and-run.*

**S**tacy was born in Denver, Colorado in 1984. She attended Cherry Hills Village Elementary and graduated from Cherry Creek High School in 2002.

Stacy attended Stanford University, where she studied political science, studied abroad in Italy, received honors in international security studies, was inducted into Phi Beta Kappa, and graduated in 2006. She returned to Stanford and earned her law degree in 2011. She moved to Chicago and clerked for Seventh Circuit Judge Joel Flaum. She was a litigator and partner at Kirkland & Ellis Law Firm. Stacy's colleagues described her as an incredible team member, mentor, and role model, who excelled in every way, including in the courtroom and as the go-to advocate among hundreds of lawyers in a large defense group. They will remember her as a force: self-confident, humble, thoughtful, and kind.

Stacy was incomparably vibrant, endlessly curious, and had a passion for exploring the world broadly and deeply. She was remarkable at making and maintaining life-long friendships. It brought her great joy to share her experiences with friends and family, and document her travels through perfectly crafted photo books. Her greatest delight was spending time with people she loved, and her most recent adventure included an extended stay back home to maximize time with family while working remotely.

Stacy's truest love was her family. She was an incredibly devoted daughter to longtime CHV residents Cindy and Neil Pepper, whom she loved with her entire heart and soul. She was immeasurably proud to be one of "the girls": the brightest guiding light and boundless source of love, affection, and camaraderie for her younger sisters, Marci Pepper (Nathan Peffley) and Stephanie Pepper.

## Cherry Hills Village Finance Department RECEIVES AWARD for 2021 Budget

The City of Cherry Hills Village was awarded the Distinguished Budget Presentation Award for the 2021 budget by the Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA) in September. Cherry Hills Village is one of over 1,700 participants in the Budget Awards Program. This award is the highest form of recognition in governmental accounting and its attainment is a significant achievement for the City. It reflects the commitment of the City and staff to meeting the highest principles of governmental budgeting. The City received a score of outstanding for strategic goals & strategies, fund balance documentation, departmental goals and objectives and for the statistical/supplemental section. One reviewer commented "staff is commended for producing an outstanding budget document for such a small city".

The Finance Department for the City worked on the budget document for over 6 months following a strict set of guidelines. These guidelines determine how well the budget serves as a policy document, financial plan, operations guide and communications device for the residents. Once the budget document was submitted, a panel of independent reviewers completed an examination to determine if the document met the requirements. The budget document must be rated "proficient" in all four categories, along with fourteen mandatory criteria within those categories, in order to receive the award. # MAYOR'S REPORT

**O**n August 28, 2021 Cherry Hills Village celebrated its 75+1 Anniversary with a community picnic at John Meade Park. The following are from my remarks at the celebration.

## *Why Here?*

Why is Cherry Hills Village, voted to be the best place to live in America, centered here around John Meade Park? What is special about this location specifically that caused the best and brightest to settle and incorporate a city here?

## *Little Dry Creek/High Line Canal*

When Colorado entered the Union in 1876 this area was dry short-grass prairie. The only natural feature was Little Dry Creek, which flowed during rain events from southeast to northwest and joined the South Platte near what is now Dartmouth Avenue. The discovery of 20 troy ounces of gold in 1858 along its banks set off the Colorado gold rush, but water would shape our history.

In 1873 President Grant proposed to Congress the equivalent of landing a man on the moon — a waterway tapping into the South Platte River and continuing east to the Missouri River. While the idea was plainly impossible, the idea spurred private investors from England to finance the construction of a much smaller canal that would follow the high contour of land from Waterton Canyon east to what is now north Aurora. When completed in 1882, the High Line Canal, was more than seventy miles long and irrigated about 50,000 acres.

While a financial failure, construction of the High Line Canal would profoundly affect this area. The land on the “wet” side of the High Line Canal was transformed from dry prairie to fertile irrigated land. Water encouraged farms and irrigated golf courses which in turn attracted prosperous residents — most



significantly a man named Alexis Foster.

## *Spanish Flu/Championship Golf*

Alexis Foster was born 1867 in Nashville, Tennessee, the son of a prominent attorney and judge. After graduating

from Montgomery Bell Academy, he worked for three years as a cowboy in Texas before settling in Denver. In 1890 he started as a cashier in Daniels Bank, worked as a securities broker for the Denver Mining Exchange, founded the United States National Bank, and served on the Board of the Denver branch of the Federal Reserve Bank of Kansas City. In 1909 Alexis, and along with William Sweet (Colorado governor 1923-1925) and James Causey, formed the powerhouse Denver brokerage firm Sweet, Causey, Foster & Co.,

After the Great War and prompted by fear of the Spanish flu, Alexis and his wife Alice moved their family from their Seventh Avenue mansion in Denver to a newly constructed country estate. They purchased 160 acres near what is now the southeast corner of University and Hampden and built a Colonial Revival mansion surrounded by formal gardens and a large lake filled from the High Line Canal.

Alexis Foster's passion — apart from business — was golf. Now residing inconveniently far from the Denver Country Club, Alexis along with several other DCC members in 1922 purchased property immediately west of the Foster Estate, founded Cherry Hills Country Club and designed and built a championship golf course more challenging than the DCC.

Disaster struck the Foster family when the stock market crashed in 1929. Alexis and Alice, and Sweet, Causey and Foster, lost everything. The Foster Mansion was lost to foreclosure, and Alexis and his wife moved to New York City. In 1935 Temple Buell, a prominent Denver architect and developer, purchased the Foster Mansion and took up residence.

## *Airplanes/Stop Denver!*

In 1938 Cherry Hills Country Club hosted the U.S. Open, the first time the event was held west of Minneapolis. The neighborhood surrounding the golf course attracted prominent lawyers, physicians bankers and politicians to fine homes, who moved here from Denver to enjoy peace, quiet, and freedom of this small oasis.

Meanwhile, George Cramner, Denver's manager of public works, was spearheading rapid growth of the City and County of Denver. During Cramner's tenure Denver constructed Red Rocks amphitheater and acquired Winter Park Ski area. In 1943, with Cramner's support, Denver announced plans to acquire property south of Cherry Hills Country Club to build and operate a regional general aviation airport.

The prospect of airplanes buzzing the golf course and country homes spurred local residents to action. Temple Buell and other area residents met at the Foster Mansion to discuss how to resist Denver's seeming irresistible southward expansion.

Residents of the area determined that the best way to stop Denver's march south would be to incorporate as a municipality. Residents worked quickly despite World War II hardships, and the Village was officially incorporated on July 19, 1945. One of the first acts of the Board of Trustees was to restrict airplane flights over the Village, effectively preventing flight operations at Denver's proposed new airport location.

So we are here today because of the High Line Canal, Spanish Influenza, golf, George Cramner, and airplanes. If any one of these had not happened, we would be using Denver mailing addresses and Michael Hancock would be our Mayor,

# The New Face of Xeriscape

New research being conducted on sown-meadow implementation

**H**uman beings benefit from plants. Obvious benefits include food and shelter, but human beings also benefit mentally and emotionally. “Plant experiences,” whether in the wild or in gardens, are linked to human health in profound ways. Many studies have shown that exposure to urban greenspace lowers risk of mental illness, increases physical activity, and promotes overall wellbeing. At the same time, the rapid growth of urban areas in Colorado along with climate change means that this natural connection is at risk. Outdated landscape practices tax our limited resources, especially water.

In order to face the challenges of creating urban greenspaces that work for residents—not only meeting basic needs like storm-water management or even just filling space, but also enhancing day-to-day life—CSU Extension in Douglas and Arapahoe Counties have launched a project to investigate techniques for the installation and maintenance of high-functioning, urban green spaces. Our aim is to develop communities of plants that provide: **1)** stable, ecological populations with long, heavy blooming seasons; **2)** complete coverage of plant material to resist weed invasion; and **3)** less maintenance than turfgrass. These plant communities, installed as informal meadows, would need far less water and fertilizer than a typical lawn, and require mowing only once a year.

Researchers at the University of Sheffield in the United Kingdom demonstrated the feasibility of seeding to install flower-rich, low-maintenance landscapes that elicit strong physical and mental health responses. The London Olympic Park, where acres of heavily flowering meadows were installed from seed, is perhaps the most widely known example. These projects, though, were implemented in climates with regular precipitation. Practices leading to success in a seasonally dry climate like Colorado are less known. Two “seeded meadow” gardens have been installed at Denver Botanic Gardens since 2017.

Those projects have demonstrated the need for modifying the “Sheffield approach” for success, particularly in the soil used and the species selection. CSU Extension in Douglas County installed a pilot research plot in fall 2020; three more test gardens in partnership with regional municipalities in Lone Tree and Englewood will be installed in the fall of 2021. Cherry Hills Village is exploring the possibility of partnering in 2022.

In these first gardens, we are testing drought-tolerant plant species mixes for ease of establishment from seed. Because public support is vital to long-term success and wider implementation, part of the research project will also investigate public perceptions of these gardens. Interviews and perception surveys will be conducted with local citizens. Results of this research will allow wider implementation of gardens that improve human health, beautify cities, and preserve natural resources.



The Cherry Hills Village Art Commission (CHVAC) was thrilled to see so many residents come out for their annual "Art in the Park" fundraiser event held at City Hall on Thursday, August 26th. The event featured the Commission's latest sculpture on loan piece *Windsong III* by Robert Mangold. Unfortunately Mr. Mangold was unable to attend the event, but his assistant, Reven Swanson, was able to provide the attendees insight into his process and his vision while creating the piece.

## BE A PART OF THE HIGH LINE CANAL'S LARGEST TREE PLANTING EFFORT SINCE 1990

Sign up for a volunteer tree planting event with the High Line Canal Conservancy this fall

The 71 miles of the High Line Canal are home to over 23,000 mature trees (trees larger than six inches in diameter), making the Canal a vital component of the region's urban forest. Cottonwoods have been the defining tree of the Canal corridor for over a century, with a 2016 inventory finding cottonwoods

to compose over 40% of the Canal's canopy. As many of these cottonwoods near the end of their lifespan and become increasingly stressed by low water availability, it is crucial that new trees are planted along the corridor to revitalize the canopy for years to come.

This year, the Conservancy and local jurisdictions are initiating new plantings along the corridor, with 225 new trees being planted across the Canal in Centennial, Denver, Greenwood Village, and Littleton. Greenwood Village already planted 50 saplings along the Canal in the summer of 2021, while Cherry Hills Village is working on extending irrigation lines to facilitate future tree plantings on the Canal.
