

## MASTER PLAN UPDATE Open House

**O**n behalf of the Planning and Zoning Commission, City staff and the project consultant RICK Engineering, will host the first open house for the City's Master Plan update. The open house will be held at John Meade Park at 120 Meade Lane on September 29, 2021 (if weather determines it is necessary, the open house will be moved to Council Chambers). The open house will start at 5pm and conclude at 7pm. There will not be a formal presentation so please stop by at your convenience. Instead, there will be several stations on different topics where there will be an opportunity to ask questions and provide your input. The first open house is intended to be a high-level information exchange that will help guide future Master Plan elements.

The Master Plan is a critical document that the City uses to help make decisions about a variety of things. From funding capital improvement projects to making decisions on land use applications, the Master Plan is the City's guide. Per Colorado state law, every jurisdiction is required to have a Master Plan (sometimes called a Comprehensive Plan). The Master Plan is a long-range policy document that generally looks at time horizons of 20 to 30 years. It is standard practice for communities to update their Master Plan every five to ten years. The first Master Plan in the City of Cherry Hills Village was adopted in 1970 and was updated in 1993. The current Master Plan was adopted in 2008. # THE AMAZING MONARCH

## *Migration*

Monarch butterflies are an iconic species in the United States! These bright orange and black butterflies are known for their migration in North America. How do these small creatures make the 3,000-mile journey every year?

### Life Cycle

All butterflies including monarchs go through a lifecycle called metamorphosis that includes an egg, caterpillar, a pupa called a chrysalis, and an adult butterfly. When monarchs are caterpillars, their job is to feed as much as possible. They feed exclusively on milkweed plants (*Asclepias spp.*). Look for caterpillars with white, yellow, and black stripes. Once they have fully grown, they will find a safe space to form a chrysalis. The chrysalis is a protective covering for the caterpillar while it transforms into a butterfly. It begins as a pale green color, then gradually turns black and orange as the butterfly gets ready to emerge. After emergence, the butterfly will soon search for a mate and the female will begin laying eggs on new milkweed plants.

### Migration

Adult butterflies live only two to five weeks. The only exception is the overwintering generation of monarchs that can live up to nine months in Mexico. Once spring arrives, this overwintering generation will migrate north to Texas and surrounding areas. The females will lay eggs for the next generation. Once the next generation becomes adult butterflies, they continue to migrate north. After a few weeks, they will lay eggs for another generation. Typically, monarchs will have two to three generations throughout the summer season. Once fall arrives, the fourth generation, also known as the overwintering generation, will begin to migrate south back to

Mexico. How does each generation of monarch know how to navigate migration? For other migratory species like Swainson's hawks, they follow their parents and large groups of hawks to the overwintering grounds in Argentina. Scientists are still researching how monarchs are able to migrate to the same location every year. Recent research suggests they use a combination of the sun's position in the sky, landmarks like mountains, and an internal magnetic compass. Genetics may also play a role in the ability to navigate.

Monarchs have two migratory pathways in North America. The eastern monarch population migrates from Mexico up north through the Midwest and eastern US. The western monarch population migrates from the Pacific Coast of California to the states west of the Rocky Mountains. While Colorado is not on one of the main migratory corridors, you can still see monarchs throughout our state.

### Supporting Monarchs

You can support monarch butterflies and other pollinators by providing food, habitat, water, and space in your landscape. Each species of butterfly has a different caterpillar host plant. Monarchs rely on milkweed plants for caterpillar food. Adult butterflies will visit a variety of other flowers for nectar. Plant flowers that have different bloom times so you'll have flowers all season. Butterflies need sunny areas and places to shelter from wind and weather. Planting a variety of trees and shrubs can help provide sheltering areas. Be mindful of pesticide use because they can harm caterpillars and butterflies.

# Arapahoe County SHAREBACK AND GRANT FUNDING

In 2003, Arapahoe County voters approved a resolution imposing a 0.25 County Open Space Sales and Use Tax on retail sales. This tax is equal to 25 cents on every \$100 spent. The tax is effective Jan. 1, 2004 through Dec. 31, 2023 for the purpose of preserving open space in Arapahoe County. The funds are distributed back to municipalities through Shareback, Grants, and Special Projects.

Cherry Hills Village receives payment of Shareback funds from the County on an annual basis. From

2016-2021, the City has received a total of \$1,030,425 through the Shareback program. These funds can be used for park improvements, acquisition, development, and maintenance. This money has been used for improvements such as resurfacing the city's riding arenas, bank stabilization of Little Dry Creek through Woodie Hollow Park, the design of the new features at John Meade Park, and maintenance of existing park amenities.

The city also receives funds through the Arapahoe County Open Space grant program. CHV is eligible to apply for these grants for planning and projects within the village. Since 2016, the city has received a total of \$949,000 in grants from ACOS. These grants have helped complete projects such as the redevelopment of John Meade Park and the High Line Canal trail connection at Hampden.



# MAYOR'S REPORT

*This month a timeline of significant historical dates and decision points relate to Quincy Farm.*



In my August and September 2020 Mayors reports I described the extensive restrictions on use and public access imposed by Quincy Farm conservation easement. In January's report I provided several FAQs and reported the City's decision to extend a request for proposals. [www.cherryhillsvillage.com/332/The-Village-Crier](http://www.cherryhillsvillage.com/332/The-Village-Crier). Below I share a timeline of significant events.

**1898.** The property, originally deeded to the Union Pacific Railway by the United States government, is purchased by John and James Hopkins, who immediately construct the Victorian house that now fronts Quincy Avenue. The Hopkins house is the oldest intact farmhouse in Cherry Hills Village.

**1922.** The property and surrounding acreage are purchased by Myron Kerr Blackmer who constructs the barns and main house, which is designed by Roland Linder, a prominent Denver architect.

**1951.** Mr. Blackmer sells about 275 acres to a partnership of eleven prominent Denver businessmen, including Dwight D. Eisenhower. As part of the transaction, Ed Honnen, acquires the 17.5 acres with the Hopkins house, main house and barns, and names the property "Quincy Farm."

**1964.** Catherine Anderson acquires the property from Ed Honnen and establishes residence with her husband Keith and their family.

**December 14, 2007.** Catherine Anderson conveys a Conservation Easement on the property to Colorado Open Lands. The Conservation Easement limits allowed uses and prohibits development or construction of more structures, in perpetuity. Title is conveyed to the City for "good and valuable consideration."

**October 1, 2014.** The Quincy Farm Visioning Committee issues a final

report, which identifies funding challenges posed to the City and cautions that "CHV reserves may not be sufficient to sustain Quincy Farm on top of meeting the increased demands for limited Village funds."

**June 2, 2016.** Catherine Anderson passes away at home, and the City takes possession of the main house. The tenants remain in possession of the Hopkins house and the area east of the Canal.

**February 22, 2019.** Colorado Open Lands disapproves a City proposal to open the Farm to the public daily from sunrise to sunset for a four-month trial period because "We are concerned that your proposal to allow extensive public access of the Farm may negatively impact the Conservation Values of the Property."

**June 14, 2020.** The Quincy Farm Committee prepares and distributes a draft master plan that proposes uses and improvements for the east side of the canal only, at an estimated cost of \$2.5 million. The funding piece of the draft plan is not completed.

**August 7, 2020.** The Anderson family, concerned that the draft master plan did not reflect their vision for the property, transmits a letter to the City expressing a strong interest in exploring a potential transfer of title and assuming the financial challenges of Quincy Farm. The Anderson family letter is supported by neighbors to the property.

**August 18, 2020.** The Quincy Farm Committee votes unanimously to table work on the master plan, and "recommend that the City Council fully explore the opportunity of a potential transfer of Quincy Farm outlined in the letter of interest from the Anderson family."

**May 11, 2021.** The City advertises a public Request for Proposal to persons and entities with potential interest in preserving the property and complying with the Conservation Easement.

**July 14, 2021.** The City receives a

proposal from the Anderson family to take title to the property and assume "the operating and capital expenditure costs required to maintain and preserve the property" in an amount of several million dollars. The proposal also envisions a 501(c)(3) Community Supported Agriculture farm that would give public tours and provide limited public access for specific events and extensive programmed educational activities in partnership with schools and other community organizations. <https://cherryhillsvillage.com/DocumentCenter/View/4043/Anderson-Family-Quincy>

**July 14, 2021.** The City received a proposal from Cherry Hills Land Preserve, a 501(c)(3) non-profit corporation, for public/private partnership, that would not take title to the property but "look to the City to play a significant role in the restoration of the structures and the pond over time in a manner commensurate with public ownership and the assets and capabilities of the City." CHLP's plan proposes contributing several hundred thousand dollars annually for operations, caretakers, extensive educational programming, and allows for limited public access several days a week. <https://cherryhillsvillage.com/DocumentCenter/View/4044/Cherry-Hills-Land-Preserve>

**September 21, 2021.** The City will hold a public meeting to listen to presentations by the Anderson family and the Cherry Hills Land Preserve. City staff will also present two different options – low-cost and high-cost – for the City to maintain title to the property. More public conversations and input will follow and be considered before any final action is proposed or taken.

**Mayor Mondays.** I have had conversations with dozens of citizens and groups about Quincy Farm, and am happy to answer questions. I've resumed regular drop-in office hours on Mondays from 9 to 11 a.m. at City Hall. I'm also available by appointment most other days and times. # Voter Information

## Step 1: Register to Vote in Arapahoe County

### Who can register to vote?

- U.S. citizens who are at least 18 years old
- 16- and 17-year-olds can pre-register to vote

### How to register or update your registration

#### What you will need:

- Your legal name
- Date of birth
- ID number (Social Security or Colorado driver license)

You can select a political party and will need to include your address.

#### Mail, Email or In-Person:

Complete the registration form and return it to our office via email- or print, fill it out and mail it in. You may also schedule an appointment to register in-person at our office.

*Remember to update your voter registration every time you move!*

## Step 2: Receive Your Ballot

- Colorado is a mail ballot state. For each election you are eligible to vote in we will mail a ballot to the address we have on file.
- Ballots are mailed beginning 22 days before an election (early October for a November election).

Receive messages when your ballot is mailed to you and when it has been received by the County.

## Step 3: Vote

#### Vote your mail ballot:

- Make your selections.
- **Sign** your ballot envelope.
- Return your ballot to any 24-hour secure ballot drop box in Arapahoe County (or elsewhere in Colorado).
- You may also send your ballot back in the U.S. mail.
- Ballot must be received by 7 p.m. election day.

**Postmarks do not count!**

- If you need a new mail ballot, call the Arapahoe County Clerk's office for help.

#### Vote in-person:

- If you need to vote in-person, you can visit any vote center in Arapahoe County to get the same ballot we would mail to you.
- Language assistance and accessible ballot marking devices for voters with disabilities are available at all voting centers.
- You must bring an acceptable ID to vote in-person.
- Vote centers are only open certain days and times in the final days leading into the election.

# QUINCY FARM NEXT STEPS

In May 2021, the City published a Request for Proposals (RFP) for Quincy Farm Management and Programming. The RFP closed on July 14th, and the City received two responses: one from Natalie Anderson, Catherine Anderson's granddaughter, and one from the Cherry Hills Land Preserve. At their August 3rd meeting, City Council discussed a process to evaluate the proposals they received. Council determined that proposers will give presentations at the September 21st City Council meeting. Council also requested that staff present two possible options for Quincy Farm that the City could consider as well – one higher cost and one lower cost.

## Fishing at JOHN MEADE PARK



## 2022 City Budget CALENDAR



The City Charter requires that City Council adopt a budget calendar by resolution each year. The following calendar was adopted as the budget calendar for the preparation of the 2022 annual budget by City Council during their January 5, 2021 meeting:

1. The City Manager submits the proposed 2022 budget **on or before September 21, 2021**.
2. The City Council holds a study session to review the proposed 2022 budget **on or before October 5, 2021**.
3. A public hearing will be held concerning the proposed 2022 budget and first readings of the Appropriations Ordinance and Mill Levy Ordinance **on or before November 16, 2021**.
4. The Appropriations Ordinance and Mill Levy Ordinance will be adopted on second reading before the certification of tax levies deadline of **December 15, 2021** required by Arapahoe County Assessor’s Office.
