

## In Memory of Judy Cohen

## PARKS AND TRAILS **RULES**

The Parks Division has been fielding many questions recently about rules for parks and trails. Installation of additional signs are planned for this

fall to help educate trail users and keep everyone safe.

• **Speed Limit:** The speed limit on all trails is 15 miles per hour.

• **Motorized vehicles:**

—Motorized vehicles are generally prohibited on the trails. This includes e-bikes, electric scooters, and similar devices.

—The Municipal Code does include a provision for people with disabilities;

motorized items being used as a mobility device are permitted on trails.

• **Leashes:** Dogs must be leashed in all parks and trails in the Village.

**CALL FOR ENTRIES!!** Watercolor artists, both professionals and amateurs, are invited to submit their paintings of “Colorado Themed Landscapes.” This is the first ever Cherry Hills Village Watercolor Exhibit sponsored by the Cherry Hills Village Art Commission. It will be a juried exhibition, our juror will be professional artist **Boris Shoshensky**, you may learn more about Boris and his art at [borishoshenskyart.com](http://borishoshenskyart.com). Once the paintings have been selected, they will hang in the entry hall at City Hall from early November through May.

The reception date for exhibit opening is to be determined and will be published in a future issue of the Village Crier. Artists can decide if they would like their paintings to be sold during the exhibit; per the City’s Art Display Policy, 10% of all sales must be donated to the Cherry Hills Village Art Commission. Awards for Best in Show, 1st, 2nd and 3rd prize, People’s Choice and Village Award for scenes

specific to Cherry Hills Village will be given. The Best in Show winner will receive \$1,000, 1st place will receive \$600, 2nd place will receive \$500 and 3rd place will receive \$400. Visitors to the exhibit will have the opportunity to vote for a People’s Choice Award.

All paintings must be submitted in .jpeg form for consideration into the exhibit. The photos can be emailed to: [jsager@cherryhillsvillage.com](mailto:jsager@cherryhillsvillage.com). The deadline for submittal is August 16, 2021 by 4:30pm. Submissions must not have been in a previous show and must have been done within the last year. No more than two submissions will be accepted. Artists do not have to live in Colorado, but are responsible for ensuring the paintings arrive in time for the exhibit. Watercolors can include ink or pencil, but no acrylic. Please include the title, description and vision, artist name, price (if for sale), phone number and location of painting.

Artists will be notified by September 1st if your painting has been selected for the show. Selected paintings should be in a light-colored frame with a white or off-white colored mat. All frames must be 16”(w) x 20”(h) in size, no exceptions. Work must be original and in watercolor medium. We look forward to your submittals!

# MAYOR'S REPORT

*This month I report several recent judicial proceedings and decisions with issues of interest or relevance to Cherry Hills Village citizens.*



## **Mayor Kulman – Municipal Term Limits.**

The Colorado Constitution Article XVII, § 11 states that no elected city official may serve more than two consecutive terms in office:

No nonjudicial elected official of any county, city and county, city or town...shall serve more than two consecutive terms in office.

An exception provides that any office which the term is two years or less may serve three consecutive terms. Voters in cities may lengthen or shorten the presumptive limits, but our charter places no limits on the number of terms that councilmembers may serve.

Thornton Mayor Jan Kulman was elected to Thornton City Council in 2013, reelected to Council in 2017, and then elected as mayor in 2019. A citizen recently sued Mayor Kulman, alleging that all nine seats on the Thornton City Council constitute a single “office.” Accordingly, the suit alleges that Kulman is ineligible to seek reelection as mayor in 2021 because she will have already served two consecutive council terms. This is the first time since term limits were adopted that courts have been asked to decide whether “office” means the entire Council as a whole, or parts of that body (mayor or district seat). The ruling in this case is expected soon and will likely affect most municipalities where an elected mayor sits as a voting member of council.

**Mayor Coffman – Free Speech and Campaign Finance.** Last year the Aurora City Council passed a campaign finance ordinance banning any candidate for office in Aurora from helping any

other candidates in any way. Because most elected office holders in Aurora maintain a campaign finance committee, this law prohibited the mayor and any councilmember

from encouraging friends to donate to a candidate, prohibited any assistance to other campaign committees, prohibited taking a position on ballot issues, prohibited sharing of donor lists, and prohibited advising other campaigns on messaging or strategy. Mayor Coffman sued his city, arguing that the law was intended to silence him personally, in violation of his First Amendment rights. An Arapahoe County Judge agreed, holding that these parts of the ordinance “stifle protected speech as well as the related right of association.”

**Candace Bailey – Public Office After Felony Conviction.** Candice Bailey, a self-described activist for racial justice, intends to run for election to Aurora City Council this November, but is prohibited by a provision in the Aurora City Charter that requires that candidates “have no felony convictions.” Ms. Bailey was convicted of a felony more than 20 years ago and served her sentence. The Colorado Constitution, Article VII § 10 however, states that felons who have served their time are invested with full rights of citizenship:

No person while confined in any public prison shall be entitled to vote, but every such person who is released therefrom by virtue of a pardon, or by virtue of having served out his full term of imprisonment, shall without further action, be invested with all the rights of citizenship, except as otherwise provided in this constitution.

Twenty-five other cities in Colorado (but not Cherry Hills Village) also disqualify candidates with any felony conviction.

Those provisions, like Aurora’s are likely to be set aside as preempted by state law.

## **Protection of Private Property.**

In 1975 California enacted a regulation that gave labor organization a “right to take access” to farmers’ private property in order to solicit support for unionization. The question for the United States Supreme Court in *Cedar Point Nursery v. Hassid*, was whether this access regulation was a taking of private property for public use for which California was required to pay just compensation. Noting that protection of private property is indispensable to securing individual freedom, the Court in a 6-3 vote held that the right to exclude others from private property is one of “the most essential sticks in the bundle of rights that are commonly characterized as property.” *Cedar Point* establishes that if a government enacts regulations granting the public physical access to private property, the owner must be paid just compensation.

## **Vulgar Speech and First Amendment.**

A freshman in Mahanoy High School, Pennsylvania, failed to make the varsity cheerleading team. She did not accept the coaches’ decision with good grace. That weekend at a convenience store she posted images on Snapchat to a group of 250 friends with images and a predictably vulgar caption. The next week the school suspended the student from the junior varsity squad. This dispute (amazingly) wound its way to the United States Supreme Court as *Mahanoy Area School District v. B.L.*, which ruled that Mahanoy High violated B.L.’s free-speech rights by punishing her for off-campus (albeit ill-mannered) protected speech. The case has relevance to states and cities that may be tempted to discipline employees for private social media posts.

# Native Plants are Key

## TO A BEAUTIFUL SUSTAINABLE ENVIRONMENT

**D**o you want to attract bees, birds, butterflies and hummingbirds to your garden? Interested in providing food and sanctuary for wildlife and pollinators? Consider using native plants in your landscape.

Butterflies, bees and other insects need a connected pathway for food and shelter during migration. Across the United States, rapid growth and development have significantly increased areas of hardscape and reduced many nesting and feeding locations.

Pollinators forage on flowers

for nectar. Shrubs and trees provide food sources and habitat.

Because natives are already adapted to Colorado's soils and climate, they require fewer inputs in the way of water, soil amendments, fertilizer and maintenance. A combination of trees, shrubs and flowering plants can be used to support a sustainable landscape.

Natives can be added to an established garden or create a new garden with native plants. Native plants typically use less water than other garden cultivars, so be sure and group plants by water needs. Natives do require at least a year of supplemental watering to become established. Thereafter, most natives can survive on rainfall alone. Most natives

prefer lean well-drained soil, so you do not need to till or amend garden beds. If planting in heavy clay, adding squeegee will improve drainage.

Butterflies and hummingbirds are attracted to penstemons, columbine and bee balm. These species come in a variety of colors and sizes. Many species of native bees are attracted to yarrow, flax, goldenrod, and the common sunflower. Be sure and add these to your garden in groups of three or more so that the pollinators can move easily through the garden to forage.

**Are you a bird lover?** Consider planting native shrubs and trees in your landscape. Birds rely on a wide variety of plants that host insects to feed their young. Shrubs and trees produce fruit and seeds for sustenance and provide protective cover from predators. Serviceberry, western sand cherry, golden and wax currant, and snowberry all provide fruits for birds. Native habitat trees include Juniper, Pinon and Ponderosa pine.

**Do you want to attract butterflies to your garden?** Try rabbitbrush, a shrub with showy clusters of yellow flowers in late summer and narrow aromatic leaves. Nursery professionals have developed compact cultivars that fit nicely into more formal landscapes.
