Art for John Meade Park

The Cherry Hills Village Art Commission has chosen acclaimed Colorado artist Joe Norman to design a custom sculpture series to be placed in John Meade Park. The Commission envisioned one of the sculptures being based on the monarch butterfly; the monarch is now endangered, but can be found in Cherry Hills Village in June on its way north and in September on its return migration to the south.

Mr. Norman's proposal includes a series of three 6' sculptures to be placed around the south pond in the park. The pieces appear to be local wildlife (a monarch butterfly, a broad-tailed hummingbird, and a Great Horned Owl) when viewed from one direction and playing children when viewed from a different angle. The artist's description of the sculpture theme is an inspiring message of resiliency, adaptability, and interdependence. The full proposal is available at cherryhillsvillage.com/art, and scale models of each sculpture (pictured here) are available to view at City Hall. The Art Commission will present the series to City Council for approval at the regular meeting on Dec. 14th, 2022 at 6:30pm. This permanent series is intended to be the only art within John Meade Park.

The Art Commission plans to fund the sculptures primarily through community support, and they are nearly halfway to their goal. The three sculptures will total \$120,000 for fabrication and installation. The Holiday Season is a special time of year, and often this is also a time when busy people can become vulnerable to theft and other holiday crime. The Cherry Hills Village Police Department hopes that the following tips will assist in keeping everyone safe during the upcoming Holiday Season. You can never be too careful, too prepared or too aware.

- Keep your garage door closed and locked.
- Lock all outside doors and windows before you leave your home.
- Never leave your keys under doormats, in flower pots, mailboxes or any other “secret” hiding places. Thieves know where to look for hidden keys.
- An alarm system is excellent for home security. If you own an alarm system, make sure it is activated. Also, provide the alarm company with an emergency contact.
- Indoor and outdoor lights should be on automatic timers while you are away.
- If you are away for an extended period of time, arrange for someone to shovel your driveway so it appears that someone is at home.
- Large displays of holiday gifts should not be visible through the windows and doors of your home.

POLICE

- During your vacation, do not have daily deliveries (such as mail, newspapers or flyers, and packages) pile up while you are away. Have the Post Office hold your mail or arrange for someone to empty your mailbox and pick up your newspapers.
- If you are having any services performed while you are gone (such as housekeeping or landscaping), make sure they secure your residence when they are finished.
- Have a responsible person check on your home frequently during your vacation.
- Be cautious of individuals going door-to-door asking for donations for charitable causes as it is a common scam used by criminals.

Housewatch Program

The Cherry Hills Village Police Department offers a housewatch program for all residents. It is a community program that allows residents to request additional police patrol of their unoccupied residential property when they are on vacation or any other absence of the residence. To request this additional housewatch patrol, you can contact the Police Department at (303) 761-8711 during normal office hours (8:00-4:30 p.m.) and provide the following information:

- Name, address and telephone number
- Dates of departure and return
- Names and telephone numbers of housesitter and emergency contacts
- Specific information regarding your residence, such as persons who may be visiting the residence, your alarm company, vehicles that will be parked at the residence, and animals at the residence
- Any other information that will assist officers in monitoring your property

- Shop during day time hours whenever possible. If you must shop at night, go with a friend or a family member. If you are shopping alone during the evening hours, you can ask mall or store security for an escort to your vehicle.
- Avoid wearing expensive jewelry.
- Even though you are rushed and thinking about a thousand things, stay alert to your surroundings.
- Avoid carrying large amounts of cash.
- Keep cash, credit cards or wallet in your front pocket.
- Notify the credit card company immediately if your credit card is lost, stolen or misused.
- Be extra careful if you do carry a purse. They are prime targets of criminals in crowded shopping areas.
- Avoid overloading yourself with packages. It is important to have clear visibility and freedom of motion to avoid mishaps.
- Beware of strangers approaching you for any reason. At this time of year, “con-artists” may try various methods of distracting you with the intention of taking your money or other belongings.

E-Shopping

- Share payment information only with known or reputable vendors.
- Use a credit card instead of a debit card.
- Don’t shop at public hotspots.
- Use strong passwords.

Recreation Reimbursement **REMINDER**



Remember to submit your recreation reimbursement receipts for 2022! The City processes recreation reimbursement requests throughout the year. Normally the deadline is January 15th, but due to the holiday the deadline for submitting your 2022 recreation receipts will be **January 17th**. There will be no exceptions to the January 17th deadline so residents are strongly encouraged to submit all receipts early. If you belong to Greenwood Athletic Club and pay monthly dues, you are eligible for your \$500 reimbursement after 10 months; you do not need to wait until the end of the year to request your reimbursement!

2023 Annual Plan for Quincy Farm

In December 2021, the City signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the Cherry Hills Land Preserve for the management and programming of Quincy Farm. Under this agreement, the future of Quincy Farm will be organically driven by the Cherry Hills Land Preserve (CHLP). Each year, a Quincy Farm team comprised of CHLP board members and staff and city staff will create an Annual Plan for the Farm.

The 2023 Annual Plan was initially presented to City Council at the Sept. 6, 2022 meeting during the study session. At the regular meeting on Sept. 20th, 2022, City Council approved the Cherry Hills Land Preserve's 2023 Annual Plan for Quincy Farm. The plan contains sections for the Vision, Guiding Principles, Budget, 2023 Initiatives (including outreach, programs, site improvements, and fundraising/grants), and Public Access & the Conservation Easement. In addition to City Council approval, Colorado Open Lands (the nonprofit which holds the Conservation Easement) reviewed the plan and determined it was consistent with the easement.

The entire 2023 Annual Plan for Quincy Farm is available on the City's website at cherryhillsvillage.com/quincyfarm, and the Cherry Hills Land Preserve has information about programming and how to get involved at quincyfarm.org.

CHERRY HILLS VILLAGE RECREATION REIMBURSEMENT RULES

Residents of Cherry Hills Village (primary residence only) who participate in a recreation program, activity, class or event offered by a municipal or special district recreation department, a non-profit youth sports organization or any municipal golf course located within the seven-county Denver metropolitan area (Adams, Arapahoe, Boulder, Broomfield, Denver, Douglas, Jefferson) may be eligible for a partial reimbursement of certain costs from the City of Cherry Hills Village. For purposes of this program, “youth sports organization” shall mean a sports organization whose primary purpose is to provide recreational activities for primary or secondary school students.

REIMBURSEMENT PROVISIONS

Each primary household in Cherry Hills Village is eligible for a maximum \$500.00 annual reimbursement when participating in an activity that qualifies for reimbursement. The amount of reimbursement shall be 50 percent of the cost incurred by the resident; however, reimbursement costs shall not exceed a maximum of \$50.00 per single activity, per resident to include memberships and passes. The purchase of a monthly membership, or multiple use pass is considered a single activity. The amount of reimbursement for an annual membership or pass shall be 50 percent of the cost incurred by the resident; however, reimbursement costs shall not exceed a maximum of \$500.00 annually per household. An annual membership is intended to designate a year-long membership and includes such facilities as Greenwood Athletic and Tennis Club and municipal recreation centers such as South Suburban. Seasonal sporting activities such as soccer, baseball, lacrosse, swimming, hockey, gymnastics, etc., are considered single activities.

REIMBURSEMENT PROCEDURE

1. Obtain an itemized receipt that includes the participant's name, address, name of agency, name of activity, activity fee(s) and activity date(s). Receipts must be for the year in which they are paid, not the year in which the activity takes place.

Note: The following will not be accepted as receipts: bank statements, cancelled checks, non-itemized credit card receipts, handwritten receipts and registration forms. Initiation fees, rentals, tax charged, national dues, merchandise, child care, travel, uniforms and golf carts do not qualify for reimbursement.

2. Complete the Recreation Reimbursement Form, attach all itemized receipts and mail or deliver this information to the Village Center by January 15th for the previous year's reimbursements. **NO EXCEPTIONS.**

It is the resident's responsibility to ensure that all recreation reimbursement applications have been received by the City by 4:30 PM on January 15th.

All of the information above will be required and residency will be verified. It is the obligation of the City staff to ensure against abuse of this program and final authority will rest with the City Manager to suspend or eliminate reimbursement requests determined to be in violation of the terms of this program.

SNOW, ICE and STREET SWEEPING Operations

The Cherry Hills Village Public Works Department is responsible for snow, ice and sweeping operations of approximately one hundred lane miles of City streets and approximately eight miles of paved trails and sidewalks. The department provides snow removal and sweeping services to all City streets, paved trails, and sidewalks on a priority basis. It is the department's goal to have all City streets, paved trails and sidewalks maintained within twelve hours after the snow has stopped falling. This time frame estimate is based on an average snow event of four inches. The department will not plow residential streets for snow events of less than three inches as determined by staff.

Street Sweeping is provided in mid-April through early May and again in late October through early November. Sidewalk/Paved Trail Sweeping is done on an as needed basis. When conditions allow, Street Sweeping and Sidewalk/Paved Trail Sweeping Operations directly follow any Snow and Ice Control Operation where sand is used. Street and Sidewalk/Paved Trail Cleaning is provided for community safety, health, environmental, and aesthetic purposes.


Snow and Ice Control Operations start with the monitoring of resources by the Street Operations Supervisor to determine when a response will be needed. The Public Works Department uses many resources to determine when and how snow and ice control operations should begin. Use of the National Weather Service, local television news, web- and phone-based applications, and the City's own weather station with a live feed camera, are how the Public Works Department receives the most current and accurate weather forecast information. This information is used by the Street Operations Supervisor to formulate an email that is sent to the appropriate department heads in Public Works and the Police Department to notify them of time,

resources, and personnel to be used in any upcoming response. Next, the Street Operations Supervisor communicates with all responding personnel to coordinate the appropriate response. Before street conditions start to deteriorate, the response will be initiated.

The City's first priority is to keep primary intersections and collector streets safely maintained to permit emergency vehicles to reach all parts of the city without delay and to facilitate citizen/resident traffic on those streets. This priority is on a selective basis where it has

In the first snowstorm of the year, section one is maintained first, followed by section two, three, and four. In the second storm, section two is cleared first, followed by section three, four and one. This rotation continues throughout the winter so that all parts of the City have the opportunity to be maintained first, and no area is always last.

The map below illustrates our City limits and the streets maintained by the Cherry Hills Village Public Works Department. The red lines show primary intersections and collector streets. These streets and intersections



been determined by the department that these streets are where traffic movement and resultant safety demands are the greatest and impact sizeable portions of the community. The second priority is to safely maintain all remaining residential streets. The third priority is to safely maintain all remaining paved trails and sidewalks.

Primary intersections and collector streets will be first to receive Snow and Ice Control maintenance. The length and severity of the weather event dictates when the department will start Snow and Ice control maintenance on all remaining secondary streets, paved trails, and sidewalks. Typically, this operation begins immediately after the climax of the event and the majority of the snow has stopped accumulating. The City has developed a rotation system for Snow Removal and Sweeping Operations. The City is divided into four sections. Each section contains approximately the same street lane miles.

provide emergency vehicles access to all locations of the City during a snowstorm. The blue lines on the map show East Hampden Avenue, South University Boulevard, and East Bellevue Avenue. These streets are maintained, plowed, and sanded by the Colorado Department of Transportation (CDOT). Only during extreme conditions, and at the request of the Police Department, does the City assist with these streets.

Section 11-1-20 of the Cherry Hills Village Municipal Code requires that residents remove snow and ice from sidewalks on or adjacent to their property within twenty-four hours of accumulation, whether the property is occupied or not.

Remembering Chuck and JoAnn Schloss

Charles Murdock "Chuck" Schloss,
P.E., born September 26, 1930, in Denver,
Colorado, passed away on December 9,
2021, at the age of 91.

He graduated from the University of Colorado with a B.S. in engineering physics and did post-graduate work in orbital mechanics at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and in astrophysics at CU. He founded Schloss Engineered Equipment, Inc., held 13 patents, was a charter member and on the Advisory Board of the CU Boulder Department of Astrophysical and Planetary Sciences, and was the recipient of CU's Distinguished Engineering Alumni award.

He was devoted to his family. His love for his wife, JoAnn Bock Schloss, was as deep after 73 years of marriage as it was when they first fell in love at East High School. He was a loving father who taught his children the importance of integrity and the value of learning, instilling in them that same intellectual vigor that he practiced throughout his life.

He served the City of Cherry Hills Village for 50 years in a variety of capacities including as City Council member, Deputy Mayor, Planning and



Zoning Commissioner, Public Works Manager, Police Commissioner, and Sanitation District Board Member.

Chuck served as an Army officer for 5 years during and after the Korean War. He received a Commendation Medal from the Army for his research and development on guided missiles. He was also awarded the Society of Military Engineers Gold Medal.

JoAnn Bock Schloss, born August 9, 1932 in Denver, Colorado, passed away at age 89, on May 27, 2022.

After raising three children and attending college with her two older children, JoAnn graduated from the University of Colorado, with distinction, Phi Beta Kappa. JoAnn joined the City and County of Denver's Commission on Community Relations, where she established the Commission on Youth while completing an advanced degree at night, honored in a Graduate Fellowship in Organizational Behavior and Communication.

She served as Vice President of Human Resources for Central Bank of Denver, and started her own business: Profitable Decisions, Inc., a research, consulting, and training firm to serve local and national clients who were launching new ventures.

Concurrently, she taught courses in communication, teamwork, business and professional speaking and conflict management at CU Denver, and then moved to Regis University where, for 20 years, she was an affiliate graduate professor of business management for the Masters of Science in Management (later titled Organizational Leadership) in the School for Professional Studies. She received the Excellence in Teaching Award at Regis University.

JoAnn served on many boards and organizations such as Leadership Denver, Colorado Women's Forum, and SCORE (Senior Core of Retired Executives), where she became a certified client mentor and SCORE Denver Chapter Counseling Chair.

Self-described as an outlier, an activist, a leader and a futurist, JoAnn was always ahead of the times, exemplified by her style, taste, actions, conversational content and impact.

Chuck and JoAnn are survived by their three children, Charles Murdock "Chic" Schloss III, Sindi Schloss Romanella, and Kristy Anne Schloss; and two grandchildren.
