UNDER CONSTRUCTION

MAJOR DENVER WATER CONSTRUCTION PROJECT

at East Quincy Avenue and South Holly Street

Denver Water has started a construction project at East Quincy Avenue and South Holly Street to make upgrades to the City's water delivery system. The project will improve underground vault and valve structures to create more flexibility in the system and reduce the probability of emergency projects and water outages. Denver Water continually monitors its aging infrastructure and identifies specific water pipes in the street that need replacement to ensure customers receive a continuous supply of high-quality water.

The work, which will be completed by a contractor, will be done in four phases to limit lengthy traffic impacts. Traffic

control and lane changes will be in place, including detours to the multi-use path. Denver Water expects the project to be complete in summer 2023, with landscape seeding and restoration activities occurring after construction is complete, as weather permits. Working hours will typically be Monday through Friday, 7 a.m. to 5 p.m.

The park on the southeast corner of East Quincy Avenue and South Holly Street will be closed for the duration of the project. Denver Water will work with the City of Cherry Hills Village to restore the park with new landscaping.

Denver Water will provide periodic updates throughout the project via the social media platform Nextdoor. Mailed notices will be sent to customers in the area before the project begins. For questions directly related to this project, please contact WaterUDoing@denverwater.org.

AUTUMN IS FOR APPLES


What says autumn better than apples? Warm apple cider, apple pie, apple butter and fried apples are all delightful as the chill of autumn sets in. There is even an 'Autumn Glory' apple, described as very sweet and crisp with hints of cinnamon and subtle notes of caramel. Sounds delicious, doesn't it?

The State Agricultural College (CSU) bulletin, *Fruit Interests of the State*, published in October 1891 indicates that by the 1890's apples were the primary fruit crop of Colorado. There are several reasons why Colorado is a great place for growing apples. Vernalization, commonly called "chill hours," is vital to the apple tree life cycle. For apple trees to flower and properly set fruit each spring, they must accumulate 600 chill hours between 32°F and 45°F. Apple trees also require at least 6 hours of full sun each day once blossoming begins. Another reason apples grow well in Colorado is they blossom later in the spring making them more likely to avoid most killing frosts. Finally, most apple tree varieties are hardy to Zone 4, so Colorado gardeners have the perfect environment for growing apple trees.

There are good varieties to select from, and research has been underway since 2008 to create an Old Colorado Apples list. The Montezuma Orchard Restoration Project currently lists 436 varieties of apples grown in Colorado prior to 1930. Thirty-one varieties are considered endangered or rare. Endangered varieties such as Fall Jenneting and Johnny Appleseed, or rare varieties such as Fall Pippin and Crimson Beauty are still available through mail order if gardeners want to establish an "old orchard" reminiscent of 1891 Colorado apple orchards.

Gardeners may also consider another Old Colorado Apple, the elusive but recently re-discovered Colorado Orange apple, originating from Colorado with its distinctive characteristics: yellow with a reddish blush, complex flavor of tart and sweet with a bit of a citrus bite. Sounds delicious.

As Martin Luther said, **"Even if I knew that tomorrow the world would go to pieces, I would still plant my apple tree."**

The Time of Use Starting Oct. 1 in Cherry Hills Village From Xcel Energy

Time of Use:

A new way to track energy use

Starting in October, residents in Cherry Hills Village who have received their new smart meter or non-communicating meter will transition to Xcel Energy Time of Use Rates. Instead of a flat rate for electricity throughout the day, the price for electricity will vary on weekdays, with a peak price between 3 p.m. and 7 p.m. and lower prices at other times of day and on weekends. Reducing energy use during that peak period will help you save on your bills and build a cleaner energy future for Colorado.

Why Make this Change?

By reducing electric use on the grid during peak times, Xcel Energy can reduce coal and natural gas generation and rely more on renewable energy. Most importantly, it gives you more control over your electric bill. Shifting some of your electricity use to off-peak times takes advantage of lower rates. Making a few changes, like heating or cooling your home outside of peak hours or doing laundry and running the dishwasher later in the evening, can help you save money and help reduce carbon emissions.

How will I be notified?

Xcel Energy will notify customers 60 days before their rate changes. You'll also receive communication about the rate change 30 and 15 days prior to being enrolled. Any customer can opt out of the Time of Use rate with a 30-day notice to

Xcel Energy. Customers who opt out of the Time of Use rate will be placed on the Residential Opt-out rate. This rate changes seasonally, regardless of what time the customer uses energy or how much energy they use. In order to formally opt out, customers should call 800-895-4999.

What if I haven't received my smart meter?

Many Cherry Hills Village residents have received their smart meter, however some residential customers who have larger lots or are larger AMP service (400amps and above) will receive their smart meter in late 2022 or early 2023. Customers start on the Time of Use rates twice per year, April and October, following the smart meter installation.

MAYOR'S REPORT

This month a reflection on recent projects, challenges, and public achievements in our Village.

Public Safety. Following the retirement of Chief Tovrea, the Village gathered three advisory panels comprised of citizens, staff, and local criminal justice professionals, to interview candidates to serve as the new Chief of Police. Following interviews and a thorough background investigation, our City Manager selected Jason Lyons, who was serving as the Police Commander in Castle Rock. Chief Lyons is superbly qualified and has moved smoothly into the position of Chief of Police for Cherry Hills Village. The Village is evaluating enhanced community surveillance capabilities that will include partnering with Home Owner Associations that already have camera systems. The Police Foundation has provided funds to purchase first responder kits for all officers. The Village website contains links to the LexisNexis Community Crime Map that shows the locations of reported criminal activity in the Village, and NotifyMe allows residents to sign-up to receive news and alerts from the Police Department. Sign up at cherryhillsvillage.com/NotifyMe.

Cherry Hills Village Master Plan Update. State law requires cities to adopt a master plan and our municipal code requires the Planning and Zoning Commission to review the master plan no less frequently than once every ten years. For this project, Village residents formed a Citizens Advisory Taskforce (CAT) to provide advice and direction. The Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z), which is responsible under our Charter for the master plan, has held many public meetings and conducted surveys throughout the community. A final round of public input will occur later this fall. The CAT and P&Z explored issues such as multi-modal improvements, exterior lighting, public safety, the High Line Canal, and city-wide drainage improvements. Citizen comments and other information from the public meetings and surveys has been posted at chvillagevision.com. Council will approve a final master plan update in the next few months.



John Meade Park. The Village completed a \$3.4 million reconstruction of John Meade Park. Arapahoe County contributed \$500,000 for the project through a grant from the Open Space and Trails Advisory Board. The

Mile High Flood District contributed \$300,000 toward the project to improve the floodplain and restore portions of the riparian habitat within the park. The old fire station was demolished, the ponds dredged, and a new shelter and walks constructed. John Meade Park now takes its place alongside City Hall and the Joint Public Safety Facility completing the Village Center Campus envisioned by the Village's Citizen's City Center Committee.

Quincy Farm. The Village extended requests for proposals to area non-government organizations with interest in partnering with the City in Quincy Farm's operation, maintenance, and preservation. The Cherry Hills Land Preserve, Inc., a local 501(c)(3) organization, responded with a proposal to assist in the operation and financial support of the property, the use of which is restricted by a conservation easement held by Colorado Open Lands. The Land Preserve will soon submit to Council its first annual management plan for the Farm.

High Line Canal Stormwater Master Plan. The City recently met with fourteen neighboring jurisdictions to agree on a plan to transform the High Line Canal from a water delivery utility to a 78 mile-long stormwater detention facility and linear park. As a result of those conversations, the Village signed an inter-governmental agreement creating the High Line Canal Collaborative. This year the Village is performing an engineering study of the four-mile stretch of the Canal in Cherry Hills Village to understand the cost to the Village to construct storm water gates and overflow locations.

High Line Canal Underpass. Cherry Hills Village, the City and County of Denver, Arapahoe County, the Colorado Department of Transportation, and the High Line Canal Conservancy working together completed the \$7 million pedestrian underpasses at Hampden and

Colorado Boulevard to create a safe route to walk, run, and cycle the High Line Canal trail north from our Village.

Glenmoor/Bellevue Traffic Signal.

Our Village, Greenwood Village, Glenmoor County Club, and Glenmoor Homeowner's Association partnered to install a traffic signal at the intersection of Glenmoor Drive/Steele Street and Bellevue Avenue. Our Village funded 25% of the cost, Greenwood Village 50%, and Glenmoor Country Club and Glenmoor HOA 25%. The new signal has improved safety on Bellevue and access to the Glenmoor community.

Bellevue Medians Enhancements.

Greenwood Village invested more than \$2 million for improvements to ten Bellevue Avenue medians adjacent to Cherry Hills Village. Cherry Hills Village is contributing up to \$60,000 annually for the next several years for irrigation and maintenance costs.

Quincy Avenue Utility Lines. The City completed undergrounding of Quincy Avenue utility lines from Happy Canyon Road to Holly Street, using the 1% Xcel undergrounding fund. This project followed the recommendation of the 2015 CHV Citizens Utility Line Undergrounding Study Committee.

Sanitary Sewer Consolidation. The Village Master Plan identifies as a priority the consolidation and eventual transfer of City-owned sewer districts. In 2014 the Village imposed a fee increase for residents in City-owned districts and developed a plan to repair and rehabilitate Village-owned sewer systems. The second phase of this work was completed in 2022.

City Council Live Meetings and Digital Recordings. In early 2020 Council began live-streaming and digitally recording their meetings. These can now be watched either as they occur or later on the Village website at cherryhillsvillage.com/MeetingVideos.
