Conservation on the High Line Canal: A PARTNERSHIP WITH DENVER BOTANIC GARDENS AND THE HIGH LINE CANAL CONSERVANCY

Since 2018, Denver Botanic Gardens and the High Line Canal Conservancy have partnered in a mission to safeguard the High Line Canal's enduring legacy as a beloved recreational space and resilient ecological asset.


This collaboration focuses on examining plant biodiversity, water and trees. The Gardens has conducted a botanical inventory that delves into the Canal's ecosystem to deepen our understanding of urban plant diversity. The Gardens has also researched the dynamic interplay between green stormwater

infrastructure and plants and is continuing to study newly planted trees to help plan for the future of the Canal tree canopy.

The collective goal of these endeavors is threefold: to contribute to our fundamental understanding of urban ecology and plant diversity, address specific questions surrounding Canal conservation, and use the acquired knowledge to forge novel connections between the public and the Canal. This partnership, a testament to the power of collaboration and research, is dedicated to preserving and enhancing the High Line Canal for generations to come.

MAYOR/COUNCIL REPORT

CRIME SPREE UPDATE

Two months ago we were all alarmed to learn that over two nights, 6 homes were broken into and 4 cars were stolen in Cherry Hills. We were not alone in experiencing this crime spree. Similar incidents occurred from Brighton to Castle Rock as organized crime groups struck across the metroplex. Our police force, led by Chief Jason Lyons, worked with an inter-jurisdictional task force to investigate and pursue the perpetrators. According to Chief Lyons there have been arrests in some of the related crimes in other jurisdictions and the investigation into the crimes in our community continues.

I applaud Chief Lyons for the many steps he took in immediate response to the crime spree. He held a well attended town hall to discuss what happened and what the police force was doing to respond to the crimes. He took questions for over two hours, responding to residents who were both civil and at times frustrated. Clearly, members of the audience were concerned, frightened and apprehensive. But Chief Lyons took the time to answer questions and explain the different ways the police were responding to the outbreak. In particular, the force has increased the use of technology, including traffic cameras and heat detecting drones, which help expand the reach of the force in detecting criminal activity. He also combined his forces' efforts with those of other municipalities to leverage the strength of various departments to track

down the suspects. Finally, he discussed the relatively simple steps we can each take to limit these crimes, such as locking our doors at night, not keeping keys in our cars even if the car is in the garage and locking our cars.

I am happy to report there have been no additional crimes by this organized group in Cherry Hills since the incidents two months ago. In fact, I suspect because people are being more vigilant in locking cars, not keeping valuables in cars, and locking our doors, the incidents of theft and burglary have dropped to 2 thefts from a motor vehicle and no car thefts or burglaries in September.

We each have a responsibility to take steps to protect our homes and communities. ***This year, 80% of residential car break-ins were of unlocked cars and 80% of cars stolen had the keys in them.*** We are naïve to think that we are a community that is immune to the crime issues plaguing other nearby communities, when anyone can easily walk or drive into Cherry Hills. Criminals look for crimes of opportunity, such as an unlocked car with the keys in it, a laptop left on a car seat in an unlocked car, an open or unlocked garage, or packages sitting on a front porch. Take your keys and valuables with you and lock the car when you leave it. Before you go to bed check not only that the front and back door are locked, but also that the doors into your garage are locked. If you park a car in the driveway, do not

leave a garage door opener in the car, or even worse, your keys.

New Police Website

I want to encourage you to visit the new police website, www.chvpd.com where you can find a police blotter alerting you to recent police activity, tips to keep you and your family safe, requests from the police for help in solving recent crimes and information about the Cherry Hills police force. Under the forms button you can sign up for the *Vacation Home Check* and the police will check your home every other day (subject to officer availability) while you are on vacation. You can also sign up to receive notifications from the police force.

Cherry Hills Village is lucky to have one of the lowest crime rates in the metroplex and one of the highest ratios of police officers to residents. As Chief Lyons says in his message on the police website, “We strongly believe in the importance of engaging and ***partnering with our community***, which keeps Cherry Hills Village an exceptional place to visit and call home.” In order for it to be a true partnership, we as residents need to do our part to help prevent crime and support the police. Lock your doors, take your valuables and keys with you and be responsible.

'Resilience' Sculptures FOR JOHN MEADE PARK

Acclaimed Colorado artist Joe Norman has designed a custom sculpture series for John Meade Park, and the sculptures are now underway! All three pieces appear to be local wildlife (a monarch butterfly, a broad-tailed hummingbird, and a Great Horned Owl) when viewed from one direction and playing children when viewed from a different angle. Scale models of each sculpture are available to view at City Hall. The artist has shared process photos from his Loveland studio.

Installation in the park will take place before the end of the year.

The three sculptures total \$120,000 for fabrication and installation and are being funded primarily through community support. Donors of \$100 or more will appear on a recognition plaque. 



CHERRY HILLS VILLAGE RECREATION REIMBURSEMENT RULES

Residents of Cherry Hills Village (primary residence only) who participate in a recreation program, activity, class or event offered by a municipal or special district recreation department, a non-profit youth sports organization or any municipal golf course located within the seven-county Denver metropolitan area (Adams, Arapahoe, Boulder, Broomfield, Denver, Douglas, Jefferson) may be eligible for a partial reimbursement of certain costs from the City of Cherry Hills Village. For purposes of this program, “youth sports organization” shall mean a sports organization whose primary purpose is to provide recreational activities for primary or secondary school students.

REIMBURSEMENT PROVISIONS

Each primary household in Cherry Hills Village is eligible for a maximum \$500.00 annual reimbursement when participating in an activity that qualifies for reimbursement. The amount of reimbursement shall be 50 percent of the cost incurred by the resident; however, reimbursement costs shall not exceed a maximum of \$50.00 per single activity, per resident to include memberships and passes. The purchase of a monthly membership, or multiple use pass is considered a single activity. The amount of reimbursement for an annual membership or pass shall be 50 percent of the cost incurred by the resident; however, reimbursement costs shall not exceed a maximum of \$500.00 annually per household. An annual membership is intended to designate a year-long membership and includes such facilities as Greenwood Athletic and Tennis Club and municipal recreation centers such as South Suburban. Seasonal sporting activities such as soccer, baseball, lacrosse, swimming, hockey, gymnastics, etc., are considered single activities.

REIMBURSEMENT PROCEDURE

1. Obtain an itemized receipt that includes the participant's name, address, name of agency, name of activity, activity fee(s) and activity date(s). Receipts must be for the year in which they are paid, not the year in which the activity takes place.

Note: The following will not be accepted as receipts: bank statements, cancelled checks, non-itemized credit card receipts, handwritten receipts and registration forms. Initiation fees, rentals, tax charged, national dues, merchandise, childcare, travel, uniforms and golf carts do not qualify for reimbursement.

2. Complete the Recreation Reimbursement Form, attach all itemized receipts and mail or deliver this information to the Village Center by **4:30pm on the second Friday in January** for the previous year's reimbursements. **NO EXCEPTIONS.**

It is the resident's responsibility to ensure that all recreation reimbursement applications have been received by the City by 4:30 PM on the second Friday in January.

All of the information above will be required and residency will be verified. It is the obligation of the City staff to ensure against abuse of this program and final authority will rest with the City Manager to suspend or eliminate reimbursement requests determined to be in violation of the terms of this program.

Marlis Earl Smith, age 91, of Cherry Hills Village, CO passed away peacefully on Sunday, September 10, 2023. Marlis, also known as “Senior” and “Granddad” and most recently and adoringly as “Papa” was born on August 25, 1932, in Lubbock, Texas, the son of Alma (Greene) and Robert Earl Smith.



Marlis graduated in 1954 from Texas Tech University (where he also met his future wife, Shirley Shields, on a blind date) with a degree in Petroleum Geology and as an ROTC cadet.

In 1965 the young family moved to Denver, Colorado where Marlis was employed as District Geologist for Amoco Corporation. In 1980 he founded Four-Ten Exploration, an oil and gas exploration partnership. Marlis continued in the oil and gas industry for the remainder of his life.

Marlis had a keen eye for real estate; a life-long passion for automobiles and aircraft; served as a National Trustee of the Phi Gamma Delta Educational Foundation; enjoyed playing tennis with family and friends, was a passionate supporter of arts organizations and loved collecting.

Marlis will be dearly missed by his family and friends.

Public Works

The mission of the Cherry Hills Village Public Works Department is to provide high quality streets, infrastructure, parks, and open space for all residents. The Department strives to be stewards of the environment and be fiscally responsible in all aspects of its operations. The Cherry Hills Village Department of Public Works is comprised of 2 main divisions (Parks and Streets) with 18 full-time employees who possess special skills and knowledge acquired through education, training, and experience to meet the public's needs. The Department also employs 6 seasonal employees in the summer. Some of the many responsibilities of the Department include:

- Maintain 50 miles of streets (100 lane miles)
- Maintain 26 miles of bridle trails, 55 acres of open space and park land
- Stormwater management
- Operate 6.8 miles of sanitary sewer lines
- Oversee all City facility maintenance and repairs
- Plan and manage recreation special events
- Administer the Recreation Reimbursement Program
- Manage the household hazardous waste program and Spring Clean-Up
- Right-of-way construction permitting
- Capital construction management
- Snow removal
