## NFL Hall of Famer **PEYTON MANNING** Named Honorary Chair of 123rd U.S. Amateur Championship

Denver's Cherry Hills Country Club the historic William Flynn-designed golf course set against panoramic views of the Rockies will host its third United States Amateur Championship August 14-20. Fans will have a chance to walk the fairways with the world's best amateur golfers and future stars of the game as tickets for the Championship are now available for purchase.

The USGA is offering individual single-day Gallery tickets and five-packs of Gallery tickets that can be used over multiple days or shared with family and friends. Each individual ticket may be used for any one day of the of the championship (Monday through Sunday) and will include general admission to the grounds, access to walk the historic course and access to purchase on-site food and beverages. Monday and Tuesday tickets will provide access to both Cherry Hills Country Club and nearby Colorado Golf Club, the stroke-play co-host site.

Juniors ages 17 and under will be granted complimentary Gallery admission for any day of the event by visiting the Ticket Office with a ticketed or credentialed adult to receive a hand stamp. There is a maximum of four junior tickets per ticketed or credentialed adult.

In addition, Peyton Manning, a two-time Super Bowl champion and first-ballot Pro Football Hall of Famer, has been named honorary chair of the 2023 U.S. Amateur Championship. Manning had an illustrious 18-season career as the quarterback of the Indianapolis Colts and Denver Broncos.

"I am honored to represent the state of Colorado, the city of Denver and Cherry Hills as the honorary chair of the 2023 U.S. Amateur," said Manning. "As someone who has great enthusiasm for not only the game of golf, but also for


competitive athletics and all the great things that can be learned through sports, I’m thrilled to have a role in this championship. I’m confident Colorado’s golf fans will join me in welcoming the game’s best amateur players to Denver.”

Cherry Hills Country Club, celebrating its 100th anniversary as a club this summer, previously hosted the USGA’s oldest national championship in 1990 and 2012. Future six-time major winner Phil Mickelson brought home the U.S. Amateur title in 1990. The 2012 championship is now remembered for welcoming one of the deepest fields of future professional stars in the history of the event. Tennessee’s Steven Fox defeated Michael Weaver in an epic 37-hole final match.

Future PGA Tour winners and major champions in the 2012 U.S. Amateur field included Justin Thomas, Jordan Spieth, Bryson DeChambeau and Hideki Matsuyama. Other eventual PGA Tour winners include Xander Schauffele, Max Homa, Daniel Berger, Taylor Gooch, Mackenzie Hughes, Trey Mullinax, Sepp Straka, and Aaron Wise. Together, this group has compiled a staggering 70 PGA Tour wins and seven major championships.

Just as vital to Cherry Hills Country Club as hosting national golf championships on a regular basis, is a dedication and passion to give back to the game and create turning-point opportunities for youth in the local community. Proceeds from the Championship will be donated to charities across Colorado including the Palmer Scholarship, the Western Golf Association’s Evans Scholars Foundation and The First Tee with the goal of growing the game of golf, assisting with scholarships, and impacting the lives of young people across the Centennial State.

“Hosting the U.S. Amateur Championship for the third time brings great pride to the club and the community,” said Cherry Hills Country Club President Kim Koehn. “Cherry Hills has been hosting golf’s most historic championships since the 1938 United States Open, and we’re excited to add to Cherry Hills’ rich golfing legacy. Together with the USGA, we share a powerful and galvanizing vision to host major events in a manner that welcomes, inspires, and unites all in attendance with a spirit of pride and appreciation for all the good golf can bring.”



# MAYOR/COUNCIL REPORT

## WHAT IS HOME RULE?

Cherry Hills Village is one of a hundred towns and cities in Colorado governed by Home Rule. You ask what is Home Rule? Well, a little bit of history and explanation follows.

In 1902, Home Rule governance for cities and towns was established by amending Colorado's Constitution. Municipal Home Rule was adopted by state voters in 1902 and expanded by voters in 1912. In 1912 Section 6 of Article XX of the Constitution was rewritten to enumerate various Home Rule powers and included a powerful "catch-all" paragraph:

"It is the intention of the article to grant and confirm to the people of all municipalities coming within its provisions the full right of self-government in both local and municipal matters and the enumeration herein of certain powers should not be construed to deny such cities and towns, and to the people thereof, any right or power essential or proper to the full exercise of that right."

Home Rule is a form of government that is defined by the citizens of a Village (like us) through our locally enacted charter and ordinances. It allows for more control over matters of local significance. Cherry Hills Village adopted Home Rule by vote in 1966.

Once Home Rule was adopted by Cherry Hills Village, we residents acquired the power to legislate and control:

1. Organization and Structure – number of elected offices, dates of elections, powers of mayor, qualifications of employees, etc.
2. Procedures – ordinance adoption procedures, broader local zoning,

subdivision, and land use provisions, municipal court procedures, etc.

3. Finances – local collection and enforcement of sales taxes, real estate tax transfer taxes, special improvement taxes, municipal bond repayment schedule, etc.
4. Other – broader eminent domain power, etc.

Article XX of the Colorado Constitution grants us the general and specific powers identified above to allow us flexibility in seeking solutions to local problems. It empowers local citizens to have more control over local concerns, enjoying freedom from state interference in local matters. We can shape solutions to fit our local needs, without a top-down approach from the state.

Maintaining control over local issues related to zoning is critical to Cherry Hills Village. As has been publicized recently and thoroughly, Home Rule is under attack by the proposed Senate Bill 23-213.

which as originally drafted would allow the state of Colorado to take control over local land use.

Specifically as it affects zoning and land use, Colorado courts have always held that zoning is a matter of local concern. Cherry Hills Village has adopted a Master Plan which presumes that we will continue to control land use. Let us hope that Home Rule is not eliminated by Senate Bill 23-213. That is a bit of promotion on behalf of City Council.

I hope this brief introduction to Home Rule is beneficial. Your City Council feels that Home Rule as established by the Colorado constitution will allow us to continue to control land use in our Village despite Senate Bill 23-213. We will hear by the end of the current legislative session where we stand.

# GROWING DELICIOUS



## Homegrown Tomatoes!

### Summer just isn't summer without succulent, homegrown tomatoes.

Tomatoes are the number one vegetable gardeners like to grow. And why? Well of course, their delectable, fresh taste simply cannot be replicated with grocery store tomatoes. There comes a certain satisfaction in growing them yourself. In Colorado, we have our challenges growing tomatoes with intense heat and temperature swings, high altitude, clay soils and a short growing season. We are here to tell you it can be done and done well!

If you want to celebrate this summer season with plentiful tomatoes of all types, consider these tips to help you grow a bounty. First, a good tomato plant needs great soil to really thrive. Aged compost is your best friend for tomato beds. Because tomatoes are heavy feeders, they need soil filled with nutrients. Start building your own rich soil by working in compost, grass clippings and shredded leaves from your lawn. Whether it is store bought or homemade, your veggies will love you for it. If you choose to add manure, do this in the fall after you have cleaned debris out of your veggie beds. Such a practice protects your garden from "hot" manure that has not been aged well and could otherwise burn plants.

Supplemental feeding is something to consider when growing tomatoes. Many types of fertilizer are available, both granular and water-soluble. It is good practice to feed with a supplement every few weeks, but always check the labels and follow the directions with any product.

Proper spacing and staking/caging tomato plants is especially important. Tomato plants perform best when you give them support; get those plants off the ground! Tomatoes can be heavy, especially large beefsteak tomatoes we all love in Caprese salads! 18"-24" is ideal spacing between plants for maximal airflow. Proper spacing also helps prevent disease from spreading between plants.

Finally, in our hot weather, tomatoes need regular moisture. Did you know tomato leaves do not like water? Watering from above leaves droplets that can promote disease or even burn leaves from intense sun. It is good practice to water with drip irrigation, close to the base of the plant if possible. Tomato plants need about an inch of water a week.

If you use drip irrigation, use a timer and water deeply in the morning. Rather than many short watering times, tomatoes perform better with consistent deep watering.

Start with these tomato growing tips so your baskets will be full of multi-colored orbs of delicious joy come August!

## TREE DONATION PROGRAM

**Did you know that Cherry Hills Village has a Tree Donation Program?** This program allows friends and families to donate and dedicate trees in honor or memory of a loved one. The individual or family to whom the tree is dedicated must have some connection to Cherry Hills Village. Tree donations will be considered for all parks, trails and open spaces within the Village, upon approval of a suitable location by Village staff. Village staff works with the donor to determine a species of tree that is mutually acceptable and appropriate for its location. Tree caliper will be a minimum of 2." Trees may be recognized with a plaque. The design of memorial plaques is established by the Village to promote consistency in cost, size, type and mounting.

Tree donation fees are \$1,000. This includes the cost for the tree, plaque, planting, and future maintenance. The Parks Division will provide care for the tree as needed throughout its lifespan. Donations are first presented to the Parks, Trails, and Recreation Commission for consideration and then to City Council for final approval.

### Acceptable Items for drop-off:

- Shredding
- Tree branches and yard debris (no more than two pickup/trailer loads per household)
- Car batteries (provided they are not leaking)
- Consumer electronics (laptops, desktops, monitors, microwaves, cell phones, printers, gaming systems, CD/DVD players, fax machines and scanners)
- Flat screen televisions up to 48"
- Paint products (oil based paint, latex paint)
- Batteries (AA, AAA, C, D and rechargeable)
- Fluorescent light bulbs (compact fluorescent lamps (CFL) and straight fluorescent tubes) and lamp fixtures
- Trash, including bulky items, and furniture



### Items that will NOT be accepted:

- Large appliances (refrigerators, washers, dryers, vacuums, etc.)
- Hazardous materials/chemicals (i.e. liquid mercury, leaking or empty containers, unknown or unlabeled materials and radioactive items)
- CRT (tube or projection) televisions
- Biological waste
- Commercial or business supplies
- Incandescent light bulbs
- Asbestos
- Ammunition and explosives
- Tires
- Construction-related materials
- Medicines and prescriptions
- Smoke detectors and items improperly packaged for transportation
